**COMMISSIONER
OF BOY SCOUTS
MAKES REPORT**Commissioner Alvah G. Good's report
presented at the annual meeting
of the Provincial Council at Saint
John this week, was as follows:Provincial Council,
October 27, 1936.
This year work has been interfered
with, for me, by making preparations
to attend October 20th, 1936, and, after-
wards, by making up for time lost
attending it.Since the Summer Gilwell Courses
are reported by A. P. Commander
Pugh, only two are properly included
in this report. During the Christmas
Holidays a course was conducted by
him in St. Stephen resulting in the
award of 20 S. M. cards. During the
first quarter of the year a District
Training Course was conducted in
Fredericton, the bulk of the candidates
coming from the student body of the
Provincial Normal School, 30
cards being awarded and presented
as result.In January a census was undertaken
of outstanding warrants in the
district involving reports on 135
Scout, 62 Cub and 53 unclassified war-
rants to Ottawa.In the year the following new
troops and packs have been organized:

Rogersville, Troop and Pack.
Baile Ste. Anne, Troop (Sea Scouts.)
Upper Blackville Troop.

cess, 277 dozen (3328) eggs supply-

bition was discontinued since it at-
tracted public attention only to a
small degree to Scouting. A last-
minute plan of uniformed Scouts ush-
ering for the Forest Protection Mov-
ies at the Fish and Game Protective
Association booth can hardly be said
to have fully justified itself.Apple Day this year has been a
thorough success and, with incom-
plete returns, I can state that we
meet our quota towards the Provin-
cial Office.A projected P. L. Course will open
next week to further the training of
P. L.'s in the Fredericton vicinity.
Much is expected of this.To summarize, I may say that,
while we are not satisfied that we
have done all we could, the results
seem most encouraging.

into neat little grave moulds. Tomb-
stones are easily made by icing slab-
shaped cookies, the inscription printed
on in chocolate letters. Favors can
be marshmallow ghosts or gumdrop
funeral wreaths with the name of
each guest printed on ribbon that de-
corates them.If place cards are used, each could
be an oblong of black cardboard on
which is clipped the "skeletonized"
name of guest, made by writing the
name with a broad pen on a slip of
white notepaper, and folding length-
wise before it is dry, so that the blot-
tered autograph makes a skeleton-like
design which a few lines added here
and there will transform into a
spooky little person.Or, as probably all of your friends
have some distinguishing characteris-
tic, foible, hobby, weakness or favor-
ite recreation, use tombstone-shaped
place cards and write a suitable epitaph
on each one.No name is mentioned in the in-
scription, but the wording of it gives
a lead to whom it refers. Thus Myr-

**FASCINATING HORRORS
OF HALLOWE'EN****Spend a Few Moments With Things Weird and
Spooky**

There's no getting out of it—you'll
simply have to have a Halloween
party! At least, we're sure you'll feel
that way if you pay a visit to Den-
nison's and see all the "horrors" on
display Fascinating horrors! Life-size
skeletons who wiggle and dangle their
arms and legs in a most uncanny
way! Angry-looking cats made of card-
board, whose joints are movable and
who can be worked into the most
grotesque positions! Wise old owls,
and evil-looking witches, riding on
brooms, stirring weird cauldrons into
which bats, spiders, snakes and grass-
hoppers seem to be dropping out of
the air! Against an orange back-
ground this makes a great wall de-
coration.There are cat silhouettes and pump-
kins for side lights, pumpkins to go
over the candlesticks, black, bleak-
looking tree cut-outs which can be
used on the wall, with cut-out owls,
cats and witches clambering over the
bare branches! And then there's a hil-
ariously funny "cat orchestra"—larger
than life-size cats, amusingly dressed,
with notes of music in their paws, and
one with a banjo, meowing away in
grand style. These can be made to
order, or you can get the patterns.
There is also an entire witch decoration
and all sorts of centerpieces.And speaking of centerpieces, you'll
love the pumpkin house made of
orange crepe paper, with transparent
windows edged in green. The top lifts
off so that favors or a light can be put
inside. There are small size pumpkin
houses to go with the centerpiece, to
be used as candy or nut cups, or as
individual favors. The various sized
squirrels which were so popular last
year are again in demand, and teach-
ers are using them for decoration in
school rooms.A new note this year is the introduc-
tion of green to rather brighten up
and take away the monotony of orange
and black. It works out fine and adds
an attractive and distinctive note.
Great favoritism is being shown to
fringe-decorated horns and clappers,
which have loops to fit over the wrist.
They're most convenient for dancers
and look rather gay. Silhouettes and
seals of all kinds, smart-looking Hal-
lowe'en plates, cups (with handles) to
hold hot or cold beverages, gay table-
cloths and napkins, adorable favors
to suit all ages, false faces that would
fool your own mother, costumes andnoisemakers of all kinds, will fascinate
you.A tablecloth which particularly took
our fancy was one of orange and
black blocks—very smart! Oh, yes,
there are cocktail napkins and other
accessories, and bridge sets with the
Hallowe'en motif.Another new item is a small cel-
wax jack o'lantern, which may be
used as a dinner favorite. Placed in a
dark room, the candle inside is lighted
and throws a brilliant but weird
light. The jack o'lantern is smiling
on one side and frowning on the other
—and there's no danger of fire, be-
cause the candle snuffs itself out after
burning about 10 minutes. For other
favors you'll find old fashioned mol-
lasses lollipops, covered with un-
sweetened chocolate, which come from
the South and are dressed in Hal-
lowe'en colors and costumes; witch
and cat costumed pasteboard "tubes"
which can be filled with candy bal-
loons; especially treated to last long-
er than the ordinary kind, and dozens
of other novelties. To go with the
plates and cups, there are new de-
corated sherbet or ice cream cups."Pin the Hat on the Witch" and
children as well as grown-ups—the
cat is a real old-fashioned "meower"
—as Mrs. Gibney described him—and
the tails are "swell." All sorts of for-
tune games—Fortune Wheel, Witch
Fortune Centrepiece, Stunt Game, I'm
a Numbskull (that's the name of a
game!) and others.An after thought—although this has
nothing to do with Hallowe'en, we
just can't resist telling you about the
election party accessories. If you're
inclined to do things about the com-
ing election—that is, if you want to
give a party—do take a look at the
Dennison table before making your
plans. Elephants and donkeys, in the
shape of nut cups, in large sizes for
centerpieces, in candle holders, on nap-
kins and tablecloths, used with red,
white and blue trimmings—well, even
if you have no idea of giving a party,
you'll be tempted to do so!**ONE OF HALLOWE'EN'S
MOST FESTIVE TOUCHES**

Your face may not be your fortune
but here's a chance to find that for-
tune in a piece of this "Wheel of
Fortune" cake, in which each of the
eight guests it serves may read his or
her future.Even the darkest prophecy will be
enjoyed if the cake is good, so first
we'll tell you how to make an Orange
Sponge Cake which is an infallible
foundation for the festive touches
which dress it up for Hallowe'en. Di-
rections for the fortunes are given
following the recipe.**Wheel of Fortune Cake**Beat until very light yellow, 4 egg
yolks.Add, about 2 tablespoons at a time,
beating after each addition: $\frac{3}{4}$ cup
sugar.Add, about 4 tablespoons at a time,
beating after each addition, 1-3 cup
orange juice, 2 tablespoons lemon
juice, $\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoon grated orange
rind.Mix, sift and add, about $\frac{1}{4}$ cup at a
time: 2 cups sifted cake flour, $\frac{3}{4}$ cup
sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon baking soda, $\frac{1}{4}$
teaspoon salt.Fold in carefully: 4 egg whites,
stiffly beaten.Bake in ungreased tube-cake pan in
moderate oven (300 degrees F.) for
one hour. Ice with:**Orange Butter Icing**

3 tablespoons butter

2 cups powdered sugar

2 tablespoons lemon juice

2 tablespoons orange juice

1 teaspoon grated orange rind.

Cream together, using more juice or
sugar as necessary, for good spread-
ing consistency. For a deeper color,
add a drop or two of orange vegetable
coloring.Before the final coating of icing,
the fortunes must be placed. White
fortunes on small pieces of paper,
Roll tightly and insert in the cake in
a small hole made by a skewer. The
place may be marked by a toothpick
until the cake has been frosted and
divided into eight sections by orange
segments. Add chocolate to part of
frosting and number sections from
one to eight. This is easily done by
means of a cake decorator.Before the refreshments are served
have each guest draw a number. The
drawing may be made hilarious by
having numbers on slips of paper
sticking out of the mouth of an or-
ange pumpkin face. Have each guest
pull a "tooth." When the cake is
served, each guest is given the piece
of cake corresponding to the number
he has drawn. If more than eight
guests are present, two or more cakes
should be served. Have the guests
read their fortunes aloud as they find
them. Much fun will result when
"certain" people get "certain" for-
tunes.Fortunes should be original and es-
pecially suited to the guests present.
But here are a few suggestions which
might be helpful:1. As long as you continue your
present mode of living, you will find
no change in the future.2. Trust the person on your right
only as far as you can see him.3. The party opposite you may
have a handsome face, but means no
good for you.4. A trip to Alaska—better bring
your earmuffs.5. Your future is being plotted
against by two people whom you least
suspect.

6. Tuesday is your lucky day.

7. You will soon find out there
are several things you should not
have done.

8. An airplane trip is in the offing.
