The present record is held by Mrs. Mollison, who traversed the route in 13 hours, 26 minutes, flying time earlier in the year.

The rivalry between Mollison and his wife over the Cape Town-London record dates back several years. It has been held by each in turn.

(Recently Mrs. Mollison said she and her husband had decided to separate and that she would fly under her maiden name.)

(Mrs. Mollison wrested the London-Cape Town record from her husband, Dec. 18, 1932, flying the distance in 4 days 6 hours 55 minutes.)

(In May, 1934, Jean Batten bettered the mark, but in May of 1935, Mrs. Mollison established records for solo flights each way and also set a mark for the round trip which she flew in seven days, 22 hours and 43 minutes.)

Mollison did not have much to say today concerning his 2,100-mile flight across the storm-tossed Atlantic.
