TIBET YIELDS RARE ANIMALS

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 2—Ex-
cavations which revealed evidence of
an early Mongol cultivation were
made at Batang by the Schafer-Dolan
expedition which returned to Vancou-
ver from the Far East recently. Re-
mains of early pottery and copper
working were unearthed, and the ma-
terials will be presented to the Chi-
nese National Museum at Nanking.

Mr. and Mrs. Brookes Dolan of
Philadelphia and E. L. C. Schafer
of Berlin were among those who made
the excavations. But they were more
interested in the zoological specimens
which they obtained than in the arch-
eological discoveries.

Their specimen included a large
animal and 3500 different birds, many
of them rare. The party was sent out
by the Philadelphia Academy of Nat-
ural Sciences and the Berlin Zoologi-
cal Gardens.

Most of the specimens were ob-
tained in Tibet, which was entered
after the Nanking Government had is-
sued special permits. The members
of the party travelled on horseback,
with yaks as pack animals.

Wild yaks, mountain sheep and deer
which scientists thought to be ex-
tinct were represented in the speci-
mens brought to this country by the
explorers.

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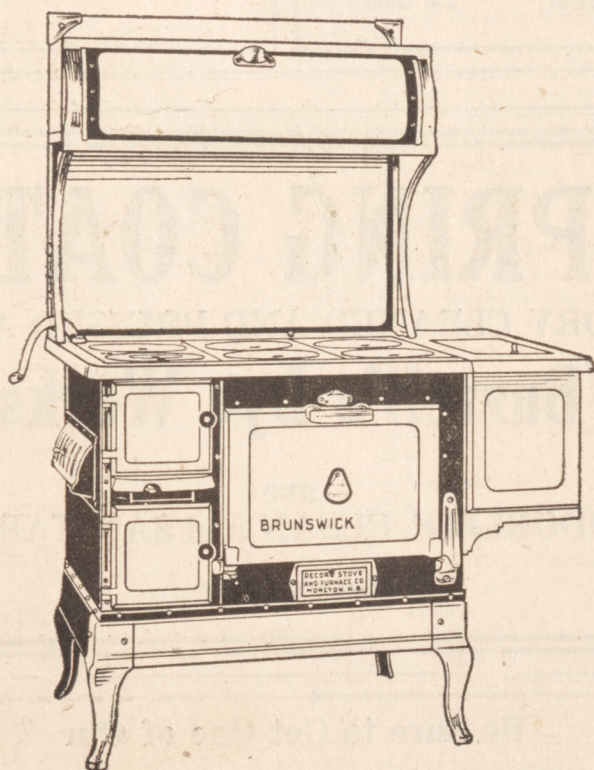
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
