TOBACCO CHEWING TROUT BARED BY VETERAN GUIDE

Fish Will Snap at Weed, Declares Veteran Trapper From New Brunswick as He Tells How He Got Supper For All.

BOSTON, Mass., April 29—Tobacco is to trout as hay is to horse! This is a little statement of ratio as arranged by Gilbert Imhoff, veteran New Brunswick trapper and guide, whose sensational story of having been frozen in a moose hide for two days and nights in the Canadian wilds appeared recently in the Traveller.

In other words, Mr. Imhoff settles the question of whether a trout will chew tobacco.

"A guide's life, he said, "is full of the surprises offered by nature. This one, however, topped all my experiences.

Supper A Problem
"We were up at one of our camps in northern New Brunswick. All of the camp crowd had gone to different places, taking either their cameras or their fly rods, and I was alone with the task of hooking a mess of trout for supper that night.

"I got out a canoe, drifted down the stream a little way below camp, made fast to an overhanging limb and tried out a pool where I knew from long experience there were plenty of fish.

"I tried first with dry flies, but after taking two small ones they quit biting, so I shifted to live bait. I caught two more little ones with worms, and then the biting stopped again. I was at Rocky Turn Dam pool, where there were plenty of big ones, but none would take anything. I sat back and wondered how I was going to get a full mess of trout for the hungry crowd that would be round the supper table.

"I was smoking a cigarette and I flipped the butt into the stream. At the instant it struck the water a good-sized trout rose and grabbed it. I was astonished, but it gave me an idea. I reeled in my line, paddled back to make a search of the ash trays for cigarette butts. I found three, went back to the pool and put those three on my hook, one at a time. I got three good-sized fish. Then I ran out of cigarette butts. I was sunk again, with nowhere near enough fish.

Why Not Cigars?
"I sat there thinking and remembered the cigar butts in the camp ash trays. 'If they'll take cigarette butts why not cigar butts?' I asked myself. So I went back and cleaned up all the cigar butts, three in all, and started fishing with these. That netted me three more fish—and the fish were getting bigger and better all the time.

YOUNG WOMAN DIES SUDDENLY NEAR BEERSVILLE

Miss Addie Girvan, 22, Near Death When Her Father Went to Room to Awaken Her — Will Hold Inquest.

BEERSVILLE, Kent County, May 2—The sudden death of Miss Addie Girvan, 22 year old daughter of Harry Girvan, occurred at the family home at Jellietville, a few miles from here. The young woman died shortly after she had been found by her father in an unconscious condition in her bedroom. The remains will be taken to Moncton tomorrow morning for a post-mortem examination after which certain organs of the body will be sent to the provincial pathological laboratory for analysis.

A small quantity of powdered substance, and a note, the contents of which were not divulged, were found in the girl's room. The sudden death of the young woman was reported to Coroner Dr. P. McL. Atkinson, of Moncton, who is investigating the case in conjunction with Royal Canadian Mounted Police Constables McMullen, Richard and Demissionis. A coroner's jury will be empanelled tomorrow morning and will view the body before it is taken to Moncton.

Mr. Girvan went to his daughter's room to arouse her shortly after 12 o'clock noon today. Although she was breathing and her pulse was fairly strong she failed to respond to the efforts to awaken her. Her father became alarmed and immediately sent

New Idea Succeeds

As each fish came back to spit after taking the 'bait' down to the bottom I just reached down and netted him into the canoe. Every one had all the broiled square-tails he wanted for supper that night, and no one remarked on any tobacco flavor."

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for medical assistance. He was unable to locate any doctors in the district, so he called Dr. R. G. Girvan of Moncton. However, the young woman expired about one half hour before his arrival.

Although the body did not bear any external evidence that death resulted from other than natural causes, the finding of the note and the powdered substance" was viewed with suspicion and the coroner and police were called. They conducted an investigation into the details of her death, but they have not yet made known the results of their findings.

The 'substance' found will be analyzed to determine its properties. No

further particulars regarding the case will be learned until the coroner's jury convenes after the results of the post mortem examinations are made known. It is thought that the inquest will be held in Moncton sometime during the latter part of next week.

Miss Girvan had been visiting friends in Fredericton for the past few months, returning home Tuesday evening. She appeared in her usual good health before she retired that evening, and her sudden passing came as a distinct shock to her family and friends. The young lady was popular throughout the district and was held in high esteem.
