Public Accts. Committee in Final Report

(Continued from Page Four)

1. That accounts for road work be paid more promptly than during the past year, so that as much as possible all accounts that are incurred previous to the end of the fiscal year be opened to the examination of the Committee.

2. That, if feasible, the total amounts for salaries and expenses be listed after the name of an employee or government official each time such name appears in the Comptroller General's report, so that reference may be had as to the total amount of salary and expenses paid to any employee or government official.

3. In view of an unbalanced budget, the Committee favours the practice of economy in the fixing of salaries of government employees.

4. In view of the government considering a reorganization of the system of revision consideration should be given to the difference in amounts paid to revisors by different Municipalities.

5. That a checkup of the practice of outgoing and incoming long distance telephone calls to and from government departments, should be made with a view of lowering costs and with a further view of writing letters rather than using the telephone so that a permanent record may be made of the subject matter of the conversation or correspondence.

6. That the practice of subscribing for all newspapers published in the province by different departments be discontinued and such subscriptions be made by one department only and a file be kept for the use of all departments in the Legislative Library.

7. As the Motor Vehicle branch seems to be overstaffed, it is recommended that its personnel be revised, overlapping and unnecessary officials dispensed with, so as to effect a substantial saving in the expense of administering the Branch.

8. It is recommended that the Department of Public Works follows a policy of hiring trucks on a daily basis, rather than expending large sums on their purchase, with a resulting tying-up of capital.

9. That distinguishing words or letters be marked on the bodies of all government owned passenger automobiles.

10. Your Committee views with disfavor the large amount expended on the operation of government garages, totalling over \$147,000.00 for the past year, and recommends that steps be taken to reduce the cost of the maintenance of these establishments.

11. That the practice of issuing special warrants for ordinary expenditure or even for Capital expenditure is not in accord with the principles of democratic government and if followed defeats the object of budgeting. It is, therefore, recommended that this practice which has been so much abused in the past be abandoned with the view of retrenchment and better economy and that the privilege granted the government of issuing special warrants be made use of with great care and only in cases of strict necessity.

Your committee feels that reference should be made to the over-expenditure of \$679,862.48 which took place during the year. In this connection your Committee notes that within a few months prior to the provincial Election, road machinery to the value of \$195,312.24 and automobiles to the value of \$6,701.82 were purchased by the Government, and during the year, in Restigouche County, with a comparatively small mileage, the sum of \$168,962.31 was expended on permanent secondary trunk roads, an average of over \$1,200.00 per mile, with a similar waste in Victoria County. Your Committee deplors tactics of making large expenditures for machinery, equipment, and on public works for election purposes.

Your Committee recommends the payment of \$5.00 to Kathleen Cumming in connection with the typing of this report.

On motion this Report was adopted by the Committee and recommended to the favourable consideration of the House.

WHITHER ARE WE DRIFTING?

The Dominion of Canada is sixty-nine years old. Previous to 1867 it was at best an aggregation of provinces with devious, often antagonistic interests, dependent largely upon the United States for a large proportion of its daily needs. In many respects, indeed, it appeared to outside observers to be rapidly developing into a mere appendage of the adjacent republic, and the question of annexation of certain sections of Canadian territory was seemingly being decided for the people against their wishes by purely physical conditions.

Sir John Macdonald was the first Government leader who possessed the true vision of Canada as a nation, and the courage to make it one. But today that vision is in danger of being obscured. Indeed, it might almost be said that influences are manifesting themselves as designed to undermine the very structure of this nation and reduce it to the level of a prospective State of the American Union. In certain directions those influences are so potent as to suggest to many disheartened Canadians that a change might improve their financial condition. They are steadily growing discouraged at the sorry spectacle of degeneracy being brought about by a purblind railway policy that is crushing the hopes which were established by Confederation and stimulated by the splendid possibilities it envisaged for a young and vigorous country.

To the older generation of the Canadian people there is something sinister in the fact that the present railway problem which definitely threatens this country with bankruptcy is not the creation of any government, but the result of deliberate manipulation for selfish interests. The piecemeal concern originally known as the Canadian Northern and later, with its various additions, rebaptized as the Canadian National with the object of ameliorating the unsavoury odour of its corrupt parentage, was in no sense whatever a government undertaking. It was definitely a schemers' project, engineered and sold to the public on a basis flagrantly dishonest, and today it is being operated at the expense of a deceived public with annual deficits so staggering that they present Canada to the outside world as a nation well on its way to insolvency unless some drastic remedy is swiftly applied.—The Montreal Star.

through the diamond drill hole they raced as far as they could go, fearing they must have caused a loose stick of dynamite to explode.

Hours passed. Only when a siren sounded through the hole did they realize communication had been established with them by rescue workers.

They rushed over, shouting and tapping the pipe, and the miners digging and blasting above knew then for the first time the three were alive.

Neither diamond drill nor blasting had been heard, though once a box and a half of dynamite was loosed in a single terrific explosion.

Man-made noises could not vie with the sharp cracks—like giant rifle shots—four of which warned of approaching disaster Easter Sunday night.

The three leaped from the shaft and for four hours thereafter the grinding and rumbling of the earth continued like thunder.

HITLER GANGSTER, SAYS THE KING'S BROTHER-IN-LAW

LONDON, England, April 24—The Earl of Harewood, King Edward's brother-in-law, compared Hitler to "a gangster" yesterday in a speech, which may earn him a private rebuke from St. James' Palace.

"If you examine the methods of Hitler, it is difficult to draw any parallel to them except the methods of a gangster," said Harewood in opening a new drill hall for the territorial army at Huddersfield. He went on:

"In dealing with a highwayman or gangster, we shall do so more comfortably if we are armed with a bullet-proof shirt. It's a bullet-proof shirt we have to provide somehow this country."
