months in order that he might be used, if necessary, as a material witness in Daniel's second trial. When Daniel was found guilty and appealed a second time his brother, Arthur was given another reprieve with the date of his execution being set for September 23, the same day on which Daniel had been sentenced to hang when found guilty at his second trial. A copy of the judgment handed down last Tuesday by the Supreme Court was mailed to Hon. Ernest Lapointe on Saturday last. The minister decided he would make no recommendation for clemency.

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CANADA AND WORLD'S DAIRY CONGRESS

Canada will be officially represented at the 11th World's Dairy Congress to be held in Berlin, Germany, from August 22 to 28, 1937. This Congress, which meets every three years, is the most important gathering of representatives of the dairy industry in the world.

Among the subjects to be discussed at the Congress are: Milk Processing and Treatment and Improvement of Quality; Sale of Milk and Milk Products; Marketing; Business Management; Dairy Education; Dairy Machinery; Dairy Buildings; Technical Factory Problems; Daily Implementations; and Means of Transport.

An International Dairy Exhibition will also be held in connection with the Congress at which the very latest developments in the dairy industry throughout the world will be shown, as well as the methods of advertising and publicity directed to increase a greater consumption of milk and milk products.

At the conclusion of the Congress the delegates will be taken on a tour of different parts of Germany so that they will have an opportunity to visit the large industrial dairy plants, dairy research institutes and dairy farms which are very up to date and progressive in Germany.

Experts hope to learn which way their experiment is going about next March.

Harris for a freight route from Saint John to St. Stephen via St. George, St. Andrews and Milltown with permission to stop once or twice a week at Black's Harbor, was announced at length by Mr. Carr in the afternoon. The application was dismissed on grounds of policy. The service desired was one of those involved in the mass transfer.

Recently incorporated by the Dominion, the S. M. T. System, Limited, controls the following franchises, the formal transfer of which was approved by the board:

1. Saint John Motor Line—Saint John to Fredericton (passenger).
2. Fundy Motor Lines—St. Stephen to Nova Scotia border (passenger).
3. Clarke & Watters—Saint John to St. Stephen (freight).
4. Universal Sales—Newcastle to Chatham (passenger).
5. White's Express Company—Saint John to Fredericton via the Broad Road (freight).
6. T. W. Enright—Saint John, Sussex Chipman (passenger).

The first of these franchises was modified in the transfer, in that the Saint John Motor Line part of this system is to be restricted from picking up passengers between Oromocto and Fredericton, on the Saint John to Fredericton trip; and letting down passengers between Fredericton and Oromocto, on the Fredericton to Saint John trip.

The board stated that it "appreciates the fact that the Capital Transit Company is giving adequate service over this area, making four trips per day."

Madrid in Panic

citizens are being instructed in combating gas attacks.

The Spanish insurgents last night claimed their troops had occupied the strategic town of Maqueda, 45 miles southwest of Madrid.

The government forces, the insurgent communique stated, offered stubborn resistance and suffered heavy losses. Roads approaching the town were littered with government dead.

Maqueda's strategic importance lies in the fact that it is at a crossroads. One road, a modern highway, leads to the capital 45 miles away; the other to Toledo, where an insurgent force has been besieged in the Alcázar for 62 days.

It remains to be seen whether the insurgent commander General Francisco Franco, will continue to Madrid, or divert his troops in an attempt to relieve the besieged insurgents at Toledo.

Diplomatic advices reaching Saint Jean de Luz, near the Franco-Spanish frontier said the current operations of Franco and the northern insurgent commander, General Emilio Mola, would culminate in a joint offensive late in the week.

London despatches said the insurgents were advancing on the capital from four sides, but did not give details.

Mola today broke through the Azpeita line of the government forces and pushed toward Bilgao—chief city of the Bay of Biscay area still in government hands. Refugees claimed the city was "nearly demoralized" by exhausted ammunition supplies. Refugees said the inhabitants were fleeing by land and sea either to Santander or into France.

At Toledo, government militiamen slept beside their rifles, awaiting the signal for a "final" assault on the Alcázar, which the insurgents continue to hold despite dynamite charges, gasoline fires and artillery shelling.

Women and children within the Alcázar were believed hiding from the government shellfire in underground dungeons of the ancient Moorish fortress, 40 miles south of Madrid. Many of the insurgents' original number of 1,700 are believed dead.

A "people's tribunal" at Madrid sentenced to death the former minister of the interior, Rafael Salazar Alonso, an associate of the ex-premier Alejandro Lerroux.

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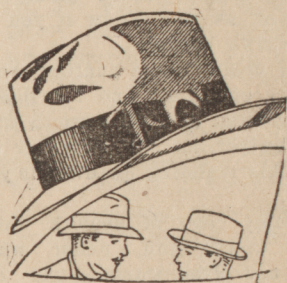
