WON SCHOLARSHIP

It is learned here that C. Vincent Callaghan, of Saint John, bachelor of science of the University of New Brunswick, has left to take up a scholarship of \$250 a year for a maximum of four years, offered by the president of the Colorado School of Mines. Mr. Callaghan obtained his B. Sc. degree from U.N.B. in 1935 and has recently been engaged in work with a Canadian geological survey party in St. George, N. B. Lieut. Governor MacLaren received word from the Under Secretary of State of Mr. Callaghan's nomination. The successful student is a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Callaghan, Orange Street, Saint John. GROUNDS ARE CLEARED

This work will last for several weeks. No financial report on the success of this year's exhibition will be made known until some time in November.

TRUE BILLS IN THREE CRIMINAL CASES FOUND

York Circuit Court In
September Sitting
Here Today

Civil Cases Set Over

Two Actions Against
Drivers Allegedly Un-
der Influence Liquor

True bills were found in each of the three criminal cases that were presented on the docket of the September Term of the York Circuit Court presided over by Chief Justice Barry at the County Court House this morning. The four civil cases were set over until October 20th due to pressure of business of the court.

The criminal cases on the docket are as follows: the King vs. Walter Guthrie on the information of Nathaniel Jones, Chief of the Fredericton Police Force, for having care and control of an automobile while under the influence of intoxicating liquor; The King, on the information of David Evans vs. Joseph Trombley for having care and control of an automobile while under the influence of liquor and for causing grievous bodily injuries to William McGloin. The third criminal case is the King vs. William Clark on the information of Phillip Grant for a statutory offence. The members of the Grand Jury headed by foreman Delmas Olts who brought in the true bills are Charles DeLong, R. R. No. 6; Ivan McKnight, Fredericton; Cleveland Brewer, Zealand Station; Leslie Slipp, South Devon; Hazen Everett, R. R. No. 6; Joseph Rossborough, Prince William; Leo Goodine, R. R. No. 6; Robert Scott, Barker's Point; Charles Henderson, Durham Bridge; Frank J. Saunders, R. R. No. 1; Harry Daniels, Pinder.

The members of the petit jury will be selected at this afternoon's sitting of the court when the case of the King vs. Walter Guthrie will be taken up. The Clerk of the Court is Albert R. Murray.

JOINS NATIONAL THRIFT

Many friends here will learn with interest that Carleton F. Tilley now of Saint John, but formerly of this city, has joined the National Thrift Corporation (New Brunswick) Limited, and will represent that company in the central part of the province. NEW INTERESTS TO CONTROL MARITIME ELECTRIC CONCERN

Royal Securities Co. Had
Representative Here
Inspecting Plant

Personnel Continues

F'ton, St. Andrews, St.
Stephen, Charlottetown
Under New Concern

The Maritime Electric Company, Ltd., which organization controls the electric franchise in this city, will go under new management on October 1. The change will mean that the properties in Fredericton, St. Stephen, St. Andrews and Charlottetown, will operate in future under purely Canadian interests and that the properties in the Maritime Provinces will to a large extent be controlled by Maritime people.

Dennis Stairs of Montreal representing the engineering department of the Royal Securities Company, was in this city over the weekend inspecting the properties before they are taken over by the new corporation, and left on Monday for Halifax to look over properties in Nova Scotia which will be concerned in the new deal. It is understood that the Royal Securities Company will place first mortgage bonds upon the market in local centres so that people in Fredericton, St. Stephen and other places will be in a position to obtain this stock if they so wish.

The change in the management of the company as a whole will not affect the personnel of the local branches of the company. They remain the same. Friends in this city will be pleased to know that Manager S. A. Young and his efficient staff will remain as at present. They are giving the public the best of service at the present time.

The probate value is \$3,200. The bulk of the estate goes to the wife and daughter.

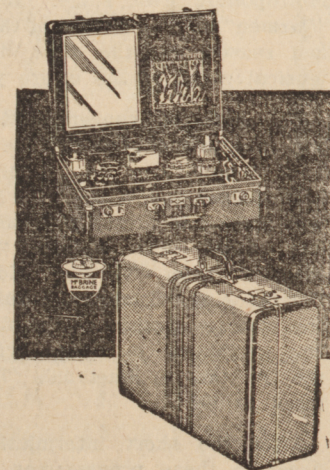
