The management of the Fredericton Capitals has decided to start its Tuesday night's game against the Seagulls at nine o'clock. SAINT JOHN, Dec. 18—The New Brunswick Intercollegiate Hockey League will open at Chatham on Feb. 3 with U.N.B. sextet the guest of St. Thomas' College team, new entry to the loop this season, replacing St. Joseph's. The St. Joseph's University team dropped out and signified their intention of retiring at a meeting of the league in Moncton.

St. Thomas' team was immediately taken in to form a three-team circuit again this season.
