Vacation Tickets Created
It was June. The "paid vacations" law had just been passed, which meant that all employees of any concern, state, or private, would henceforth have the right to at least two weeks' vacation with pay. A lot of the poorer people, however received such small pay they would not get the full benefit of a vacation which is their due, unless—

The value of the Dead Sea today is four times the wealth of the whole United States. It is there in the form of magnesium and potash and other mineral salts without which glass, matches, cotton goods, and a thousand other necessities could hardly be manufactured at all.

For thousands of years the River Jordan has been pouring these minerals into the Dead Sea, which lies 1300 feet below sea level, a catch-basin for thousands and millions of years for the chemical treasures of the desert. A simple way was found to pump the brine of the Dead Sea into great shallow basins; the sun does the rest through evaporation. The dry salts are packed into bags and shipped wherever industry calls for them. A shipload came into Baltimore just the other day.

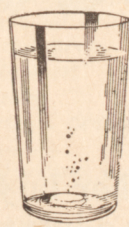
