year and to keep down expenses. Mr. Best contended that the railway was not built to make money down here in the Maritimes. He thought that the Maritimes were getting a mighty poor deal so far as the railways are concerned.

W. G. Clark, M.P., spoke strongly in favor of the railway giving Stanley a daily service if it could be accomplished.

R. L. Phillips also hoped that the matter would receive the favorable consideration of the railway.

Mr. Cruikshank, assistant superintendent stated that he had heard complaints from through passengers who objected to the extra hours' delay coming and going into Stanley. Where the through trains carry from forty to fifty passengers, there has been times when the branch trains in and out of Stanley did not carry one passenger.

The matter of the Canadian National Railway taking freight in car lots delivered at the Union station here and conveying the same to Devon was gone into. It was generally understood that Mr. Appleton and Traffic Manager Tompkins will work out a scheme of trucking freight across the highway bridge, that will be satisfactory to the merchants.

In the course of the discussion, it was claimed by Mr. Appleton that the present handling of freight in less than car lots from the Upper Provinces via Moncton, Saint John and on to Fredericton, was giving a better service than the old McGivney-Devon route. Mr. Tompkins said that the Moncton-Saint John route took six hours longer. Mr. Appleton claimed that the route via Saint John was not much longer being 235 miles distance and had better grades.

Mr. Clark, M.P., gave instances where the C.P.R. are hauling coal in car lots from Minto via Woodstock and MacAdam around to this city instead of bringing it to Devon and having it hauled across the river here.

Speaking of expenditure in this region, Mr. Appleton said that the branch lines were helping to pile up expenses for the railroad in this region. Five million dollars per year were being spent in trackage in this region.

Speaking about the bridge, President Miller said that we in Fredericton were not getting the support of certain other parts of the Province. He said that Messrs. Clark and Ryan, M.P.'s were now taking the matter up with the Board of Trade and were trying to find out if the promises made last summer will be carried out. This was along the line suggested by The Daily Mail and will probably now produce results.

Mr. Appleton stated that whilst he had no authority to speak for the railroad that he believed action was being taken from the fact that enquiries were being made for data.

Chairman Phillips thanked the gentlemen for their coming to Fredericton.

Those present at the meeting included Chairman R. L. Phillips, and Messrs. C. L. Doherty, J. D. Palmer, George Armstrong, J. L. Neville of the transportation committee; W. G. Clark, M.P., Mayor Kitchen and President S. S. Miller of the Board of Trade.

of 12 and 18 to join this association." J. C. Veness, who is in charge of the Dominion forestry camps in this section also was a speaker. He referred to the importance of game refuges and advised vigilance in the protection and preservation of game.

## Surprise of Evening

When it came time to present the beautiful silver trophy to the one who had caught the largest trout during the season, Gordon Gray, chairman of the Membership committee declared that not one single entry had been made for the Cup. This surprise announcement was followed by a suggestion from Mr. Gray that in future every member of the association enter any fish which is one pound or over. An increase in membership was reported.

Harry C. Moore, chairman of the bird committee, gave a comprehensive report on what the branch is doing at the present time. He declared among other things that the province needs non-resident hunters and he urged an increase in resident licenses on birds to divert their attention to deer because of the inroads on the birds by resident sports who killed about 98 per cent of the birds. Pheasants need more attention by the game associations including protection and promotion. Mr. Moore pointed out the advantage of one month open season of partridge as a conservation measure. He reported a 78 per cent increase in membership in the Fredericton branch.

The banquet held at the Waverley Hotel last night upheld the reputation made by Mr. and Mrs. Dewar, for their excellent catering, and it proved to be a very excellent one.
