BIG CAMPAIGN LINED UP FOR JOE LOUIS IN EUROPE

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Messrs. Michael Jacobs, John Roxborough and Julian Black, the triumvirates that guides the destinies of Jolting Joe Louis, believe that a rolling stone D-O-E-S gather moss and that an idle fighting machine becomes clogged with ring rust.

Busy Campaign
Accordingly, the Mocha Mauler's mentors are mapping an ambitious campaign that will keep Marse Joe mightily busy fighting around the United States and Europe during the next six or seven months.

"Idleness does not agree with Louis," Promoter Jacobs explained today. "The Schmeling fight proved that. If you don't keep him busy, he gets loggy. He loses his edge. Even when he's training, his handlers have to keep after him to prevent Joe from sleeping too much. So it's up to us to keep him busy—if for no other reason than his physical condition."

Jacobs of the 20th Century club and Hippodrome, who has a four-year contract on the Brown Bomber's services, added that Louis also could make plenty of money by keeping busy, and that this was an important angle in the career of any boxer—particularly for one of the greatest drawing cards the ring ever knew.

Big Money in View
Uncle Mike estimated that Shufflin' Joe and his 32 professional opponents have drawn more than \$1,800,000 in gross gates during the Bomber's 27 months of commercial fighting. Jacobs estimated also that Louis will attract more than \$300,000 in gates in the United States before he goes to England in May, and that European fans will contribute an additional \$500,000 or \$600,000 to see him perform. No fighter in ring history ever was such an attraction so early in his career.

Louis, who has been idle since knocking out Jorge Brescia in three rounds on the night of Oct. 9, will start training this week in Chicago. His first scheduled performance is a six-round exhibition bout in New Orleans on November 20.

On Dec. 7, the Bomber tackles veteran Johnny Risko in a 10-round fight at Cleveland. This bout will be sponsored by the Cleveland Daily News as a Christmas fund show. In the second week of January, Louis will fight a 10-rounder in Detroit and in the latter part of the same month he is slated for another 10-rounder in Chicago. Opponents have not been selected, but it is understood that Babe Feldman, rugged New York heavyweight, who never has been floored, will be in the ring for one of them.

In February the Louis entourage will tour the Pacific Coast, fighting 10-rounders in Los Angeles and San Francisco and making exhibition appearances in other Far Western cities. Returning to New York, the Detroit star probably will fight a 10-rounder in early March.

In May, Louis and his crew will make their first trip to Europe. He will fight in Wembley Stadium against the best available opponent during the coronation celebration for King Edward VIII. Walter Neusel, German heavyweight, and Ben Foord of South Africa, are fighting in London on Nov. 18. The winner is expected to meet Maxie Baer and the victor in that bout may be Jolting Joe's London opponent. After the London engagement, Louis will box in other European cities. Paul Damski, Neusel's manager, is en route to

BRYDON TO OTTAWA

SARNIA, Nov. 7.—Stuart Brydon, prominent in local hockey and golfing circles left Sarnia this week for Ottawa where he has been transferred by his employers. Brydon, who starred in the City Hockey League, was one of the outstanding younger players of the Sarnia Golf Club.

"We expect to have Louis back in the United States in July," Jacobs concluded. "He can start preparing then to meet in September the winner of the June title fight between Braddock and Schmeling. If such a bout can be arranged. Otherwise he will throw him into the ring at Yankee Stadium with the best heavyweight available—and there should be some pretty good ones ready then. Brescia will be more experienced; Gunnar Barlund of Finland will be seasoned, and Arthur Godoy of Chile or big Frankie Connelley of Boston may be developed."

Owen Sound Drops Out of Hockey Scene

OWEN SOUND, Nov. 7.—Owen Sound, home of two Dominion championship hockey teams a decade ago, will drop out of the hockey picture this winter as a result of the failure of a committee appointed by the city council to reach an agreement for lease of the rink here.

Riverside Arena in 1924 saw Cooney Weiland and Teddy Graham of the Boston Bruins, Butch Keeling of the New York Rangers and their mates start on the trail to a Dominion junior title. Three years later saw such stars as Jack Markle of the Syracuse Stars, Hillis Paddon of St. Louis Flyers and Benny Grant, who was a rival for Lorne Chabot's goal keeping post on the Toronto Maple Leafs a few seasons ago, brought the Memorial Cup back to the city of the Greys again.

The price asked was \$1,400 for a one year lease on the rink, with options for lease for a second and third year at \$900 a year.
