GOOD DEMAND FOR CANADIAN SEED POTATOES

OTTAWA, Nov. 7—Good demand
from many countries for Canadian
certified seed potatoes is reported by
the department of agriculture. Ever
since harvest, these potatoes have
been moving out, starting in Nova
Scotia as early as the third week in
August.

Nova Scotia has exported all avail-
able Bliss Triumph seed potatoes,
chiefly to Cuba and Bermuda, also
to Florida, a new market. All Katahdin
and Garnet Chili varieties have
been sold, the former going to the
Argentine and the latter to Bermuda.
Judging by the present movement, the
bulk of Irish Cobblers will be sold
by the end of November.

New Brunswick has exported 235-
000 bushels of certified Bliss Triumph
potatoes from the 1936 crop to Cuba,
Florida and Panama, and smaller lots
to the West Indies. Shipments of
Green Mountains to the Argentine
and Uruguay, a comparatively new
market, exceed 120,000 bushels, and
in addition there is a fairly large
movement of Green Mountains to
Maine.

In Prince Edward Island, the heavy
shipping season is only starting, and
cargoes are being assembled at the
various ports. The island has the
largest acreage in Canada of certified
seed potatoes but the crop is some-
what later than those in Nova Scotia
and New Brunswick. Already, ship-
ments of Bliss Triumphs have been
made to Cuba and Florida, and some
of Irish Cobblers to the United States.

Lower Hainesville

ENGLAND TO HAVE 3 NEW STATIONS

LONDON, Nov. 7—While the B.B.C.
is not divulging what the power will
be of its new Empire Broadcasting
station at Daventry, there are sig-
nificant hints that it is likely to be
the strongest short-wave station in
Europe, if not in the world.

There are three transmitters being
installed in a building constructed to
accommodate four, and it is expected
that each will have a power of 50-
kilowatts or more. Twelve aerial
masts will support a system of
aerials. The cost of the station will
probably exceed \$1,250,000.

Competition in Empire countries
from the short-wave services from
several Continental countries, Ger-
many in particular, undoubtedly im-
presses the B.B.C. with the necessity
of having a radio "voice" as strong
as any now reaching the ears of lis-
teners in British lands. Zeesen, the
German short-wave station, has been
using up to 50-kilowatts to reach lis-
teners in Africa, and the reception
is reported to be often much better
than that of the Empire transmis-
sions. A new feature of the German
transmissions is talks for the edifica-
tion of people in South Africa. In
view of the German campaign for a
colonial foothold in the Dark Con-
tinent, there is a feeling here that Em-
pire programmes should not suffer
for want of power.

The new station at Daventry may
not be ready until the spring, but
it is hoped that it will be in full work-
ing order in time for the coronation
broadcasts.
