GAY SPANISH SETTING FOR "THE MIRROR OF MELODY"

One of the most colorful presentations in the Sunday night Commission series, "The Mirror of Melody," will be "Espagnol," concert and operatic programme announced for Sunday, August 2, at 10:00, AST. A presentation orchestra under the baton of Geoffrey Waddington, will furnish interesting excerpts from the opera "Carmen," and special arrangements of "Espana" and "Bolero." Tito Fandos, Spanish-born tenor, whose brilliant voice has been likened to that of the great Caruso, will have a prominent place on the broadcast. He will be heard to advantage in three stirring Spanish songs: "Princessita," "Credita Lindo" and "La Clavelitos." Signor Fandos was first brought to Commission audiences from the Western networks, removing to Toronto in the Spring of 1935, since when he has made several distinguished appearances on programmes from that city.

Another guest star to be heard on this date is the gifted young singer, Marina Toledo, who made her singing debut in South America, and who brought romantic Spanish love songs to a popular Commission feature last summer directed by Leon Zuckert.

VARIETY SHOW TO FEATURE MIMICS

Larry Burford, George Patton, "Red" Newman, Yvonne Miller, George Young and the Three Waiters will be headliners on the Canadian Radio Commission variety show, "Let's Go to the Music Hall," scheduled for national audiences tonight at 9:30, p.m., AST.

Sensational successes of the London music halls, and impressions of the stars who sang them, will be offered by George Young's artists on this hour. "Red" Newman, vaillant trouper, will open the show with his impression of George D'Albert singing "Choose Her in the Morning." George Young will do a smooth impersonation of F. H. Elliot singing "I May Be Crazy" and George Patton will delight his fans with another monologue in the Frank Lynne manner, "My Inquisitive Kiddie."

WYNN WORRIES PROPERTY MAN

Ed Wynn long has been a "stickler" for atmosphere at his radio broadcasts.

Most recent of the atmosphere idea is a "grab bag" from which Wynn draws inspiration for his gags. When Wynn first went on the air almost five years ago, he started broadcasting circles by demanding that the glass partition between his audience and himself be removed. At that time it was customary to keep the audience out of the broadcast. Today audience reaction and applause are considered essential to a radio comedian's success. It was Wynn who first recognized its value.

So Wynn insists upon atmosphere and a full line of stage props. And Ed Wynn's new grab bag is giving the stage properties man a few headaches. Wynn says that if he is going to talk about a grab bag the bag has got to be there and actually have in it the things he talks about . . . otherwise he doesn't get the proper "inspiration."

So Wynn has designed a huge canvas bag himself. It looks something like an oversize laundry bag and has printed across it in large letters the words "Ed Wynn Grab-Bag."

Getting the bag was easy enough. But getting the things to go into the bag is another problem. To name just a few of the things that have come out of the bag in the last few weeks: A stuffed skunk, a pitch pipe (the sort that a choirmaster uses to give singers the right notes,) a toy automobile, a toy piano, a soap box, an animal picture book, a crystal ball (the sort used by fortune tellers) four dolls to represent the Kasper quadruplets . . . and a lot of other things
