

## News Briefs

### FISHING IN N. B.

Paul W. Richardson, a prominent New York city stock broker has been fishing in New Brunswick. While staying at Ogilvie's lodge on the Tobique he took two grills. Allen, former editor of The Daily Mail, where he will continue salmon fishing. He expects to be in New Brunswick for some time.

### ELECTED AT SAINT JOHN

W. W. Boyce, of this city, was elected vice-president at the annual meeting of the shareholders of the Eastern Bakeries, Limited, held in the company's head office at Saint John yesterday. G. G. Anglin, general manager, reported that business is in a more flourishing condition at the present time than for a long time. Prospects are bright for the new year. Mr. Boyce returned to the city last night.

### EIGHT WERE FINED

Eight cases were dealt with in the Fredericton Police Court yesterday. Six were for violation of the Motor Vehicle Act and two were for violation of the city's bye-laws. In the motor vehicle cases a truck driver was fined for passing an automobile on a bridge. The remaining five were fined for driving "faster than is reasonable and proper." A dog at large and improper driving caused the two bye-law infringements. The usual fines were handed out.

### TENDERS FOR NEW DRILL HALL

W. G. Clark, M.P., for York-Sunbury has received advice from the Department of National Defence that changes will be made in the Armoury here shortly when a drill hall is likely to be built. Tenders have been called for improvements, which will provide more accommodation. Mr. Clark said. What the nature of these improvements will be, Mr. Clark did not know. It is understood that work will commence within a short time, however, and that the building of a new drill hall, as originally intended, will be carried out.

### RECOMMEND ROAD WORK

At a meeting of the Road and Streets committee of the city council yesterday afternoon, it was recommended that certain road work in the city, including paving around the City Hall, paving the block on Northumberland street between Queen and King streets, paving a couple of blocks on St. John street from Brunswick to Charlotte streets, and also putting in a curb near the Cenotaph, be done this summer. These recommendations will be presented to the city council at its next meeting. Ald. David McCaughey, chairman of the committee, was in the chair.

### GRANTED A FRANCHISE

Highway Transport, Ltd., with L. McC. Ritchie appearing on its behalf, was granted a franchise to operate a passenger service from Perth-Andover to Fort Fairfield, Maine, or the nearest point on the boundary line, by the N. B. Motor Carrier Board yesterday at Saint John. The application was opposed by the Canadian Pacific Railway, which was represented by H. H. McLean, Jr., K.C.. An application from Capital Transit, Ltd., of this city for a passenger franchise from this city to Chipman by way of Sheffield Corner, Lakeville Corner, Douglas Harbor, Newcastle Creek and Minto, was referred to private session. The board approved the transfer of the franchise of Sullivan Brothers from Fredericton to Woodstock to Highway Transport Ltd.

### LATE MRS. MARTHA CHASE

The funeral of the late Mrs. Martha Elizabeth Chase, whose death occurred on Sunday evening, took place yesterday afternoon with prayers at the Chapel Funeral Home on Westmorland street at 2.30 o'clock and service at the Mauderville United Church at 3.30 o'clock. Rev. John Wood conducted the service and was assisted by Ven. Archdeacon A. F. Bate. A large number were present at the services to pay a final tribute of respect. The four nephews, Albert Grant, Gilbert Grant, Phillip Grant and Clarence Jarvis acted as pallbearers. There were many mourners who included old friends who attended the service at Mauderville. Interment was made in the United Church cemetery.

## DEPOSITS OF GOLD FOUND IN GLOUCESTER?

Diamond Drill is Sent to Gloucester County By Department

### Geological Survey

Possible Extension West For Commercial Interest

W. E. McMullen, New Brunswick mining inspector and recorder, said today that the department of lands and mines has sent a diamond drill to Nigadoo, Gloucester County, where W. N. Degrace and E. A. Comeau have staked out claims in an area which they believe to contain deposits of gold, silver, lead and zinc. The drill, which was sent about two days ago, will be used to drill several holes in the area but it was not probable that any report will be made for several days, Mr. Mullen stated.

The two prospectors have done considerable surface work over the area and their diggings had reached a stage where it was possible to continue only with a diamond drill, he said. A Dominion government geological survey party under Dr. C. Evans, has commenced investigation of the possibility of the Stoney Creek oil field in Albert and Westmorland counties extending westward from Petitcodiac to Sussex. It will be under Dr. C. Evans.

Dr. Evans, with three assistants, has been working on the Petitcodiac sheet since June 1 and has found some data of scientific interest which, it was said, might prove to be of commercial interest to the province later. Dr. Evans' party, one of four working in New Brunswick this summer, is expected to return to the same area next summer. Only one of the parties is expected to complete its work this season.

Should the Stoney Creek oil field extend westward from its present location it would mean much to the province commercially, it was stated. At present, the area supplies natural gas to the City of Moncton and a small quantity of gasoline and crude oil is manufactured for domestic use and for the C.N.R. as fuel for its oil-electric trains. Should any indications of the field extending westward toward Sussex be discovered, it is understood that the New Brunswick Gas and Oil Company is prepared to develop the area on a large scale, it was said.

### Until October

The parties, which commenced work about June 1, will be in the field until the middle of October, when the chiefs will return to Ottawa.

For the last several years until two summers ago it was the policy of the Dominion government to have about one or two parties in the field in this province, but during the summers of 1935 and 1936 there have been no less than four.

Dr. Bruce Ross, professor of geology at Queen's University, is in charge of a party located near the headwaters of the Tobique River, on the watershed of that river and the Upsalquitch. With two assistants, he is doing some geological mapping of importance to prospectors in metallic minerals.

A party of three under Dr. W. A. Bell, Ottawa, is doing stratigraphical work on the carboniferous formations in the vicinity of Shepody Bay, on the border of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

The fourth party, under Prof. S. C. Perry, of the University of New Brunswick, is working on the St. George sheet in Charlotte County.

## CAPITAL BUS TO PROVIDE A GOOD SERVICE UP RIVER

To Connect With C.P.R. Points Above Hartland to Edmundston

### Will Bring In Shoppers

Route Up East Side to Opposite Woodstock, On to Hartland

The Capital Transit, Ltd., of this city, has received word that its application to operate a passenger bus service between this city and Hartland on the eastern side of the river, has been granted. A proposed route to Hartland will be up to Keswick, over to Keswick Ridge, and via the Mouth of the Magaquac through Queensbury, Southampton, Northampton, including Grafton, opposite the town of Woodstock, and on to Hartland. Passengers wishing to go to Woodstock can easily go by this bus and land at Grafton, which is at the end of the Woodstock-Grafton highway bridge. This bridge is a short one and the Grafton end of the bridge is only a short distance from the leading hotel in Woodstock.

A definite announcement regarding this service will probably be made within the next few days, when details of this service will be given out.

## To Commence Re-Building Burned Barn At Once

Archibald, director of Experimental Stations, at Ottawa, that the huge barn destroyed by fire on Saturday last at the Experimental Station, will be reconstructed at once. The capacity will be about the same as at present. Mr. Bailey could not say today just what these improvements would be. For the next few days he will be engaged in estimating the cost of the new building and suggested plans for improvements.

## RESTORE THE BURPEE BROOK FOR FISHING

Fisheries Officials Are Conducting a Survey

### Stream Improvement

If Accepted, Stream to Be Closed and Dam Built

With the object in view of restoring the Burpee stream to its natural state as a fish stream, and also for purposes of stream improvement, officials of the department of fisheries are this week conducting a survey of the Burpee stream.

Harry Lynch, engineer of the fisheries department at Ottawa; James Catt, supervisor of fisheries for New Brunswick, and Inspector E. G. Hunter, were at the scene yesterday conducting a general survey.

The intention, if the survey proves successful, and the stream is accepted for experimental purposes, is to close the stream to the public for some years and to put in a dam. This experiment will be carried out in a similar way to the present agricultural lines, that is, if accepted, the stream will be set aside for experimental use. The probability is then that this stream or brook will be turned into a fish "farm" to propagate trout.

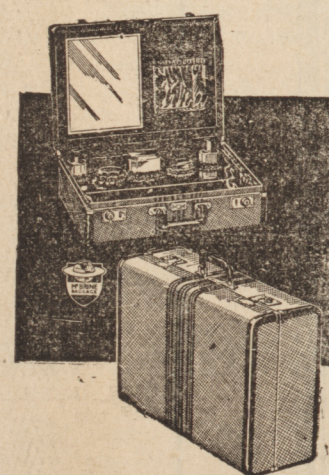

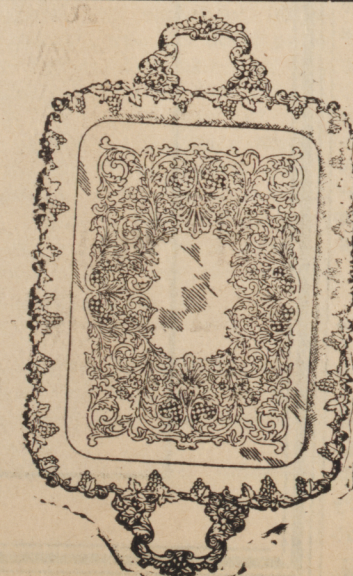
