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FREDERICTON EXHIBITION TO FEATURE SECOND CHILDREN'S DAY, LIVESTOCK PARADE ON SATURDAY

Children Up to 12 Years of Age Admitted Free on Last Day—Emphasis on Farmers Tomorrow—Big Day Today..

The big exhibition of 1936 reached its peak today with the largest crowd of the week and representative of all parts of the maritime provinces as well as many parts of the New England States, in attendance. Although set ahead one day, Free-For-All day today, promises to be one of the most successful single days in the exhibition's history. More than 5,000 witnessed the races yesterday and almost twice that number are expected to see today's races.

Tomorrow the final day of the 1936 exhibition will be marked by the second Children's Day for boys and girls up to twelve years of age and accompanied by parents or guardians. The farming element will be accorded special attention too, and at two o'clock at the race track there will be the usual monster parade of livestock in front of the grandstand.

Large number flocked to the fair-ground today for what should prove to be the biggest day of the week. A great number of visitors have been on the fair grounds during the past two days, and there are many New England automobiles in the city this week. The hotels have been kept busier than they've been for a long time.

Yesterday's fine weather continued today, although the Weatherman saw to it that it was a bit more chilly. Judging is expected to be completed in all departments today.

The midway was in full swing last night as hundreds swarmed through the fair grounds and in and out of the buildings. This year's midway is more interesting and entertaining than last year's and satisfaction is expressed on every side. The Open Air attractions were repeated at the race track last night, and another large crowd attended.

The sixty-odd farmers and farmerettes who came from the western part of the province to be present at the Fredericton Exhibition were entertained yesterday both at the fair grounds and at the Dominion Experimental Station. Yesterday they were taken about the fair grounds and last night were guests of the directors at the Open Air attractions. Yesterday they were shown about the Experimental Station and later participated in special contests and public speaking, and recitations at a programme carried out in the residence of the agricultural school. The programme was in charge of Stanley Wood, of the Department of Agriculture. These young people members of boys' and girls' clubs, will be similarly entertained today.

BRITISH REGIMENTS, BANDS

Yesterday The Daily Mail contained an article about the Fredericton Exhibition of 1852. Prominent in the celebrations marking that event, were the officers and men, the pipers and the regimental band of the 72nd Highlanders. The late Charles Sterling Brannen, then a boy fifteen years old, used to speak of the occasion frequently in later life. Citizens who remember the late Mr. Brannen recall very clearly how well versed he was in matters pertaining to British Regiments and their Bands and it is particularly interesting to note that his grandson, Charles Brannen, has for two years been a member of the Seaford Highlanders, an Imperial Regiment composed of the former 72nd Highlanders and the former 78th Highlanders. Charles, now sixteen years old, is a son of Sterling Brannen, of this city, and is training to be eligible to join the Battalion Band when eighteen. The officers and men of this Battalion recently marched the sixty miles from their quarters in Doven Castle to Crowborough, Sussex, to take part in manoeuvres.

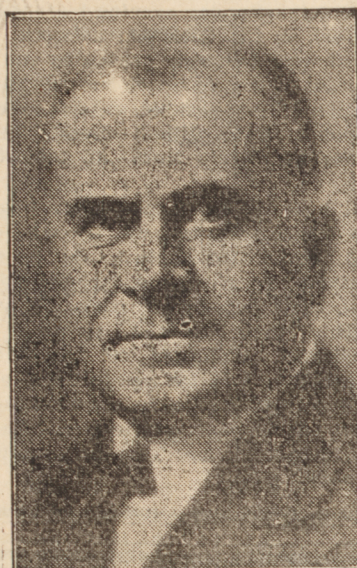

Minister of Fisheries for Canada

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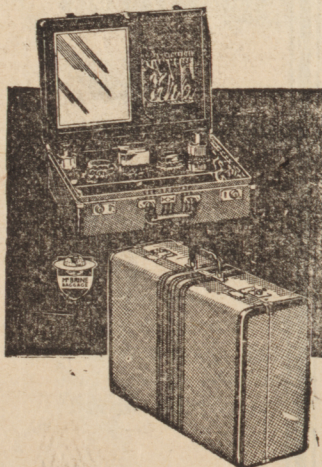
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APPEAL COURT RESUMED HERE THIS MORNING

Leave to Appeal in the Richard Murphy Case Asked

Adjournment to Sept. 25

Young Men Admitted as Barristers and Solicitors

A number of young men were admitted and sworn as barristers and solicitors as the Appeal Court resumed here this morning. H. Lester Smith, registrar of the Supreme Court presented them and read the oaths to them. J. Norman W. Winslow of Woodstock was granted readmission to the bar.

Leonard C. Jones, Moncton, applied for leave to appeal against the conviction of sentence in the case of Richard Murphy who pleaded guilty on September 10 on a charge of unlawfully receiving a sum of money, knowing it to be stolen. Murphy is now a prisoner in the Westmorland County goal. The grounds for the appeal are that the defendant has a good defense in law and could not have been convicted of the offense charged. Also it was claimed that he was not represented by defense counsel and that he misunderstood the charge and did not appreciate the nature of the charge. Furthermore, the accused did not intend to admit that he was guilty and that generally there has been a miscarriage of justice.

This application for appeal together with the appeal for bail was set over until Friday, September 25. Chief Justice Baxter, Mrs. Justices Grimmer and Harrison presided.
