SEVEN ACE AMATEURS TO COMPETE IN ALL-STAR SHOW

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Picked from the cream of the crop, seven outstanding fledgling performers will be recalled in an "All Star Amateur Contest," which Stoopnagle and Budd will present as a feature of the Town Hall Tonight broadcast over the NBC-Red Network on Wednesday, August 19, at 9.00 p.m. A.S.T.

The seven whose performance marked them as leaders of the amateur parade that has been going on at the Old Town Hall for more than a year and a half will compete for a special cash prize of \$100.

Lovely Jean Rowe, English born impersonator and songstress now employed as a Jersey City typist, will be among the lucky seven. She will give imitations of Zasu Pitts, Mae West, Katherine Hepburn and Garbo, finishing up with the song "Welcome Stranger." She was a prize winner in June last year. Another young winner getting a new break will be

Norma Rugo, the darkeyed Italian dressmaker, who studies opera on the side. She won first prize June 3rd, singing a Scherzo from Puccini, which she will repeat.

Outstanding among the young men will be Brook Paige and Sparkie Springfield, East Orange, N. J., lads who have already appeared twice in Town Hall. After their triumph in the March 25th contest, they were recalled by Fred Allen for a special Boy Scout spot. They play one of radio's strangest duets with the tuba and the piccolo.

Other scheduled amateurs include Carl Vossberg, City College of New York student and pianist, who won first prize January 15; Herbert Bernfield, Elizabeth, N. J., saxophonist, March 11th winner; Raymond Janis, Hollywood, Calif., impersonator, winner of April 29; and Dick Vernon, Manhattan baritone, who won on November 20 of last year.

Earle Spicer Once Arrested For Talking 'Unknown Language'

HALIFAX, Aug. 19.—Earle Spicer, the internationally famous radio and concert pianist, who is starred on the Radio Commission programme "Music to Remember" broadcast each Wednesday at 9.00 p.m. A.S.T. from the Halifax studios, has had numerous amusing experiences.

Once, in London, at a very grand reception, he gave his name "Earle Spicer" to the butler who, thinking him to be one of the nobility, at once very pompously and in loud voice announced him as "His Lordship The Earl of Spicer."

Another time when he was touring Canada, he had as his pianist Prince George Chavchavdze. They registered at a hotel in one of the leading western cities and the next morning the following notice headed the society news: "The Earl and Countess of Spicer are registered at the Hotel. The Countess, we hear, has a very beautiful baritone voice."

He was arrested in England just after the war broke out because he was heard by some of the country people talking in an "unknown language" in a field near his maestro's summer studio. Later the manuscript found upon his person proved to be the words of one of the Arias from Rigoletto, in Italian, which he was memorizing.

So Himber Surrendered His Own Song

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—A year ago Richard Himber dashed himself off a tailor-made tune. It was "Monday in Manhattan," specially written to serve as a theme song for the Himber Monday broadcasts over NBC.

Proudly Dick rehearsed his boys till they could play the melody smoother than satin. People who heard it said it had everything, particularly sophistication—which is Himber's byword.

Then, suddenly, The Studebaker Champions were shifted to a Friday spot. Rather than spoil his song by changing the lyrics Himber abandoned it to the music publishers. Some day, he thought, he might get a Friday theme song inspiration.

The trouble was, nothing Maestro Himber could think up quite equalled "Monday in Manhattan." The more he thought about that song the more he mourned it.

So imagine his rejoicing last month when the Champions were shifted once again and this time to Monday evenings. The time is 9.30 p.m. A.S.T. over the NBC-Red Network.

"Get out that theme song. We can use it now!" Himber told his No. 1 arranger. There was a grin on his face from ear to ear. That is—until the arranger came back with the news that another Monday night broadcaster has appropriated the tune. According to radio ethics Himber surrendered his own song.

Insurance Companies Decline Movie Risk

REVELSTOKE, Aug. 19.—Richard Arlen caught a train. As a matter of fact he caught the same train twice—which should be considered unusual news but it is even more so when it is known that, because of the dangerous mode employed, he could not secure insurance coverage for the feat.

The occurrence, as it took place in the filming of "The Great Barrier," transcontinental railway construction epic of Canada now being made here by a Gaumont British unit, consisted of a flying leap from a galloping horse to old C. P. R. engine No. 374 to warn the engineer of impending disaster. Arlen, star of the picture, tried to secure insurance against injury or death before essaying the stunt but his application was rejected as too risky.

The screen veteran went through with it successfully, however, performing an excellent "catch" of the engine before the cameras. Much to his chagrin and mental discomfort, he had barely recovered from the tricky ordeal when he heard the request of "once again please, Mr. Arlen" from Milton Rosmer, director of the picture. Which he did.
