The woman's name I never learned... the man was 'Soapy' Smith, notorious bad man of the north—gambler and thug—who within a month was to die a violent death at the hand of one of the vigilants organized to rid the town of the lawless element."

Interesting Lecture to Science Club

A very well attended meeting of the Science Club was held in the Geology Building of the University, about 40 members and guests being present, the meeting being additionally marked by a visit from His Honour the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. MacLaren.

The meeting was opened by the president, Wm. Kesson, in the chair, and the minutes of the preceding meeting were read and adopted. The ballot on the membership of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Pond was then taken and they were unanimously received into the club membership. The nominating committee then presented its report and the following slate of officers were duly elected: President, W. A. Haines; First Vice-President, Mrs. J. Brown Maxwell; Second Vice-President, W. H. Moore; Secretary-Treasurer, G. Alvah Good. The House Committee were requested to arrange for any necessary changes in personnel independently of club action.

The newly elected president was then inducted in the chair by Mr. Kesson with some graceful words of thanks to the club for the co-operation given him during his incumbency. The new president then called on the speaker of the evening, Dr. Alfred G. Bailey, Assistant Curator of the Provincial Museum, who delivered a very carefully prepared lecture on the life of General James Wolfe and the sieges of Louisbourg and Quebec. He presented a most interesting mass of details about this officer, probably the most interesting personality among the galaxy concerned in the early history of Canada. It would be presumption to attempt to select outstanding items from such a collection of matched gems, but it might be appropriate for your scribe to justify the inclusion of a discourse of historical nature in a scientific programme, which a loose understanding of the nature of science has slightly divorced one from the other. H. G. Wells, in the introduction to "The Outline of History," says: "Science, in its widest and properest sense including history and signifying a clear vision of man in relation to the things about him."

On conclusion of the address His Honour spoke briefly in appreciation of the address and of the work of the Provincial Museum was doing in its sphere of educational extension service, which is conceded to be of great benefit to rural schools and centres limited in the educational material so freely provided by the museum. A vote of thanks to the speaker was moved by W. M. Kesson and extended by the new president in well-chosen phrases. At the conclusion of the lecture the members of the Club were entertained by Dr. and Mrs. C. C. Jones at their residence at the University. Mrs. A. C. Porter presided over the tea cups and the hostess was assisted by Mrs. D. J. McLeod and Mrs. Leslie Wood.

Before taking up the subject matter of his address Dr. Bailey gave some information on the New Brunswick Museum. He said: "As a provincial institution the New Brunswick Museum is endeavoring to give a province-wide service along educational lines. The function of a museum as an integral part of an educational system is becoming increasingly recognized in the more advanced centres of civilization in the western world today. Dr. Bailey's lecture will appear in The Daily Mail on Monday."

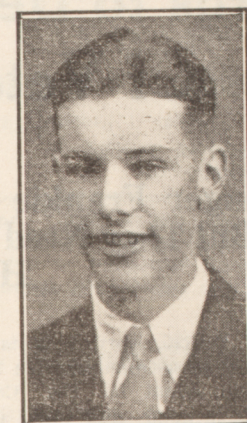
