## STUDY METHODS TO COMBAT THE FOREST PARASITES

Entomological Experts Inspect Damage Done to the Forests

### To Control Sawfly

To Introduce Parasites to Control Foliage-Eating Fly

Entomological experts from England and Ontario were in Fredericton Saturday, making a personal study of damage done to the forests in Eastern Canada by the spruce sawfly and the balsam woolly aphid.

Dr. W. R. Thompson, of the Farnham royal laboratory in Buckinghamshire, England; Dr. Arthur Gibson, Dominion Entomologist, Ottawa; and A. B. Baird, superintendent of the parasite laboratory, Belleville, Ont., left Saturday night for Montreal. They will then go to Toronto.

With R. L. Balch, in charge of the local entomological laboratory, they have just completed a survey of forested areas in the Gaspé Peninsula, where the sawfly has destroyed a large section of spruce growth. The saw fly, which has infested large sections of Eastern Canada forests, will be combated with other insects, imported from the laboratory of parasite introduction of the Imperial Institute of Entomology, in charge of Dr. Thompson. The aphid, which has destroyed sections of Nova Scotia and southern New Brunswick will be combated by the same method.

Between Gaspé and Temiskaming lies a vast area of forest in which the foliage-eating fly may have established itself without being observed. Governments and private enterprise have 1,400 men in the area looking for its presence.

The sawfly, in appearance about halfway between a small bee and a house fly, lays eggs in the needles of spruce trees. The eggs hatch, a small green caterpillar emerges and eats the needles. The caterpillar grows rapidly, eats until the autumn then falls to the ground and makes a cocoon. Under favorable circumstances the insects multiply with great rapidity.

The department of agriculture is striving to introduce effective parasites to control the Sawfly, breeding them in its laboratory at Belleville, Ont., and seeking to establish them in the forest where they will prey on the caterpillars and cocoons.

The difficulties of the method, it is pointed out, lie in the fact the sawfly has been increasing at an incalculable rate for several years and is firmly established in a favorable environment. The parasites, on the other hand, start far behind numerically and must spread over a huge area if they are to attack with enough force to decimate the pest.

## OLD AGE PENSION CHECKS READY BY LAST OF JULY

Appoint Special Auditor to Examine Records and Checks

\$8,000 to Be Issued

Municipalities' Burden Lightened—Changes in Pensioners Each Month

The old age pensions board are putting on an extra spurt getting ready for the issuing of the first batch of Old Age Pensions which will go out from this office here about the last of the month.

Robin F. Randolph of this city has been engaged as special auditor to check up the records and the outgoing checks. It is understood that in the vicinity of \$8,000 in cash and checks will be issued. As more than 1,000 of those receiving the pension checks in New Brunswick are either on relief or are inmates of different municipal homes, the issuing of these checks will lighten the burden on the different municipalities.

It is stated by the pension authorities that where an inmate of the municipal home is entitled to a pension the check is made payable to the county authorities who deduct the amount of the board of such an inmate and turn him over the balance from his pension check.

It is stated that the largest number of checks will go to Gloucester and Northumberland counties, as there are more pensioners in these counties than elsewhere. Too early yet to ascertain the number of pensioners in the different municipalities throughout the province, the amounts of the checks will vary according to the needs of the different applicants.

Since the applications have started to come in several months ago several older applicants must have passed away and this will naturally occur from month to month. At the same time there will always be a new crop of pensioners who will have reached the required age limit.

## OROMOTO SITE FOR A MODERN SUMMER HOTEL

Local Promoters, American Capitalists Examine Locations

\$75,000 Cost

Golf, Tennis, Dancing and Summer Theatre Features

It is understood that a company composed of some local people and also of some United States capitalists have been looking over the ground at Oromoto with the view of starting a large summer hotel which would appeal to the travelling public, especially those from across the border. While those interested are very reticent about discussing the matter, it is understood that they have quietly been looking over sites in the vicinity of Oromoto village.

It is understood that the plans for the hotel would include the laying out of a large golf course, also several tennis courts. A separate building, which would embrace a dance pavilion and a summer theatre, such as is found in resorts across the line, would be included. These attractions together with a fleet of motor boats and yachts, which would ply both on the St. John river and the beautiful Oromoto stream, are also among the attractions outlined by one of the prospective promoters.

It is understood that the project would run in the vicinity of \$75,000.

If the contemplated project is through, work on the hotel will be started sometime in the fall with the idea that work on the building will be far enough advanced to allow work on the interior during the winter, so as to permit opening of the hotel early next season.

### DROWNING VICTIM

The remains of the late Robert Williamson, Toronto tourist and drowning victim, were taken to Fredericton Junction yesterday afternoon and put aboard the C.P.R. train bound for Toronto, where the funeral will be held. Mrs. Williamson and her two year old son Robert, left for Toronto on the same train. Mr. Williamson had hired a boat from Charles Williams, caretaker of the West End beach, Tuesday afternoon. It was about four o'clock when Mr. Williams last saw him, a short distance above the beach. His body was discovered Saturday afternoon in a fish net near St. Mary's. Mrs. Williams and her son had been staying with Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Cooper, George Street, since the victim's disappearance. An uncle and a cousin of the drowned man arrived here over the weekend.

## LOCAL C.N.R. OFFICE ABOUT 80 YEARS UNDER TWO MGRS.

Only Two Men Had Charge for Greater Part of Century

When the centenary of the telegraph is observed here tomorrow, night, F. B. Smith, retired manager of the Canadian Telegraph, will return to the key once again and will link up with some of the old-timers who were the operators of his day.

As stated in The Daily Mail a few days ago these include: C. W. McKee, district superintendent at St. John; Fred M. Bailey, also of St. John; A. C. Morrison, retired superintendent of Charlottetown, P. E. I.; and George Laidlaw, Halifax. Mr. Smith entered the service in 1883, with the old Western Union Telegraph Company. He was transferred to Fredericton in 1894 on the death of the late J. B. Byrne and continued as manager of this office until 1933 with the exception of a few months spent in the west.

In connection with the Fredericton office it is interesting to note that for nearly 80 years the office was under the control of two managers. The late Mr. Byrne was the first manager and continued for over 40 years. On his death Mr. Smith took the office over and carried on for 39 years. This is probably a unique record.
