City Council Adopts Prepayment Taxes Plan Again

Decided That Plan Moderately Successful Last Year --- Ald. Dr. Ross Suggests Enlargement of Idea to Include Quarterly Discount Periods --- Matter of Hockey and Skating For Children Up---Relief For Winter Mooted.

The city council at its December committee meeting in the mayor's office of the city hall last night, with Mayor G. Willard Kitchen in the chair discussed the matter of a rink for skating and hockey for school children, the matter of city relief for the winter months, the new Board of Trade building, the prepayment of taxes plan which was in force part of the present year and which was advised to be put in force again next year, as well as other matters.

Ralph Albrant, secretary of the local Y.M.C.A., appeared before the council and asked that the council grant the same sum last year to provide for school boy hockey and skating. The grant for this last year was \$200 and the children utilized the Arctic rink on Saturday mornings and part of the afternoon. This year, the council learned, Lawson Hanson, the rink manager wants \$300 for the work. The suggestion was made that an openair rink be used instead, and Mr. Albrant said he was quite agreeable to this if it could be arranged, although he declared that the indoor rink arrangement would be better for

the children and also for their control. An openair rink would require a heated dressing room and a caretaker, and it would be generally more inconvenient. The children themselves favor an indoor rink.

After discussion on the matter the council passed a motion, moved by Ald. Hagerman and seconded by Ald. Doohan that a committee of Aldermen Crowdon, Forbes and Ross look into the matter of such a skating rink. They were given power to act. Mr. Albrant pointed out that last year 23 teams were engaged in hockey on Saturday mornings, and ten games were played each Saturday at the Arctic rink. Last year the city donated \$200 for this cause.

Prepayment of Taxes Worked Well

A motion was passed, moved by Ald. McCaughey and seconded by Ald. Forbes that the Prepayment of Taxes plan, which was in force for several months of this year, be adopted again for next year, to come into effect on January 2, with the same discount rate of four per cent.

Discussion was held on the matter and Ald. Dr. B. R. Ross suggested that if the plan had worked out successfully last year that a plan might be adopted whereby the discount period should be a quarterly one. This would help out the majority of the people and not the few "affluent" ones, he thought. He believed it would make easier payments quarterly and would mean more money for the treasury. He suggested that this be embodied in this year and that it was a good thing to look into. The council promised to consider the idea further.

It was pointed out that the Prepayment of Taxes plan had meant a saving for the city, that it was moderately successful, in the light of the fact that the plan had only been in practice a part of the year.

Minor Irregularity

The tri-partite agreement between the city, provincial government and federal government whereby the city had gone ahead with curbing and paving work last year was brought up by Mayor Kitchen. He said that the federal authorities had found there had been a slight irregularity and that the city had completed a small amount of work which had not been agreed upon. The total cost of this extra work had been \$562.41, and the federal government asked that one-third of it, \$140.60 should be returned to the federal authorities. On motion of Ald. McCaughey a motion was passed that this sum be refunded as requested.

City Owns Board Trade Bldg.

A motion was passed, moved by Ald. Forbes and seconded by Ald. Hagerman, that the Board of Trade be given an additional grant of \$300 for another year, contingent on the agreement that the new board of trade building be deeded to the city with all bills paid, that is, with a clear title. It was suggested by Mayor Kitchen that next year the city have a thorough understanding with the Board of Trade on expenses and grants.

Ald. McCaughey on behalf of the Roads and Streets department asked that the city treasurer be authorized to call tenders for the supplying of 3,500 cubic yards of gravel, which was passed on motion.

A motion was passed, moved by Ald. Crowdon and seconded by Ald. Forbes that the Water and Sewerage committee be empowered to buy 25 new meters at an approximate cost of \$12 each, for new houses which were going up.

Ald. Dr. Ross asked that the city purchase two new transformers which was passed as a motion, the transformers to be bought early in the new year.

A discussion on the lighting of Wilnot Park led to the opinion that the lights should be left on during the winter months, as a necessity to the citizens who had to walk through the park to their homes.

Relief Costs Lower

A report on direct city relief was presented, showing that the total expenditure during November, 1936, was \$443.77, while in November of last year the total expenditure was \$1,141.49. In October the cost had been \$408.32. Dependents in November 1936 numbered 73, while heads of families numbered 23.

Ald. Ross posed the question of relief for the winter months. He wished to know what the city was going to do about relief during the winter. He understood the provincial government had discontinued relief. The matter

There, service was conducted by Mr. Ernest Doherty, assisted by Commissioner Pugh, who gave the address, on the Scout Promise. At the close of the address, all the Rovers and Scouts present repeated the Scout promise. Special lessons were read, and Mr. Doherty welcomed the visitors to the church, in a few well chosen words.

For a month past, Doaktown has had a new Scout Troop consisting of eight chosen boys, who last Thursday took the Investiture from their Scout Master, Principal Hiltz of the Superior School. Now that this Troop has been so established, we look for a big increase in membership, in the near future. A Pack of Wolf Cubs has also been running, for the past month, at Nelson Hill, near Doaktown, under Principal Arden Doak, of the local school.

On motion the sum of \$1,000 was moved to be paid on account to the Victoria Public Hospital. The motion was seconded by Ald. Crowdon. The expense balance for the year was \$4,459.30, of which the city has already paid \$3,000.

MUNICIPAL AUDIT

The Brampton Ratepayers' Association, by indicating their desire to have a municipal audit conducted by a firm of chartered accountants, show not only that they are alive to the importance of proper accounting in municipal affairs, but also that they are aware of their own rights as shareholders in the municipal business. Because municipal shareholders are continually paying money into their enterprise instead of receiving dividends from it, they are apt to overlook the fact that efficient accounting is as much the backbone of a successful municipal business as it is the backbone of a factory or department store. Yet, when one considers the many types of payments for which a town or city is responsible, it becomes obvious that municipal accounting is as complicated a subject as accounting in any commercial pursuit.

No business, when it is handling sizable sums of money, is content to let the accounting run itself. Directors of successful companies realize that there is much more to accounting than simple book-keeping. A company's books will show whether it is making or losing money; but an efficient accounting system will show how profits may be increased or losses avoided.

In suggesting that the municipality should have its books audited by a chartered accountant, it is not intended by the members of the Ratepayers' Association to imply that any negligence will be found in the present conduct of the town's affairs. But a chartered accountant, who, by training and experience, is qualified to give advice based on the best practice in other municipalities and other types of business, can frequently suggest improvements or point out defects that might easily be missed by those whose time is fully occupied in keeping the books.

The regular audit of a town's accounts by expert accountants may be justly compared to the regular physical examination which many individuals find it advisable to undergo. If they get off with a clean bill of health, the reassurance is worth the doctor's fee. If, on the other hand, the physician finds signs of incipient illness, his advice may save much larger medical expenditures. It may be noted that individuals who take this precaution choose as their advisers those who are qualified to advise them. Similar action is indicated in the case of a town's financial health.—Brampton Conservator.

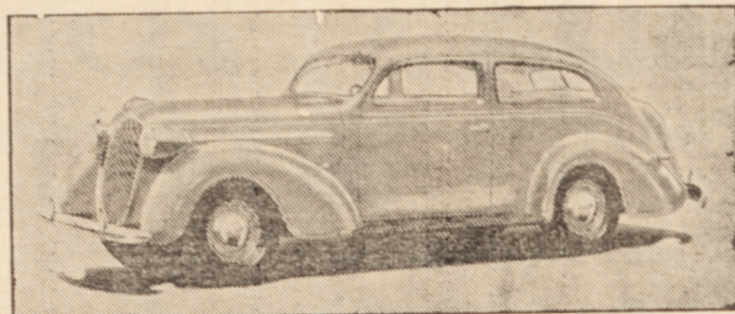
