Our Police Service

For several months past, from time to time reports have been given out about robberies and burglaries having taken place. In one instance different business places along Queen Street were reported to have been entered, and the police were busy nightly chasing the supposed burglars over roofs and through back yards. Then nothing more was heard of the incident. Some days ago the police were called to a house in the lower end of the city to catch a burglar. Although the burglar was almost in sight, waiting, and although they are said to know who he was, no arrests have yet been made. Perhaps they are waiting for him to come in and lay his cards on the table, alongside of the checker board, and to give himself up.

Now a man up-town reports that his house has been broken into and five hundred dollars stolen. Will they get their man, or will they not? The police are good at picking up pups weighing a pound or more, but are not so strong on grappling the big police dogs. No one can blame them very much for shying at the big dogs, and so long as they can report the arrest of a dog and do not have to give the weight and measurements, they can get by all right and not spoil their nice uniforms with the white piping. The boys on the force are nice fellows and they have to take their orders from the chief. The chief likes to follow the line of least resistance and will not fall over himself acting promptly even when someone gives him a clue. The matters have to be done with dignity and so on, and in the meantime the whole thing drops. The chief is not responsible to the City Council nor to the citizens whom the Council represents. He is responsible only to the Police Commission. The Police Commission is not responsible to the City Council nor to any other person, so that it works out that the public has nothing to say about the police force and what it does, or does not do.

This is the situation which the public is faced with today in regard to their police force, which they pay. The public has to put up many times with inconveniences and sometimes with discourtesy in their dealings at the police office and at the police magistrate's office. This should not have to be tolerated by the public who are paying the salaries and fees which give these people their bread and butter.

The only remedy by which entire satisfaction can be had with the city police system and the police force is to do away with the Police Commission, which is a useless organization, and put the force under the administration of justice committee of the City Council. This body is elected by the people and is responsible to

No body of citizens should be compelled to put up with the present arrangements. No self-respecting body of citizens would put up with it, but we have apparently got into a rut and while we kick we let things go to blazes. This is true of the citizens and the City Council also.
