tional Railways, in an address delivered before the Commercial Travelers Association, annual banquet, held at the Royal York Hotel.

In touching upon the railway's development of Canada as a commercial entity, Mr. Gardiner drew attention to the fact that the pioneer steam roads not only created new centres of distribution but likewise offered facilities whereby pioneer districts were opened for settlement.

"By shortening distances," he added, "they brought the people of the different parts of the country into closer contact. These closer contacts brought about better understanding. Due to this one may claim, with justice, that the railways made possible the Confederation which gave us a Dominion from sea to sea, at whose eastern and western gates lie two great oceans."

Stressing the public-mindedness on the part of the railways, Mr. Gardiner concluded by stating that the passing years have brought about great changes in operation and important improvements and that these changes and improvements are continuing and are never ending. The acid test of any institution, he said, is the

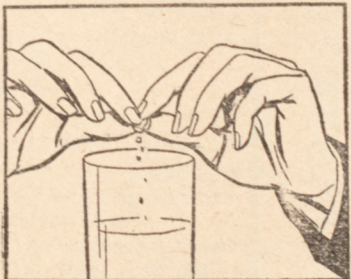

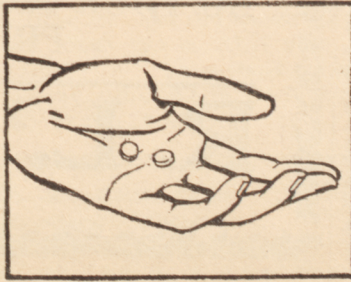
