## "AGGRAVATING AGATHA" OF CFNB CONCLUDES SUCCESSFUL SEASON

Mary Grannan, Author and in Title Role, Has Had Remarkable Career

(The second in a series of intimate close-ups of CFNB personalities.)

"Aggravating Agatha," that comic presentation of CFNB, completes a three months' period with tonight's performance. Knowing the popularity of this 'domestic sketch,' The Daily Mail takes pleasure in introducing the cast to its readers.

The cast—Agatha, Mrs. Van Smythe and Ignatius—was resting after a strenuous rehearsal. The scripts were tossed aside, the sound effects were back in place and the mikes were silent; preparation for the last episode had been completed and all were in a reminiscent mood.

It seems that during the Education Week in February, 1935, the Misses Grannan and Davis presented a joint discussion of an educational policy. Instead of the cut and dried paper that usually was read, the two teachers presented a dialogue. The originality and the success of the scheme appealed to J. Stewart Neill, manager of CFNB, and in tune with his progressive policy he kept the incident in mind for future use.

### Mrs. Van Smythe Summoned

When Miss Grannan came to the CFNB manager with a number of original features, he picked two, the Musical Scrap Book and Aggravating Agatha. The cast for the latter consisted of two—the maid and the mistress. Miss Davis was immediately summoned for the part of Mrs. Van Smythe and several episodes were rehearsed.

The Musical Scrap Book is presented by the station and when Valley Motors Limited were approached by the author to sponsor "Agatha," the executive of that firm agreed at once and even requested Miss Grannan to lengthen her skit from five to ten minutes.

In Miss Grannan's own words, "Agatha was born on January 21st, and on April 21st went on the air."

### Asked for Ignatius

"What about Ignatius?" your reporter asked. "The sponsors insisted on a man's voice in the programme and more than that, insisted on Carl Watson's," was the reply of the

author. Further, since an automobile dealer was backing the programme it was thought that the male voice would "get the male listeners." "But we learned differently," and Mrs. Van Smythe and her maid Agatha looked meaningfully in the direction of the tall, blonde, popular announcer known to everyone as 'Hap' and told me of the female fans that have written in for the free picture.

This feature has to do with Agatha so the intimate glimpses of Gertrude Davis (Mrs. Van Smythe and the Birthday Lady) and Ignatius, the chauffeur or Carl Watson will have to wait.

Mary Grannan, known to listeners as "Agatha," was born in Fredericton. After attending St. Dunstan's and Fredericton High schools, she went to the Provincial Normal School and obtained her teacher's license. But art is her first and real love, so a Boston Art school was the next scene of activity. She is a cartoonist, can do illustrations and sketches, writes, directs and acts in plays.

A short time ago the Hospital Aid held an amateur night and one of Miss Grannan's pupils received first prize with a poem written and directed by her teacher.

### Successful Writer

The play at St. Dunstan's Hall this spring was directed by Miss Grannan; also she took the leading role and wrote the specialties for the production. At present she is teaching in the Devon Superior school and in line with her dramatic accomplishments had composed every one of the examination day exercises. The I.O.E. "Echo," has published one of her plays, and the "Educational Review" has had articles on teaching theories by this versatile artist.

Why was the name Agatha chosen? "Because it fitted the aggravating disposition of the maid," the author laughingly explained, and "Mrs. Van Smythe has just the nature and Ignatius the sense of humor to put up with her carryings-on."

This, then, is the story behind "Aggravating Agatha." The feature has had a most successful following and judging by the way the requests for the autographed photographs of the cast are coming into the programme sponsors, Valley Motors Ltd. will present with pleasure Mrs. Van Smythe, Agatha and Ignatius in September.

HEPBURN SAYS ONTARIO DEBT DOWN \$16,000,000

BRAMPTON, Ont., July 21—The debt of the province of Ontario will be \$16,000,000 less than it was a year ago when the budget is brought down Premier Mitchell Hepburn told 3,000 Liberals of Peel county at a picnic here tonight.

Hydro rates will be reduced by \$6,000,000 within the next few months as the result of savings effected by the government and the Hydro Commission, the premier said. All power consumers in the province would benefit by the passing on of this saving.

"I said during the general election of 1934 I hoped to make this province a bit better place to live in," he declared. "Much remains to be done, but I feel we, as a government, have made progress. Much abuse has been piled on my head and on the heads of my colleagues for what our opponents call repudiation of contracts. I have no apologies to make. Were I faced with the same situation tomorrow, I would do it again."
