HEPBURN SAYS ONTARIO DEBT DOWN \$16,000,000

BRAMPTON, Ont., July 21-The debt of the province of Ontario will be \$16,000,000 less than it was a year ago when the budget is brought down Premier Mitchell Hepburn told 3,000 Liberals of Peel county at a picnic here tonight.

Hydro rates will be reduced by \$6,000,000 within the next few months as the result of savings effected by the government and the Hydro Commission, the premier said. All power consumers in the province would benefit by the passing on of this

saving. "I said during the general election of 1934 I hoped to make this province a bit better place to live in," he declared. "Much remains to be done, but I feel we, as a government, have made progress. Much abuse has been piled on my head and on the heads of my colleagues for what our opponents call repudiation of contracts. I have no apologies to make. Were I faced with the same situation tomorrow, I would do it again."
