## A AND B CLUB'S REGATTA WILL BE BEST YET

Illuminated Display to Feature 1936 Sports

### Famous Sea Sled

Swimming and Diving Entries From Many Distant Points

Preparations for the two day monster regatta at the A & B Club's annual water sports, to be held Wednesday and Thursday, are rapidly nearing a head and the booths and streamers are being set up on the grounds of the club. "The biggest and best yet," was the statement of Alderman F. S. Mundle in an interview with the Daily Mail today. The feature of this year's regatta is to be an extensive illuminated display sponsored by the Maritime Electric Company. The entire grounds and waterfront are to be lighted with red, white and blue incandescent lamps. Others responsible for the success of the regatta are Donald F. Smith, president of the Club, Frank B. Osborne, Commodore G. Walter Kitchen and Kenneth Moore.

There will probably be close to 75 yachts and boats anchored in front of the club house and diving tower when the combined fleets of the royal Kennebecasis Yacht Club and the Saint John Power Boat Club arrive here. The crafts are expected to be in Fredericton by Wednesday night when the affair is to be formally opened.

Activities for the opening will include speed boat racing, a reception and dance in the clubhouse for the visiting yachtsmen and their friends and a band concert on Parliament Square.

Thirty beautiful trophies have been donated by various enthusiastic merchants and these together with other awards will spur the swimming and diving competitors on to greater effort. The entries for the various events are still coming in and not only is this to be a local event but the two challengers from British Columbia, from Maine and points in the Maritimes gives the event an international aspect.

Ald. Mundle told the Daily Mail that the famous Peterson speed boat from Maine has filed entry. It is supposed to be the fastest boat in this vicinity and will provide interesting and thrilling sport for sea sled fans.

## BUSY SEASON REPORTED HERE FOR BUILDERS

Prices in Advance of Last Season—Steadily Increasing

### 12 or 15 Years Ago

Tennyson MacDonald is Building, Maxwell to Build

It is understood that more than one person contemplating building here in recent months has been discouraged owing to the apparent inability to secure from many of the builders and local tradesmen any definite information as to when they can get to work and finish the building. This would seem to indicate that the builders have struck a busy season. It is said that the figures for completing a residence have gone up considerably since this time last year and that it costs at least a thousand dollars more to build an ordinary family residence now than it did in 1935. The indications are that there will be a further advancement in building prices before another year rolls around.

Many of those who contemplate building are now considering the advisability of starting in at any early date rather than waiting for another year. It is doubtful whether building prices will advance to the high figure which was reached 12 or 15 years ago when many of the present dwelling houses especially in the east end of the city were erected. A general advancement in prices however is looked for.

This would indicate that hard times as far as building activities are concerned seem to be at an end.

Tennyson MacDonald of the Dept. of Lands and Mines started building yesterday on the vacant lot adjoining the house owned and occupied by Prof. Myles Gibson on Winslow St. The house will be a 7 room 2 story structure with garage attached. It will be completed about October 1st, and will cost in the vicinity of \$4,000.

C. W. B. Maxwell of the Dominion Entomological Service is contemplating the erection of a home on Alexandria Street.

## DRIVE BEING MADE TO PREVENT INDIAN MEN DRINKING

Indian Agent Getting After Rubbie Brigade and Others

### To Prosecute Violations

Aims to Make Better Conditions in the Indian Reserves

D. Lee McCutcheon, the Indian Commissioner for this section is doing a good social work in cleaning up the liquor drinking among the Indians on the Reserve.

During the past several weeks it has been the habit of the Indians who are on the Indian list and therefore barred from buying liquor from the N. B. Liquor Control Board's store have members of the "rubbie brigade" purchase "fire water" for them in return for a few drinks. When these deplorable conditions were made known to the local Commissioner he resolved to investigate and have the trouble cleared up at once.

Following his policy for better living conditions among his charges, Mr. McCutcheon started prosecution at once. Several of the brigade who have been found guilty of this action have been prosecuted and others have been warned or scared away.

Mr. McCutcheon who has the betterment of the Indians at heart states that he will continue these prosecutions until the practice is stopped.

Reports from the various reservations show that since the appointment of this popular officer, conditions have been steadily improving.

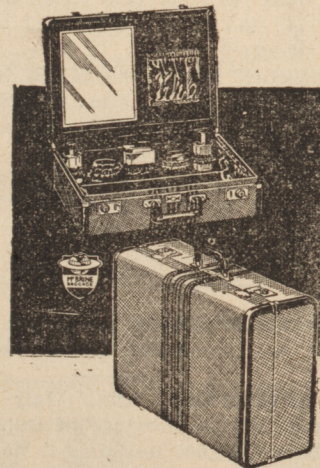

## MAN on the STREET

(By W. T. Whitehead)

Look in the Geography

The native New Brunswicker learns as a child that Fredericton is the capital of the province, the seat of the Provincial University and Normal School, has fine public buildings and wide streets shaded by old oaks. Also, that it is situated on the St. John river about eighty-four miles from its mouth and is not only a beautiful city but a stirring business center. All true, but how inadequate. One would think that the capital of the province deserved something more than this cold and aloof description now given it in the geography. Brevity of course is necessary. How to rewrite it? Well —

### Agricultural Center

The St. John River winding its tortuous path to the sea through lush hinterland and stately forest, passes no more lovely spot than Fredericton, ancient and beautiful capital of New Brunswick. In architecture, custom and thought this city mingles the old with the new, affording pleasant contrast. On Saturdays the farmers come to sell in the market sufficient produce to fill eight thousand and aching voids for another week, thus testifying to the fertile and productive country round about.

### Education, Etc.

The youth of the province pants after knowledge to the University on the hill or the Normal School by the river bank. Fat, sleek burghers plying from comfortable home to prosperous factory, warehouse or store, morning, noon and night, by car or afoot, pass through broad paved streets under high arching elms among which three hundred years ago flitted lithe brown figures, noiseless as shadows, covered with war-paint and carrying tomahawks and scalping knives, every now and then emitting war-whoops to let the enemy know exactly where they were.

### Government, Climate, Etc.

At the lower end of the business district are the Parliament Buildings. Here with chin on fist, in deep brown study, sit the law-makers, endlessly thinking up new good things for the people, and for variation entering into gentle and amicable argument with the Opposition, when sufficient opposition there is.

The climate, while not temperate, affords a wide range of sports from basking in the Summer's sun to long Winter evenings by the fire-side.

For 196 years has Fredericton sat beside the purling river, clinging to the old yet not disdaining the new, or, to quote Pope:

"Not the first by which the new is tried,  
Nor yet the last to lay the old aside."
