F'TON MAN GETS CONTRACT

According to an announcement from Ottawa today six contracts totalling \$76,763 have been awarded for public works. Four of the projects go to Ontario with one to New Brunswick, and one to Quebec. The New Brunswick contract goes to George A. Christie of this city, for the building of a customs and immigration building at Centreville, the contract price to be \$4,882.

REMAND UNTIL FRIDAY

Lawrence Cormier and Norman Lorette, of this city, appeared before Police Magistrate Walter Limerick yesterday in the police court, charged with entering a C.N.R. box car and stealing a quantity of ale and were given a remand until Friday at eleven o'clock in the morning. Neither was asked to plead. Arrest of the two was made on Sunday by C. N. R. police officer Wesley E. Bishop, as an aftermath of the "hijacking" attempt in the railway yards here over the weekend. In all six dozen bottles of beer were taken, most of which was recovered. The beer was a consignment to the N. B. Liquor Control Board here.

HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY OF F'TON MET LAST NIGHT

In spite of the inclement weather a large number of people inspected the gardens at the Dominion Experimental Station last evening before the regular monthly meeting of the Fredericton Horticultural Society. At the meeting, held in the college building, arrangements were made for weekly garden meetings during the summer. A special meeting was planned for mid-July when the Canadian Society of Technical Agriculturists will meet here. The meeting will probably be addressed by some of the members of the society. There was a general discussion on gardening and flower growing and seasonal conditions at last night's meeting. Information was given by Messrs. Harding, Young and Moore regarding protecting flowers against various parasites. George E. Howie, the president, occupied the chair.

Sister Susanne Formerly of F'ton Dies in Boston

Word has been received by Mrs. W. W. Hubbard or Burton of the death of her sister, Sister Susanne Margaret, Mother Superior of St. Margaret's Convent, Boston. Sister Susanne who passed away on June 15, had been Mother Superior of St. Margaret's Convent for twenty-five years. She was a daughter of the late Captain William O'Dell Gregory and Mrs. Gregory of Fredericton. One sister, Mrs. W. W. Hubbard, survives. Mrs. Fred C. Robinson of this city is an aunt, and Mrs. H. V. B. Bridges and Miss Edith Gregory are cousins of the late Sister Susanne. Sister Susanne visited Fredericton at different times and had many old friends here who will regret to hear of her death. She was a prominent member of the Anglican Sisterhood in the United States and her life was filled with good works and charitable deeds. The funeral took place at Boston.

PHONE CIRCUIT DISRUPTED BY STORM HERE

Heavy Wind Storm Here Bowls Over Poles, Breaks Branches

Landslide Reported

Newcastle Phone Service Temporarily Disrupted

Central New Brunswick was hit by a miniature mid-summer howler last evening, which consisted of heavy rainfall and an aggressive wind. More than an inch of rain fell during the night and early morning hours. This morning the wind still played tricks with the trees and there was intermittent rainfall. Within the city a pole or two belonging to the N. B. Telephone Company was bowled over by the wind, but one on Westmorland street being suspended over the sidewalk and being a menace to pedestrians. The N. B. Telephone Company report no serious damage caused by last night's storm, although the Newcastle circuit was reported to be temporarily disrupted this morning, about thirteen miles from this city. The possibility that a landslide caused by the rain, might have caused this, is being investigated today. The Maritime Electric Company this morning reported no damage caused by the rain and wind storm.

DREDGING WORK ENDS

The Garson Wrecking Company, which commenced dredging work on the Devon shore yesterday in order to give the derrick scow an opportunity to unload under more convenient circumstances, will complete its work this evening it was stated today by an official of the company. The object was to dredge between the first pier and the abutment on the Devon shore, where some difficulty had been experienced because of lower water.

No Action Yet Re Exclusion Of Transient Labor

Ald. H. Ralph Gunter, M.P.P., chairman of the Legislative committee of the Fredericton city council, at its special meeting last night presented a report respecting the excluding of transient labor from the city in connection with the rebuilding of the C.N.R. bridge here soon. He stated that the committee had decided against any action at the present time. Since the rebuilding of the bridge is assured and since there will be some little time yet before it will be under way he said the committee was against taking action that might bind the council for the future. Ald. Gunter felt that the railway would co-operate with respect to the hiring of local labor when the work commenced. In this connection he didn't anticipate any difficulty. A fee of \$10 for skilled labor is already in the by-laws regarding labor coming in from outside York county, and there is a tax of \$5 for unskilled labor. Should the desired co-operation not be secured from the railways when building commenced it would be an easy matter to put a by-law into effect, which would become law the same day, he said. Ald. Gunter made it clear, however, that the by-law applies only to those living outside the country. The council was unanimous in accepting the report, and Ald. Murray Hagerman praised Ald. Gunter and the committee for its work and its judgment.

John Morrison of Devon Sentenced to 3 Months' Jail

Adjourn Sitting

Two Civil Cases Set Over to September Term of Court

Judge A. R. Slipp in sentencing John Morrison, reminded him that found guilty June 9 on a charge of furious driving in Fredericton on April 19, causing actual bodily harm to Victor Collett, Springhill, was sentenced this morning to serve three months in jail, sentence to begin from June 9. He is already serving thirty days for being intoxicated. The two sentences are to run concurrently. Judge A. R. Slipp in sentencing John Morrison, reminded him that the charge was a serious one and that the actual penalty on such a charge is two years. Judge Slipp exacted a promise from Morrison to do his best to watch his behaviour in the future. Two civil cases which were on the docket of the court this morning, were set over until the September sitting of the court. Albert R. Murray is clerk of the court. This morning's court sitting was a postponement from May 5.
