## NEW YORKER THRILLED BY ANGLING HERE

Paul W. Richardson Got 8 Grilse and 15-Pound Salmon

### Many at Hart's Pool

'In Love With Province' Sportsman Tells The Daily Mail Reporter

After three delightful weeks spent in the province during which time he fished five different salmon streams and had five guides in his employ by turn, Paul W. Richardson, New York stock broker, left by auto this morning for a Maine resort where he will be joined by his wife and family and continue on to his home. Mr. Richardson's total catch was eight grilse and a fifteen pound salmon, the latter being taken at the Hart's Island pool on Tuesday. Before coming to Fredericton, Mr. Richardson spent a week on the Tobique, where he whipped the privately owned water of Ogilvy Brothers with Jock Ogilvy as guide. On arrival in Fredericton, he spent three days at the Hart's pool with Raymond Currie as guide, catching three grilse. He then proceeded to the Southwest Miramichi where he was joined by Guide Alex Price of Ludlow. Not having much success there because of the low state of the water, he continued on to Derby, where Guide David Manderville joined the party and they made a trip up the Little Southwest, which Mr. Richardson describes as "the wildest river in New Brunswick." They fished a famous pool twenty-five miles up the river, but had no success. From here a jump was made to Fred W. Fairley's camp above Boiestown where several grilse were taken. Monday of this week found the genial sportsman back at the Hart's Island pool, where he caught two grilse and lost another. On Tuesday he landed a fifteen pounder after a stubborn fight, and also a grilse. Yesterday afternoon he was successful in landing another grilse.

### Stream Lined Fish

Mr. Richardson has been making annual fishing trips to this province for six years, and never fails to have a good time with plenty of high class sport thrown in. "I am in love with your province," he told The Daily Mail, "and never let slip an opportunity to say a good word for it, and its big hearted people. My partner, Charles A. Campbell, is coming in a few days and plans to combine a fish-

## F.H.S. GRADUATE IS AWARDED I.O.D.E. BURSARY

Will Enter U. N. B. — Father Had Fine War Record

### \$1,200 Value

First Time New Brunswick Has Had Three Winners

Of the three I.O.D.E. bursaries awarded to New Brunswick this year Miss Burdette W. Harmon, daughter of Mrs. Burdette Harmon, teacher in the Fredericton High School was one of the winners. Miss Harmon popular and successful student at F. H.S. graduated from that school last June. She decides to enter the University of New Brunswick this fall and will read for a Bachelor of Arts degree with honors in English and French. Her father was the late Lieutenant Burdette W. Harmon, D.C.M., M.C., Russian Cross of St. George a distinguished aviator who was killed during the battle of Amiens. He has been listed among Kitchen's Great Heroes of the war. Both Miss Harmon's father and mother graduated from the University of New Brunswick, the late Lieutenant Harmon in 1912, and Mrs. Harmon also in that year. Their daughter will enter U.N.B. with the class of 1940.

This is the first year that three Bursaries have come to New Brunswick. Each has a value of \$1200 and is designed to enable sons or daughters of those killed or disabled in the great war to attend a Canadian university. After next year there will be no more eligible applicants.

The announcement of the three winners, Miss Florence Eileen Lund, Sackville; Miss Burdette Harmon, of Fredericton; and Wylie Carlyle Spicer, of Chatham, was made by Mrs. Kenneth I. Campbell, provincial educational secretary of the I.O.D.E. Others on the selection committee are Mrs. A. T. McMurray, Fredericton, president of the provincial chapter; Miss Alice Lockhart, of Saint John; Dr. H. E. Bigelow, Mount Allison University; and Dr. John Stephens, of U.N.B.

Premier Dystart Says Idea to End Relief By Business Stimulus

### To Make General Survey

All Cabinet Ministers Here For Meeting Today and Tonight

At a meeting of the provincial cabinet last night consideration was given the appointment of an official whose duty would be to make a general survey of industrial conditions throughout the province. Premier Dystart has not yet announced further details but he said that the official, when appointed, would make a careful study of New Brunswick industries with a view to creating a general stimulus in the promotion of local industries. "The idea," said Premier Dystart, "would be to try to end relief by stepping up industry." The scheme is following along the road to end relief in this province.

The cabinet did not meet this morning, the cabinet members being very busy at routine business. The government will, however, meet this afternoon and evening. Announcement of the new stumpage rates which have been under consideration by the department of lands and mines for some time, may possibly be made following today's session of the cabinet. All members of the government are here today.

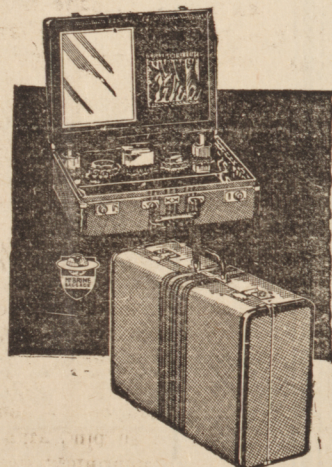
