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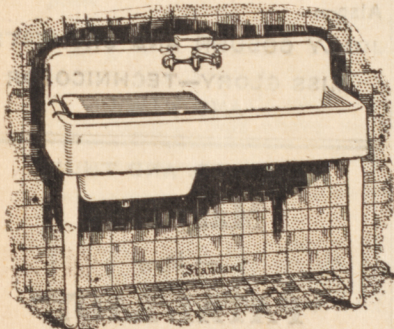

## JUDGE IS WORTH FIVE POETS FOR PENSIONS GRANT

### Analysis Following Premier Baldwin's Appeal For Literary World Shows Vast Differences.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—Speaking strictly on a cash basis, one judge is worth five poets in Great Britain.

This was discovered recently following Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin's appeal to the congress of the universities of the British Empire for more poets "to inspire the world with a new sense of unity and a sense of freedom."

"Great poets are scarce," he told delegates.

A writer here, however, brought to light the plight of Lady Watson, widow of Sir William Watson, last of the great Victorian poets, and once regarded as probable successor to Tennyson as poet laureate. She is emigrating with her two daughters because the £600-a-year pension granted by the Government will not enable them to live properly in England. The writer continues with a comparison of pensions:

"When a high court judge retires after 15 years' service, or because he is too ill to work, he gets a pension of £17,500 or £18,750 a year.

#### Judge Worth Five Poets

"The last finance accounts showed that the least well-pensioned of the former county court judges is getting about \$50 a week, and the best pensioned about \$100 a week. Is the debt of the nation to the most excellent county court judge, five or 10 times as great as to the poet, the painter or the scientist? Civil list pensions cost \$115,000 a year. Judicial pensions cost \$575,000 a year. One judge is worth five poets.

"Some of the cases we get are pitiful," James H. Blackwood told me recently. "We cannot give pensions; we can only make grants."

"W. H. Mallock, distinguished economist and novelist, a nephew of Anthony Froude, died in a parish infirmary a few months after semi-starvation had compelled him to apply for the civil list pension. He was awarded \$500 a year," the writer notes.

### WHAT A BOON, THIS NEW ICE AGE!

### Modern Methods of Refrigeration Keep Food Products Fresh and Crisp

It is days like these when thermometers run up by the hour that make us supremely thankful that we live in a new ice age. To ice and modern methods of refrigeration we owe the fact that food products arrive at the markets fresh and crisp, instead of wilted and drooping.

For the same reason and on account of the pasteurization process, our milk and cream keeps sweet and fresh, and no longer do we fear that they will be "turned" by a hard clap of thunder. Our home refrigerators, which are so far from the original ice box, whether they are automatic or the modern type, assures us that foods may be kept safely. We seldom hear today of food poisonings caused by left-overs.

Refrigerators are called upon to aid us in the preparation of dishes for the table as well as for the protection of foods. Into them we put soups, salads, and desserts to jelly into firm molds or to chill. In the automatic refrigerators we make frozen desserts. For these you may have discovered there are a number of bases which not only make the preparation easy, but as well produce a smooth product. I have been experimenting with a new liquid ice cream mix which comes in a number of flavors, including several fresh fruits, and have had satisfactory results. The creams are almost as

smooth as old-fashioned turned ice cream. The directions demand only one stirring, but a second mixing during the freezing is, in my opinion, an improvement.

Sweetened condensed milk also makes a good base for a cream which in some refrigerators will be quite smooth without any stirring, and even more so with one extra mix.

#### Vanilla Ice Cream

1 cup sweetened condensed milk.  
3/4 cup water.  
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla.  
Salt.

1 cup cream, whipped.

Mix milk and water, add vanilla and salt. Fold in whipped cream. Turn into freezing trays and freeze three to four hours.

#### Variation

Peppermint Ice Cream—Substitute mint flavoring for vanilla, and color with green coloring.

Bisque Ice Cream—Fold in one cup macaroon crumbs and freeze.

Coffee Ice Cream—Substitute strong coffee for the water.

Chocolate Ice Cream—Melt two squares of chocolate in double boiler. Add condensed milk and water. Stir until thick and smooth. Cool, add whipped cream and one teaspoon of vanilla.

Fruit Ice Cream—Substitute one and one-half cups finely crushed fruit for vanilla and reduce the water to one-half cup.

## TIMID CHILDREN OVERCOME SHYNESS BY UNDERSTANDING

Some children are like babbling brooks; talking incessantly, and having a never-ending flow of senseless ideas.

There are others who are slow to answer a question, simply staring at you, or even hiding their faces. They seem to live an inner life that never finds expression.

Children of this type are a problem in handling. Their silence may indicate depth of thought or feeling. On the other hand it may not. They may be shallow or deep. They may even be under-handed and untrue. If intelligent and healthy it is well to leave them alone.

In most instances, however, it is well to find out what causes their reticence and to unlock their lips.

There are children who have not the gift of conversation. They can often express themselves better by drawing. They must be encouraged and a friendly talk about their work will draw them out.

The shy child who is talented needs loving understanding and help on the part of his parents. You must assist him in finding himself.

The shy child, who is dull and uninteresting and perhaps nervous and in ill health, needs careful training in expression, books to read, wholesome play and careful watching for expression signs.

Remember, please, that children who are "squelched" may become shy. Shy children need training, in initiative and self-directed choice and responsibility.

Nothing helps shy children more than self-direction. It is the first step toward eliminating shyness. Parents find also that a steady allowance of spending money (or any other device for self-expression) with the responsibility for its use vested in the boys and girls themselves is a better training in self-mastery than for father or mother to decide at every step whether they should buy things or not.

## RECIPES

#### (Orange Blossom Punch)

One cup sugar syrup, 2 cups freshly brewed tea, 6 cups orange carbonated beverage, 1 sliced orange. Add sugar syrup to tea and pour over ice. Add orange beverage and garnish with orange slices. Makes two quarts.

#### (Russian Punch)

Four cups freshly brewed tea, four teaspoons raspberry jam. Sweeten the tea with the jam. Pour over cracked ice. Makes one quart.

#### (Cherry Ale)

One cup sugar syrup, 2 cups cherry juice, canned, 2 cups freshly brewed tea, 1 quart ginger ale. Add sugar syrup to cherry mixture and add ginger ale. Makes two quarts.

#### (Fruit Juice Punch)

Two cups fruit juice, 1 cup sugar. Two cups fruit juice, 1 cup sugar lemon thinly sliced. Combine fruit juice (any left over, canned or fresh), add sugar syrup and freshly brewed tea. Add thinly sliced lemon and cool. Pour over crushed ice. Garnish with thin slices of orange. Makes 1 1/2 quarts.

To add to the charm of these delicious drinks, freeze a few cubes of tea in the refrigerator. Use one or two of these tea cubes to furnish that necessary tinkle in each glass.

And here's another suggestion for you home makers. When you open a can of fruit, pineapple, peaches, pears, to make a salad or for use in desserts, why don't you save the juice? Put it in a jar and keep it in your refrigerator, then when you want a cool refreshing drink add a couple of quarts of freshly brewed tea and pour the liquid into tall glasses of tea.
