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## FREDERICTON RESIDENTS ARE HOME CONSCIOUS

### An Increase in Private Building Shown Hereabouts

#### English Settlement

### Cheaper to Build Than to Rent in Opinion of Laborer

Private building in this vicinity and throughout the province and in fact all over Canada is on the increase now that "things are on the upgrade," is the opinion in this section.

J. H. Kirk, manager of the Central Trust Co., of Canada's office here, states that while building has suffered during the past eight years, that at the present time it is on the upgrade. With business conditions slightly more stable, people are beginning to be home-conscious, and are beginning to build. The recent discussions and emphasis on the Dominion Housing scheme, has made more of the laboring classes conscious of homes. And the itch to build has struck Fredericton.

At the present time at English Settlement, a number of homes are in process of being erected. The foundations have been laid and by this fall, no fewer than six homes will be ready to be occupied. A number already have been completed, and still other lots in that vicinity have been spoken for, and homes will spring up like mushrooms during the next few years, is the probability.

#### Work Out Own Scheme

Strangely enough most of the English Settlement home builders are working under their own plans, and only one or two have taken advantage of the Dominion Housing plan. Undoubtedly, however, the Dominion Housing scheme stimulated building.

Generally the builders feel that it is cheaper to build their own homes than to continue to pay rent. The only handicap to this is the rate of taxes they will have to pay for their new homes. But this ominous note seems to have been forgotten in the new enthusiasm to own a home on the part of many in this city.

During the depression years—which are still hiding around that elusive corner—building suffered immeasurably. People here and everywhere were too busy trying to get around to eat and in paying bills to even think of building a home, but now that things are beginning to look a little brighter (according to St. James street), people are thinking once again of building homes.

Residential building increased during the month of August when contracts were let amounting to \$5,033,900, as compared with \$4,295,000 for July, according to Dominion Statistics. These favorable statistics augur well for the future and indicate the steady increase in private work, both actual and proposed.

#### CAR SWERVED AND HIT TREE

## NEW INDUSTRIES AND NEW PARK WERE DISCUSSED

### Devon Town Council Took These Matters Up at Meeting Saturday

#### New Park at S. Devon

### One Industry at North Devon, Larger One at South Devon

A special meeting of the Town Council of Devon held on Saturday evening discussed the matter of the proposed new industries in connection with which the town has been negotiating for some weeks. Speaking to The Daily Mail in regard to the matter Mayor A. J. McEvoy stated today that while the matter was discussed that no action was taken pending the completion of the negotiations. It is understood however, that the proposition includes the erection at South Devon of an industry which will employ about 500 men. Negotiations are also under way for the establishment of a smaller industry at North Devon, the smaller one would employ about 50 men, as was outlined in The Daily Mail some days ago.

The Town Council also took up the consideration of the opening of a new park which was also mentioned in The Daily Mail some days ago. It is proposed, as previously stated, that this park which would comprise about ten acres of property lying in the rear of the French Acadian Cairn and also adjoining the property of the old Macklin Estate and extending over so as to embrace lands lying between Gibson Street and Union Street be opened up. 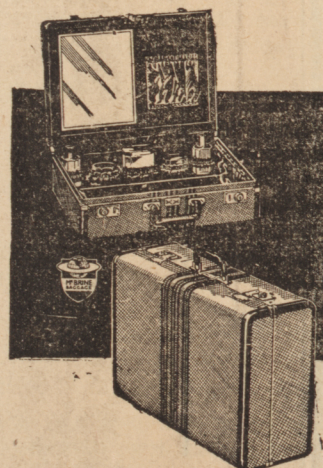
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
