WIMBLEDON, England, June 30—History showed signs of repeating itself yesterday as another Perry-Von Cramm final loomed as a probability in the men's singles of the all-England tennis championships.

Fred Perry, on top of his form and aiming at his third consecutive Wimbledon championship, is favored to beat Don Budge, red-headed Californian, on Wednesday, while H. W. 'Bunny' Austin despite the fine tennis he has produced thus far, is not expected to survive the polished stroking and accurate placing of Baron Von Cramm of Germany.

The road to the final today led Perry over the weary body of Bryan 'Bitty' Grant, great little man from Atlanta, Ga. Perry bounded to the net and laid down a barrage of side-line and corner shots too fast even for the agile Grant to reach. He carried the quarter-final match in straight sets, 6-4, 6-3, 6-1.

REVIEWS THE YEAR'S ACTIVITIES

The valedictory at the Fredericton high school closing exercises last evening, as delivered by Walter M. Smith, was as follows:

"Mr. Chairman, Fellow Students, Ladies and Gentlemen:

It is with mingled feelings of pride and regret that I rise to deliver the valedictory of this, the graduating class of the Fredericton High School for the year 1936. I take pride in the consciousness of work well done—for I am satisfied that we, as a class, have added a commendable chapter to the annals of our school. I feel a decided regret upon realizing that we, as a class, are gathered together within the compass of these walls for the last time.

For two years Graduation Night has simply meant the beginning of another vacation, but this year it has a special significance that we have never really appreciated before. It means the severing of old friendships the beginning of new occupations, and for some of us our first taste of financial independence with its added responsibilities.

The Past Year

The past year has been marked by an increase of interest in student affairs. Several new societies have been formed, including a dramatic society under the supervision of Mr. K. C. Bishop. It was through the tireless efforts of Mr. Bishop and the dramatic society that the High School play was such a splendid success this year. To those of you here tonight who will carry on in the autumn I would point to the newly formed dramatic society that the High School of continuation and expansion.

During our "B" class year the High School Orchestra was reorganized under the direction of Mr. C. B. Burden. This orchestra has played a prominent part in all High School programmes and entertainments, and to Mr. Burden we extend our most sincere thanks for making the orchestra the capable musical organization that it is.

The past High School year also saw the beginning of a new semi-monthly newspaper. By means of this newspaper each student is kept in touch with all the different activities of the school, and in addition, if the student has a propensity for writing, he is given an opportunity to publish any articles of literary value.

We are so well acquainted with the athletic activities during the past three years, that a very few words will suffice for that phase of our High School career. We have maintained the usual standard of excellence associated with F.H.S. in football, hockey, basketball and track. The football team this year regained the interscholastic championship of New Brunswick, having lost it but once since 1921. Both the basketball and hockey teams were runners-up in the championships. In addition there has been an increased interest in athletics for the girls, particularly in basketball, the girls' basketball team having won every game which it played.

During the past year more attention has been paid to the physical development of the average student than was formerly deemed necessary. There have been interclass leagues in volleyball and soft ball, and I feel that all those who have taken part in these activities have been greatly benefited.

Another much needed reform is a change in the method of examinations for entering the Normal School and University. There has been much talk of these changes and it is to be hoped that they will be forthcoming.

Pupil and Teacher

A notable circumstance in my High School career has been a lack of co-operation between pupil and teacher. This may have been caused by the lack of ability of a person entering High School to realize that he is old enough to no longer conduct himself as a child. Many of us do not realize this however. As a result we are treated as children throughout

B. champion in the bantam division; Gerald Farren, Saint John, flyweight title-holder in New Brunswick and claimant of the Maritime title; Dally Laskey, Fredericton, New Brunswick lightweight champ who will try and make the featherweight class; "Min" Holm, New Waterford, lightweight champ of the Maritimes; Ron Gillis, New Waterford, Maritime welter champion and Joe Thompson, of Campbellton, N. B. champion; Gus Vandenberg, Joggins, middleweight title-holder of the Maritimes and Dominic Nemis, New Waterford, light heavyweight title-holder in the three provinces.
