## TOURISTS ARE DIVERTED FROM HOTELS REPORT

Hotel Proprietors Say Private Boarding Houses Favored

Tourist Bureau Has File

Officials Claim That Patronage is Fairly Distributed

Whilst the Tourist Bureau reports an increased amount of tourist travel this year the larger hotels in the city report that their patronage from the tourists has not been up to that of previous years. It is claimed by those in charge of the tourist bureau at the head of town that the majority of tourists coming to Fredericton make inquiries for private boarding houses and are given information regarding these houses from a list which is on file at the office of the tourist bureau. On the other hand some of the leading hotel proprietors of the city are indignant at the traffic being, as they claim, diverted from the hotels.

One hotelman speaking to The Daily Mail states emphatically that he does not believe that there should be an office where any official is placed in the position to distribute patronage and to head it off from the hotels to the private boarding houses on some of the back streets. The gentleman interviewed does not state that there is any wrongdoing on the part of any official, but he believes that the position of the tourist bureau at the head of the town practically makes "a cut-off" which diverts trade from the local hotels, and that while the tourist trade is getting larger day by day that the local hotels which contributed considerable money towards boosting the travel are losing out to the advantage of private boarding houses.

Cedric Cooper of the Tourist Bureau committee states that they are endeavoring to handle the situation in fairness to everybody and that they gave emphatic instructions that none of the employees or personal friends of the tourist bureau officials were to be put on the patronage list of the information bureau. They claim that where hotels are asked for they endeavor to divide the patronage as fairly as possible and that the same thing applies in connection with the list of private boarding houses.

## MOUNTIES TO ACT WITH U.S. SECRET SERVICE

Form Security Guard, Honor Escort to U. S. President

14 From Headquarters

Mountie Patrol Boats Also to Be Present At Welchpool

The New Brunswick Royal Canadian Mounted Police will participate in the welcome to be tendered President Franklin D. Roosevelt on his arrival in New Brunswick waters on a brief vacation.

The scarlet-coated Mounties will act as honor escorts but will also be present as a security guard and will co-operate with the United States Secret Service, it was learned here today from headquarters of the Mounted Police.

A special guard of Mounties, headed by Major E. C. P. Salt, superintendent of "J" Division, New Brunswick, left here yesterday morning by automobile for Welchpool, where the president was scheduled to be welcomed today.

Besides Major Salt those in the special guard include Inspector C. K. Gray, Sergeant Major Caldwell, Sgt. Lacey, Corporal Cirt, Corporal Tudor, Corporal Ryder, and Constables McDougall, Hart, Carroll, Hinge, Earle, Blower, Veaulieu, all from headquarters in this city; and Constable James of St. George, Corporal Jones of St. Stephen, and others from Moncton and other places in the Province. In addition several R.C.M.P. patrol boats have left for the Campobello Island waters for the welcome to the President of the United States.

President Roosevelt in his yacht Seawanna reached Grand Manan Island on Saturday, stopping at Seal Cove. He was expected to arrive at his summer home at Welchpool this afternoon, or tomorrow morning.

The Mounties will return to this city on Friday after escorting the president to the international boundary at Vanceboro on his journey through the Province en route to Quebec.

## NO INFORMATION RE BRIDGE SAYS HON. C. D. HOWE

Minister of Transport Says Matter Entirely Out of Hands of Ottawa Authorities.

"The Fredericton bridge is a matter for the Canadian National Railways who are handling the entire matter. There is no information at Ottawa." This is the message received today by The Daily Mail from Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of railways, when The Daily Mail enquired from that gentleman what information, if any, he was in a position to give the public regarding the construction of the new railway bridge at Fredericton.

For the past couple of days more than one New Brunswick paper, including The Daily Mail, has expressed the opinion that some action be taken at once towards the construction of the bridge. This paper pointed out as well as others that so far nothing has been done except promises that the bridge would be built this year.

In reply to the statements contained in The Daily Mail it was stated on authority of Hon. Mr. Howe that the bridge would be built, but when it would be built was not stated. The above message from Mr. Howe explains all he knows about it.



## SHRINERS FROM MAINE TO PAY N. B. VISIT

Magnificent Shriners' Band of Bangor to Be Present

Potentate W. G. Quinn, head of the Shriners in New Brunswick has received word that the Shriners from Bangor, Maine, will come to New Brunswick in the near future and will parade at Woodstock. Those who are coming include the famous Shriners' Patrol, wrecking crew and drum corps, headed by the magnificent Shriners' band of Bangor, which contains forty-five pieces. The Shriners intended to visit New Brunswick this year and are coming to Woodstock at the request of the Board of Trade and town officials of that town. It is expected that in addition to the patrol that 500 Shriners and about as many more people including their wives and others will be in attendance. Woodstock expects to have a gala couple of days entertaining the Shriners. The Shriners have had invitations from the Maine state fair, from Lewiston, Maine and other places, which they have turned down so far.

Mr. Quinn who takes a leading part in community affairs and who is also head of the Shriners' organization in this province was in the position a few weeks ago to have the Shriners' patrol routed to this city. He got in touch with members of the executive of the Fredericton Exhibition and suggested to them the advisability of the Shriners coming here under the auspices of the exhibition association during exhibition week. He pointed out that this should result in bringing many visitors from the State of Maine to Fredericton for the exhibition. Mr. Quinn was, however, not given any encouragement in regard to the proposition, in fact some of the members of the executive intimated that the exhibition could get along without the Shriners, according to the statement made by Mr. Quinn. There are those who think that the exhibition would have been well advised if they had lined up with the Shriners on this occasion. At any rate it would have been a new idea, and the exhibition executive have been somewhat short of new ideas during the last thirty years.

Mr. Quinn stated this morning that he had made the proposition to the exhibition because he was interested in seeing a large crowd come into Fredericton. He stated that he had not only not received any reply from the exhibition committee, although they had two meetings since he made the proposition, but that he was also disgusted at some of the remarks made by some members of the executive in regard to the tie-up with the Shriners.

A year or two ago during the Saint John exhibition a similar patrol of the Shriners was urged by the Saint John exhibition to come to Saint John during the exhibition week.
