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**U. N. CABINET NOW FORMS THE
CHIEF TOPIC IN MONTREAL POLITICS****Westmount Electors Are Hopful That W. R. Bul-
loch Will Be Appointed**

MONTREAL, Aug. 20—Speculation is already rife in Montreal political circles as to Cabinet possibilities. It is expected that within a very short time Mr. Duplessis will give some indications as to who are likely to be ministers in the new government.

Electors of Westmount are feeling hopeful of having the Provincial Treasury entrusted to their member, W. R. Bulloch. It is stated that in recent conferences amongst English-speaking candidates and ex-members, Mr. Bulloch was mentioned as a likely aspirant to that portfolio. On the other hand, however, if Martin Fisher, of Huntingdon, wants the portfolio it will be hard to refuse it to him, since he has stood by the Opposition group through hard times and good, but mostly hard, and never wavered in his loyalty.

Tremblay For Labor

The prophets slate William Tremblay as practically certain to be Minister of Labor in the new government.

An able lawyer and ruthless enemy of corruption is needed for the position of Attorney-General. He is likely to have the responsibility of acting in the courts against those persons designated by the Public Accounts Committee for such procedures. The gossips suggested Oscar Drouin for this task.

Hon. T. D. Bouchard seems earmarked for the position of Leader of the Opposition now.

There are the portfolios of Public Works, Colonization, Agriculture, Lands and Forests to be allocated. Two of them call for expert knowledge of farming which may open a

door to Laurent Barre, whose knowledge of agriculture has never been challenged. The Provincial Secretaryship also presents a problem, covering such a wide field as education, hospitals, public assistance, encouragement of art and a variety of other matters in addition to the strict secretarial work.

Much Talent

There is no lack of apparent talent, however, in the cohort of new members and comparatively new ones, and the guesses heard along the street this morning on most of these portfolios are widely divergent.

It was generally agreed that a session of the Legislature may be expected early in October. It was also agreed that simultaneously with the session, the Public Accounts Committee will probably start work. A question which was frequently asked and never answered was whether the new Attorney-General, when appointed, would at once proceed to the arrest of various people whose arrest and appearance in criminal court was persistently demanded by Mr. Duplessis and his friends during the past two months.

If so, it is possible that proceedings in Criminal Court may be in progress before the new Legislature and the new Public Accounts Committee are in progress.

Liberals Absent

As was to be expected, very few Liberal stalwarts were downtown this morning to give explanations regarding Monday's upset, or as to the future plans of the party.

The party headquarters were practically closed, no one in authority was at the Government offices.

Out of the information obtained from the few Liberals met this morning, the sentiment arises that they want a general convention at the nearest date possible, with the object of choosing a permanent leader and elaborating a new programme.

While every one expresses admiration for Premier Adélard Godbout, defeated in his own constituency of L'Islet, it is not expected that he would agree to return to the House, even if a seat were found for him, at least for some time. The question arises as to who will lead the Liberal opposition in the meanwhile. Opinion points to Hon. T. D. Bouchard, Minister of Lands and Forests, elected in his constituency of St. Hyacinthe, as being the logical chief until such time as a new leader is chosen.

The defeated Government will hold a Cabinet sitting in Quebec when its members will decide at what time to hand the reins of government to the Premier-elect Maurice Duplessis.

Official Count

The official count by the different Returning Officers of the ballots cast in the Provincial Elections will take place within the next two days, when the ballot boxes, sealed by the Deputy Returning Officers at the polling stations will be opened, in the presence of representatives of the candidates, and the votes officially counted.

There is only one division in the Montreal District in which this official count by the Returning Officer might affect the result—Laurier, where Hon. Charles A. Bertrand, who had been named Attorney-General in the Godbout administration, has a majority of 12 votes over Dr. Zenon Lesage, former ALN member. The procedure by the Returning Officer takes the form of opening the envelopes containing the statement of the votes given for each candidate, and the ballots rejected as spoiled, and counting the number of votes for each candidate as indicated by the statements of the poll contained in the ballot boxes. He does not examine the ballots themselves, and declares as elected the candidates having the majority of votes.

If any candidate is of the opinion that the deputy returning officer has illegally counted or rejected any ballot paper or has made an incorrect statement of the number of votes cast for any candidate, application for a re-adjudication or a recount must be made to a judge of the Superior Court within four days after the returning officer has made the addition and declared one of the candidates elected.

The addition has to be made in the presence of the election clerk, the candidates or their representatives or if they are absent, of at least two electors.

SALES AND PURCHASES OF SECURITIES BETWEEN CANADA AND OTHER COUNTRIES

The international trade in securities between Canada and other countries in June was slightly heavier than in May. While the value of purchases remained about the same as in the previous month the value of sales increased, reducing the balance of purchases to about two million dollars. This balance was practically confined to the trade with the United States, sales and purchases between Canada and Great Britain being almost equal in June. These international security transactions between Canada and other countries were carried on through the medium of the investment dealers, stock exchanges, banks, United States branch houses and other agencies.

In June sales to the United States were \$17,317,821 compared with \$12,075,199 in May, while purchases from the United States were \$19,240,228 and \$15,246,883 in these respective months. Between May and June sales to Great Britain declined from \$4,446,213 to \$2,474,323 and purchases from \$5,721,795 to \$2,474,113.

During the first six months of 1936 the total value of sales to all countries was \$185,827,487 compared with \$131,912,334 in the corresponding period in 1935 and \$178,413,047 in the same part of 1934. Purchases during this period were \$153,424,208 in 1936, \$105,173,161 in 1935 and \$146,983,439 in 1934. It should be noted that the sales of new issues of Canadian securities outside of Canada are not included in these figures, such as the new issue of Dominion of Canada bonds of \$48,000,000 sold in January, 1936, in New York to a syndicate.

**Prosperity Reigns in
Sarawak Where an
English Rajah Rules**

Prosperity is reigning in the State of Sarawak, a territory of some 50,000 square miles along the northwest coast of Borneo ruled over by an English family by the name of Brooke as Rajahs since 1841. They are not worrying very much over the depression. For two years past their exports have shown an increase. Last year it amounted to 5.8 per cent over 1934, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Exports consist of principally rubber, oil, pepper, coal, and such native produce as sago, jelutong, damar, copra, and rattans. As usually happens where exports rise, imports also increased with a healthy trade cycle. Imports last year increased 17.2 per cent over the previous year. Condensed and sterilized milk is the biggest item among the imports, followed by dried salt fish, flour, electrical goods and apparatus, biscuits, motor lorries and cars and accessories, bicycles and motor cycles and accessories, tinned fish, paper, confectionery, macaroni and vermicelli, leather, hams and bacon. Most of the imports go by way of the port of Singapore, in British Malay.

On Western Tour**

MONTREAL, Aug. 20—Sir Edward Beatty, C. B. E., accompanied by a party of Canadian Pacific directors, has left Montreal for his annual tour of inspection over the Company's Western lines. The western journey will include visits to Southern Alberta and British Columbia, going through the Crow's Nest Pass and on to Vancouver, where they will arrive on Monday, Aug. 24. After a visit to Vancouver Island the return will be over the main line to Calgary, thence north to Edmonton and will include a trip into the Peace River country.

Canadian Pacific directors included in the party are Sir Charles Gordon, W. A. Black, General F. S. Meighen, R. H. McMaster and J. W. Hobbs; all accompanying the party are Dr. Walter W. Humphrey, vice-president and general manager of the C.P.R. Eastern lines, and in the West by Vice-President H. H. Neal, general manager of Western lines.
