LIFE AND WORK OF BLISS CARMAN PORTRAYED BY MISS MURIEL MILLER, M.A.

Fredericton Girl Writes Interesting Study of Canada's Poet Laureate.

The volume on Bliss Carman recently written by Miss Muriel Miller M.A. is a decided addition to the information already possessed of Bliss Carman. The interesting book is readable, entertaining and well arranged. The clever authoress shows a masterful knowledge of her subject and has passed it to her readers in good English and clarity of language.

In the first chapter Miss Miller takes her reader back through several generations of ancestry, establishing his kinship with Ralph Waldo Emerson and the Boston literary Brahmins—Lowell, Holmes, Longfellow, etc., an excellent heritage of the old culture. The ancestors of Carman had emigrated from England to New York, and their children's children to New Brunswick as U. E. L.

The authoress believes that ancestry did much for Bliss Carman, in endowing him with a passion for learning, a didactic tendency and a natural artistic impulse to see and admire beauty.

To this legacy of the U.E.L., as the authoress styles it, is added the good fortune of happy comradeship during his formative years. Bliss Carman enjoyed the comradeship of the great, an entourage of men like the Roberts, Strattons and the comradeship of his own headmaster Geo. R. Parkin nurtured in the future Poet Laureate of Canada, the seeds of the poet who at the zenith of his glory had no English contemporary to excel him.

The Fredericton authoress has dealt with her subject under six chapters entitled The Legacy of the U.E.L., Widening Horizons, Vagabondian Revolt, Creative Lull, Classical Rhapsodies, and the Artistic Break.

Miss Miller believes that years of travel and varied experiences, a sojourn at Harvard which brought him in contact with the brilliant youth Richard Hovey broadened his vision and greatly enlarged his horizon of thought and opened his soul to the beauty of "Low Tide on Grand Pre," his first outstanding work.

In the few years to follow, the spirit of the vagabond has unsettled the poet's philosophy. But the deepening and broadening of his nature has found vent in the Vagabondian Songs with

their ringing melodies and captivating spontaneity.

After a lull due to ill health, Carman again finds his muse. The years following brought out the classical rhapsodies, the final triumph of which is found in Sappho.

The writer believes that the intensely lyrical lines of his earlier years won him his laurels since the closing chapter of his poetic life showed his work devoid of the genius and the lyrical quality of his earlier works.

The pen picture of Fredericton's poet written by a Fredericton girl should have special appeal to all New Brunswickers. It is especially helpful to students of English literature and should be in the hands of all students in the province. It is of special interest to note that Miss Miller won the Douglas Gold Medal for English upon her graduation by the University of New Brunswick, just as Carman had done upon his graduation. The clever young lady is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. S. Miller of this city to whom the book is dedicated.
