#### January Thaw Is a Bit Previous

(Continued from Page Eight) and treacherous pools on the street intersections.

The heavy fog which hung over the city between the hours of six and nine o'clock last night kept citizens from straying too far from the doorway. The buses of the Capital Transit Ltd., and Highway Transport, Ltd., did a thriving business because of the inclement weather. One of the drivers of the local bus company reported a total of eighty-seven fares between six and eight o'clock last evening. The others were equally successful.

The presence of so much slush and water has brought up the fear of a flood in the rear portions of the city where the snow accumulates at each freshet of the season.

Ice cutting on the St. John river will commence within a week or ten days it was stated this morning by one of the biggest dealers, Robert Stevenson, of this city. The ice is now about twelve inches in thickness. The ideal thickness is about sixteen inches. Prospects are for the usual successful season, Mr. Stevenson states. Already the icemen have staked out their ice claims. Mr. Stevenson as in past seasons has his claim staked out about a quarter of a mile above the city .A bacteriological report of Mr. Stevenson's ice sold here during the summer of 1935 showed that one germ was found in one cubic centimeter of ice-which is their ringing melodies and captivating practically nii. It is interesting to note that before filtration a similar amount of water in the St. John river here. had 106 germs.
