NEW LICENSE PLATES

This year's motor vehicle license plates consist of black letters and figures on a white background with a feature being that the plates have slots at the bottom as well as at the top this year. This makes it easier to attach them to license plate holders on automobiles. The plates are stamped the same as in other years. The same letters being used to identify the various districts of the province. Another feature is that the plates are being issued only from the local office of the Motor Vehicle branch of the department of public works. The new plates have "New Brunswick-36" at the bottom, whereas last year this appeared at the top. Last year there were aluminum letters and figures on a black background. Letters signifying the various type of vehicles will be the same this year as last year.

AMENDMENT TO JUDICATURE ACT POSSIBLE

Suggested That Change Be Made in the Supreme Court

Appeal Div. Affected

Former Practice Had Only One Division of Court

There is a possibility that at the next session of the Legislature the suggestion of amending Judicature Act as it applies to the Supreme Court may be considered.

In the old days prior to 1909 there were six judges of the Supreme Court, one of whom presided over the Chancery Division and the others over the Appeal Court division. All of these took their turn at the different circuit courts throughout the province and also presided at the Appeal Court en banc. According to leading legal authorities throughout the province there is much to be said in favor of the old scheme of things. Since 1909 the seven judges who form the Supreme Court had been divided into two divisions, one of which is the Appeal Court and the other is known as the King's Bench division. The judges of the King's Bench division attend to the duties of the Circuit Court, unless on occasions they are requested to sit on the Appeal court division. The members of the King's Bench division are: Hon. Chief Justice Barry and Messrs. Justice LeBlanc, Richards, Fairweather. On the other division are: Chief Justice Baxter, Mr. Justice Grimmer, and Mr. Justice Harrison. These latter judges are also connected with the Chancery division and hold sittings at Fredericton, Saint John and Dorchester during the year. In addition to this, judges of the King's Bench division sit in chambers at Fredericton, Saint John and Moncton. There is also special work which different judges do in connection with Election Petition trials, etc.

The former system which may be revived is similar to that in practice in Nova Scotia. The attorney general of New Brunswick, Hon. J. B. McNair, K. C., who is at the head of the legal machinery in the province is one of those who seems to be in favor of reverting to the former scheme and many of the leading lawyers in the province will no doubt agree with him.

The assignment of judges and the dates for provincial courts for the new year were announced this week. The first sitting here will be on Tuesday, January 7, when Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter will sit here in Chancery.

In the King's Bench Division assignment has been made of judges for the Circuit courts and of the King's Bench Division for the year. Mr. Justice Richards of this city will hold court here on Tuesday, January 21. During the year the judges of the King's Bench division, when not on Circuit, will hold chambers in this city as follows: The Chief Justice of the King's Bench Division will hold chambers on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays of January, March, May, July, September and November. Mr. Justice Richards will hold chambers here on the same four days of February, April, June, August, October and December.

JANUARY THAW IS A BIT PREVIOUS

Almost Two Inches of Rain Fell Yesterday, Streets Flooded

River's Sharp Rise

Ice Cutting on River Will Be Held Up Temporarily

The January thaw arrived yesterday with "a bang", and even though it may not persist for the usual length of a January thaw, all the symptoms of a real serious thaw were evident this morning. Roads were flooded with water and slush, and travel by foot last night in a dense fog was hardly possible. Those who ventured out found many a treacherous spot. The weather remained mild and clear to day and many of the roads leading in to the city were almost impassable. Farmers coming into market were greatly inconvenienced.

A total of 1.61 inches of rain fell during last night. The river was almost a bare sheet of ice this morning the snow having almost all disappeared.

A six-inch rise in the river was reported this morning by officials at the pumping station. However, the authorities there hold the opinion that the thaw will be only a brief one, and colder weather will set in before many hours have passed.

The thaw was most serious in the streets of the city, where snow and ice has melted and formed dangerous

SCHOOLS ARE RE-OPENING ON MONDAY

The public schools of the city of Fredericton will re-open on Monday for the new school term, following the two weeks' Christmas holiday period. The exception is St. Dunstan's school, which will observe Epiphany on Monday and re-open on Tuesday instead. It is expected that classes will be held next Saturday to make up for the loss of one school day in St. Dunstan's.

From the office of the Board of school trustees it was learned today that at least eight or ten new school permits will be issued for the commencement of this term. Others will likely apply for permits when school opens on Monday. Most of the teachers will be back, although some of them, as well as the pupils have been ill in recent weeks. The epidemic of measles which was at its height in the closing weeks of the last term, is now almost entirely abated. There is only the rare case, the school trustees report.
