**Marriage of Former Teacher in Home of Chinese Premier**  
Bannon-vonTrachtenberg

The marriage took place recently in Seattle, Wash., of Miss Dorothea von Trachtenberg, of Shanghai, China, to Mr. Thomas Moore Bannon, of Montreal. Following the ceremony a reception was held at the home of Captain and Mrs. Wallace Langley at the Rainer Golf and Country Club. Mr. and Mrs. Bannon left later on their wedding trip to Southern California and Mexico. Later on they will return to Hollywood, California, where they will spend the winter.

The bride is the well-known Russian concert pianist. She has appeared as soloist with leading symphony orchestras and as guest artist on coast to coast radio networks. She is the daughter of Mrs. J. P. Maher, of Shanghai, China. Her late father, Michael von Trachtenberg, was a Russian nobleman, banker, and musician, and a pupil of the famous composer Anton Rubinstein. Her late grandfather, Herman von Trachtenberg, was a distinguished Russian jurist, and a Justice for the District of St. Petersburg. For distinguished services to his country he was made a Knight of the Order of Vladimir and also a Knight of the Order of St. Stanislas. Mrs. Bannon was for two years musical instructress to the household of the Chinese Premier and military leader, General Chiang Kai-Shek. She was educated at the Convent of the Holy Ghost in Tsingtao, China, and at St. Joseph's Institute in Shanghai, while she studied music under Maestro Paci.

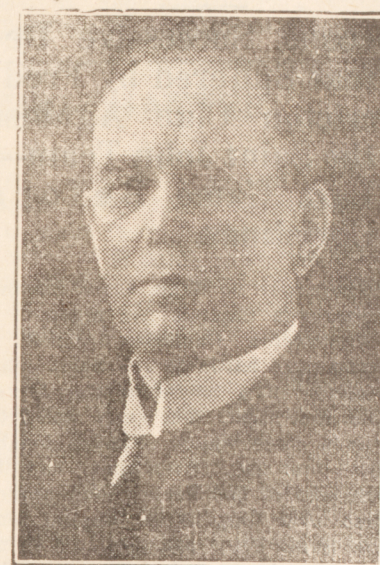

### Germany Explains Colonial Demands, Wants No Trouble

BERLIN, Dec. 23—A new regulation is now in effect that no German of military age from between eighteen to forty-five can leave Germany without the written authority of the military commander of the district that he comes from.

For some time past there has been a regulation that no one could leave Germany and take out of the country more than one pound currency. This regulation will now be more strictly enforced.

Prince, deputy minister of lands and mines.

Speaking for his minister Mr. Prince said that the number of bears killed by hunters in 1936 totalled 600 of which 200 were taken by non-resident hunters. The general tendency for lower license fees was producing good results in increasing the number of hunters and fishermen to New Brunswick, Mr. Prince stated.

The opening session of the Guides' meeting was featured by the address of the president, J. Victor Norrad, of Boiestown, who welcomed the guests and guides. Quite a number of guides transportation officials and guests were present at the meeting.

### License Trap Lines

Col. H. H. Ritchie, chief game warden of the province, spoke also and recommended that a system of licensing trap lines, to give protection in the areas where the guides wish to trap, be put into effect. The guides were generally in approval of this. Col. Ritchie defended the position of the government in declaring a closed moose season for 1937.

E. G. Poole of Montreal, assistant manager of the C.N.R. Tourist and Convention Bureau, suggested an earlier opening of the shore bird season to compete with the State of Maine. In the latter state the season opens earlier and they get business which should come to this province. Mr. Poole also suggested the stocking of New Brunswick forests with Osman caribou from Alberta and British Columbia.

### Woodcock Discussed

He further suggested that the Guides consider the regulations governing the importation of woodcock into the United States and said these should be revised. At the present time a sportsman can take eight woodcock per day or 150 through a season, but the United States only permits four birds to be taken back into that country.

James Catt, supervisor of Fish Culture for the Maritimes, also spoke and outlined a system of dams to improve and increase the number of angling pools.

### Asks United Front

Dr. E. H. Cook, of St. Stephen, president of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Protective Association, urged co-operation between the Fish and Game Protective Association and the N. B. Guides Association, and asked for co-operation in a united front to submit a proposal to the department of lands and mines for an investigation board to be established to conduct a province-wide survey of New Brunswick's fish and game, which would provide a basis for constructive legislation, without imposing burdensome restrictions on any one. Dr. Cook suggested that men from relief rolls might make a check of the game in typical sections of each district. He commented upon the tragic depletion of wild life on the continent, and recommended a unity of restoration and conservation activities.
