SAINT SAENS' "CHRISTMAS ORATORIO" SPECIAL BROADCAST DECEMBER 23

MONTREAL, Dec. 23—Charles Camille Saint Saens' "The Christmas Oratorio," one of the most beautiful compositions ever written by the famous French composer and conductor, will be presented as a special feature of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation's "Canadian Concert Hall of the Air" programme to be broadcast Dec. 25 at 9 p.m., EST, from the Montreal studios. The programme, which again will bring the Corporation's Little Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Dr. J. J. Gagnier, to the national radio audience, will have as guest artists several outstanding soloists as well as the Montreal Vocal Symphony, under the direction of Paul-Emile Corbeil. The presentation of this composition is part of the Corporation's special Christmas broadcasting activities.

CHRISTMAS RADIO CHATTER

Jack Kannawin, the announcer, who, from behind Niagara Falls, will address the radio audience of North America during the Christmas programme to be presented Dec. 25 by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, will have one of the most thrilling assignments ever given a Canadian radio commentator. When he speaks from the Cataract Portal, a recess at the foot of the Falls, it will be necessary for him to wear high rubber boots and a raincoat with hood attached, which snaps on tightly, leaving only his face visible. This is because the Portal is constantly drenched with a thick spray from the water which pours over the Falls only fifteen feet in front of him. To reach this point he will descend 120 feet in an elevator running down a shaft hewn out of solid rock. He then will proceed along a narrow passage to the Portal, a highly thrilling experience. The installation of CBC communication lines to this point has been made under very difficult circumstance. . . .

J. Frank Willis, regional programme executive of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation for the Maritime Provinces, may be found almost every day omnivorously pursuing books dealing with the laying of trans-Atlantic cables. He is developing a knowledge of this subject to aid him in questioning the captain and crew of the S.S. "Lord Kelvin," when they make their appearance on "Canada Broadcasts Christmas," the special CBC programme to be presented on Dec. 25. The cable boat will arrive at Halifax a few days before Christmas after having spent several months at sea. . . .

Frank Elphick, manager of CJCA, basic station of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation at Edmonton, laments the fact that he can't be a kid again. Mr. Elphick, who will be in charge of the portion of "Canada Broadcasts Christmas" which calls for a narration of children enjoying winter sports on hillsides near Edmonton, went out the other day to make preparations. Upon his return to the office he was limping badly. He laughingly explained that the youngsters beat him three to one on every sleighing stunt he tried. . . .

It may not be generally known, but the greatest height of the Horseshoe Falls, at the bottom of which Jack Kannawin will speak during the CBC "Canada Broadcasts Christmas" programme on Dec. 25, is 155 feet, and

Wishart Campbell, whose songs have done so much to make this programme a success, will offer his own choice of numbers for his friends of "The Friendly Corner." These will include "Tell Me Tonight," "He's of Home," "Parted," and "Thine Alone."

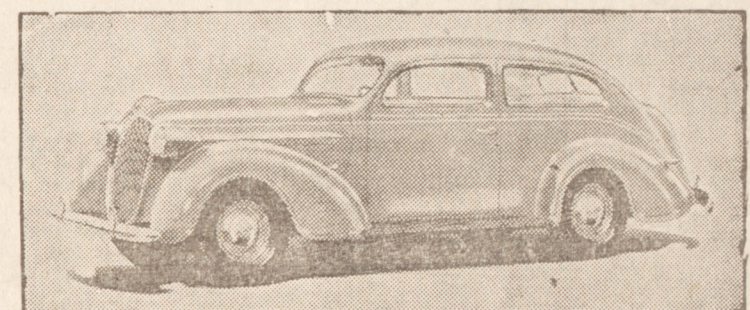
