Discussion on Matter of Higher Standard Among Guides

At the 38th annual meeting of the New Brunswick Guides' Association, this morning in its second day, discussion centred about the limitation of membership in the association to include only those experienced and qualified guides, who will satisfy an examining board of three prominent guides to act advisory to officers in the department of lands and mines. Burt Moore of Andover was elected president of the Association this

morning succeeding J. Victor Norrad of Boiestown, N. B. George Allen of Penniac was elected vice-president. Arthur Pringle of Stanley was elected honorary president, and D. W. Griffiths was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

During this morning's discussion a point was made of the necessity of having outfitters assist the association by insisting that all their employees should be members of the association. At present there are 919 registered guides and 52 members in the Guides' Association. In making the qualifications for registered guides more stringent this should make for a higher standard among New Brunswick guides. Also it should encourage membership in the Association.

Complimentary License
A complimentary bear license for any non-resident hunters who desire to hunt bear in this province, has been authorized for 1937, it was announced yesterday afternoon at the opening of the 38th annual meeting of the New Brunswick Guides' Association, by Hon. Rules, Practices Re Private Bills For Legislature

Rules and practice regarding private bills to be introduced at the next session of the New Brunswick Legislature, appear in this week's issue of the Royal Gazette under the general heading "Legislative Assembly." The attention of parties intending to seek the passage of private bills is directed to these rules and practices.

Among the rules is one that "private bills not introduced within ten days of the opening of the session shall be subject to a fee on introduction of double the amount provided for by Rule 84, as also shall bills in respect to which any of the rules of the House have been suspended to permit of their introduction."

Another rule, not generally known, to the ordinary citizen, is that no bill can be read a second time in the House until one hundred and fifty copies, properly printed and folded, have been deposited with the clerk of the house.

According to the rules no private bill, or bill making any amendment of a like nature to a former Act, shall be received by the House unless a notice, specifying clearly and distinctly the nature and objects thereof, has been published at least once a week for three consecutive weeks previous to the meeting of the Legislature, in some one of the newspapers published in the county, interested in or to be affected by the measure, or in the locality of them, reside. In any county where no newspaper is published the bill, in lieu of other local publication, may be read at any Circuit or County Court in the presence of the Grand Jury, or before the Municipal Council of the county interested or affected by the bill.

School Supt. Appointed

Farmers, Attention!

For some time there has been a law regarding the grading of eggs. All eggs sold in a city market must be graded. For the purpose in the city of Fredericton a grading station under the direction of E. E. Burden, supervised by Inspector Napier has been established in the local market. As the cost is only one cent per dozen, it would be to the benefit of the farmers to grade their eggs and save the penalty. For the benefit of the farmers the following grades of eggs bring the highest prices:

Grade A—Eggs must be fresh and clean and are divided into three classes, large, medium and small; Grade B—Eggs not exactly fresh small amount of dirt on eggs; Grade C—Cracked eggs, and eggs containing blood spots.

GOOD OLD DAYS ON MIRAMICHI ARE RECALLED

Donald MacKay of Ludlow, Veteran Guide

At Guides' Meeting

Was Character in Arthur Train's Famous "Tutt" Series

Donald MacKay of Ludlow, one of the oldest and best known guides on the Miramichi river, arrived in the city yesterday to attend the annual meeting of the N. B. Guides' Association. Having twice been written up in the Saturday Evening Post, the best circulated magazine on the continent, an honor which has come to no other New Brunswicker, Mr. MacKay shows no signs of that ailment known as "swelled head." Close to the four-score mark, modest and unassuming, Mr. MacKay pursues the even tenor of his way and enjoys the esteem of his large circle of friends. He is still in harness and hopes to be as long as he can pole or paddle a canoe or gaff a salmon.

Mr. MacKay has for many years been employed as head guide for Dr. Charles E. B. Chase, a Boston sportsman who owns a camp at Burnt Hill and has been an annual visitor to the Miramichi for nearly 30 years. The doctor has long been of the opinion that the Southwest Miramichi is one of the best angling streams on this continent.

Mr. MacKay is gifted with a good memory and can readily recall the good old days when the waters of the Miramichi were whipped by such famous anglers as Russell Sage, New York financier; Governor W. E. Russell of Massachusetts and Joseph Jefferson, the famous American actor. In those days sportsmen arriving at Fredericton drove to Boiestown by horse and wagon and then had guides pole them up the river, a distance of 50 miles, the trip consuming three days. Their outing over they would make the run back to Boiestown with the current and drive to Fredericton and take the train for home. Today the visiting anglers heading for the Miramichi motor to McGivney Junction and travel by train to Half Moon Cove, where they embark by canoe for the salmon pools, 15 or 20 miles below this point. They are now able to reach the fishing grounds, well up the river, in less time than it used

Meanest Man Puts Christmas Tree Display Out of Commission

The beautifully electrified trees and shrubbery boxes on the lawn of S. C. Young on Lansdowne street attracted considerable attention last evening. The trees were decorated with red, white and green lights and were very tastefully arranged. They were much admired by people who had occasion to visit that part of the city. Last year Mr. Young's electrically decorated lawn attracted wide attention, and many people from all over the city went down to Lansdowne street to see the display. It would be nice if more of the citizens could see their way clear to have their lawns and the exterior of their buildings similarly decorated.

An unfortunate occurrence in connection with the decorations, however, took place last night when some miserable cur stole one of the large trees and also stole some of the decorations in the way of special small incandescent lamps which are used for the purpose and which are hard to replace. This may have the effect of putting this pretty Christmas display out of commission. Mr. Young complained about the damage to the police. He states that the damage was done after 11 o'clock last night as the lights were all in good order when he retired for the night. It is to be hoped that the police will take such action as will lead to the arrest of the parties who did this damage, whether they be boys or men. Mr. Young is one man who has given us a fine community spirit, in all his undertakings and it is a poor return and a poor display of Christmas spirit when some person or persons apparently with more time than brains can perform a trick such as was carried out last night. When the culprit is discovered, as it is hoped he will be, Fredericton's meanest man will be brought to light. The city police have allowed too many of these things to get by and it is hoped that in this case a special effort will be made to bring the guilty parties to justice.
