Left Wing Party Expected to Swing Balance of Power

ballots, parties of the Centre took 64, those of the Left 63 and the Rightists 57.

Expected to Swing

As anticipated since long before the elections, Rightist parties show gains in the initial tabulations, but the left is expected to swing the balance back in its favor in next Sunday's final vote.

The strong Communist advance featured yesterday's vote. They polled 1,500,000 votes, or twice as many as in the 1932 elections. Nine Communist candidates were elected on the first ballot and the party may have as many as forty seats in the new Chamber.

Observers pointed out that the Leftist majority in the Chamber will be increased in proportion to the amount of co-operation shown in pooling votes next Sunday in favor of the strongest Leftist candidate. They will depend on the willingness of Communists, Socialists and Radical-Socialists to agree upon and carry out a common platform.

At least 330 seats in the next Parliament will be required for a working majority. Statisticians were at work tonight on this question in an attempt to forecast a Right or Left government.

And, in Spain

MADRID, April 27—Spain's Left-wing People's Front will command a total of 435 of the 473 presidential electors, according to incomplete returns compiled tonight.

Only 38 Moderates were elected to the group which will co-operate with the Cortes in selecting a new president for Spain on May 10, it was indicated. Virtually all Right parties refused to participate in the election because of the "lack of constitutional guarantees."

Alvaro de Albornoz, former Radical Socialist minister in the first government, of Premier Manuel Azana and former head of the court of constitutional guarantees, was indicated as the man most likely to be elected president.

Previously Premier Azana had strong support for the position, but the Socialist party has insisted he remain in office to carry through the Popular Front programme.

Rev. Father Francis Cashen, C.S.C. of St. Joseph's University, who has been ill at the Hotel Dieu for the past several weeks, was reported this morning as progressing favorably.

MOSQUITO, FLY REMEDY IS OFFERED

COLUMBUS, O., April 28 — Dr. Dwight M. De Long, Ohio State University entomologist, has a simple formula for eradicating pesky flies and mosquitoes from the household.

"If every housewife would spend 10 minutes a week in fly eradication," Prof. De Long said, "their home would be virtually flyless. And if every man spent the same time each week in fighting mosquitoes we would soon be rid of those little buzzers."

"A little borax sprinkled in the garbage can twice a week will do wonders and if every housewife would sprinkle a little on her food leavings, it would be an almost absolute guarantee against flies."

"Mosquitoes most times have their birth right out in the back yard. Any tin can or other container that receives rain once in a while is a fine mosquito nest. Kick the cans upside down. Check your spouting for clogs that won't allow rain water to drain off."

"If every citizen would take the responsibility for his own house, there would be fewer flies and mosquitoes."

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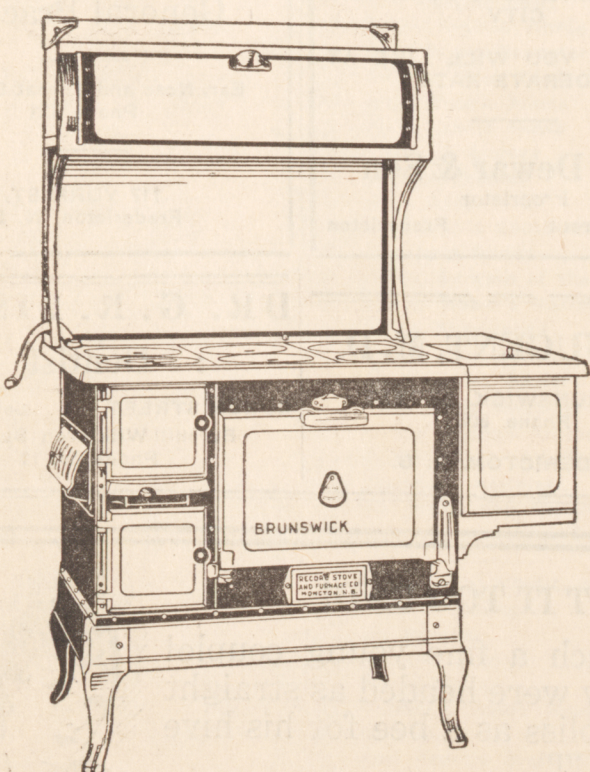
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
