## STUDY CLUBS BEING FORMED IN THIS CITY

Specialize on Problems Relative to Child Welfare

Increased Activity

Need the Sympathetic Understanding of Parents, Teachers

The work of the local Home and School Association is primarily that of parent education and provides a means of assisting educational officials and teachers in promoting a more progressive educational programme for our province. It was brought out at last night's meeting of that body. It is felt by the members of the association that progress cannot be made unless strong public opinion approves and supports it. It is also felt that at the present time there is not that sympathetic understanding and co-operation between the teachers and the parents that should exist if the child should receive the maximum of benefit from his school life.

The regular monthly meeting of the Fredericton Home and School Association was held at the Central Welfare Rooms in the County Court House. Owing to the absence of the president Rev. Dr. G. E. Ross, Rev. D. R. Chowen kindly consented to preside. Reports of committees showed increased activity in the Home and School movement.

Correspondence reported included a copy of the International Bulletin of Home and School, and additional literature from the Home and School Council of Great Britain. The monthly magazine issue by this Council was subscribed for and added to the local circulating library. Programme material for use by study clubs have been received and is being used effectively. 
