#### Employers of Labour

An article appeared in a Western paper a few days ago attacking employers of labour and Capitalists. It was written by a man whom we happened to know some years back in a Western city. The man who wrote the letter was then a printer on a Western daily paper. He came into the office one day and asked for a job because he was broke and had a sick child. He secured the job and in a month became one of the worst agitators in the place. Instead of being loyal to the people who took him up he tried to stir up trouble. In a month he was on the street again and has since drifted all over the West. To add to his irresponsible tongue, he was an inferior workman.

This makes one think of all the talk about the Capitalist, and what a terrible man he is. The Capitalist, or employer of labour, is the hardest worked man in the concern. He is the man who makes it possible for the others to get a living. He works the hardest all day and often times far into the night without any

He has all the business worries and all the responsibilities. He provides the means of livelihood for the employees and all he gets out of it is his own living. Oftentimes those of his employees for whom he has done the most show the least gratitude. In a narrow way many times some of these employees imagine that the employer is their enemy and that it is necessary for them to get together and "do him" some way or another. They seem to forget that his business is in a manner their business, that only by working in his interest and being loyal to his business can they help to make it a success. In its success rests their hope of making a living and supporting their families.

We believe that the large majority of workmen are loyal to their employers and to the business which is giving them a living. There are some pikers, however-you will find them in every linewho are always grouching about the employer, whether he runs a store or runs a factory. The more incompetent the workman, and the more that has been done for him, that is the man who is generally the worst groucher. He is generally the man who cannot do his work, or one who has been given a job when he could not get one anywhere else. He is the disturbing element.

When one reads or hears about the terrible capitalist and about the terrible employer of labor, it is well to remember that there are two sides to the story.

Happily, we in these Maritime Provinces are better situated in regard to these agitators who stir up trouble. The larger cities of the West have been largely cursed with this class of people. They start when they are in the school by fighting with the teacher and then continue it right through life. In the old days they used to shoot those kind of people out there. Now they are developing into Communists. Our old friend who wrote the letter is one of these present day agitators. His family used to be pitied. Whilst he was running around stirring up trouble the city had to support

Our men and women in the East are interested in their work. They are loyal to the people who employ them. They recognize the fact that the employers' interests are their own interests, and that only by co-operation can the business where they are making their living, whether it be store, office or factory, succeed.

#### TO HAVE CHANNEL **CLEARED BY END** OF PRESENT WEEK

Garson Wrecking Company Made Progress Over Weekend—Dynamiting Continues as Partially Removed.

The Garson Wrecking Company, which has the contract for the removal of the wreckage of the C.N.R. bridge from the St. John river here, made much progress over the weekend. One of the middle spans, which is at present obstructing the channel of the river, was brought up out of the water by the use of the crane, and will be removed from the channel by the end of the present week it was stated this morning by A. M. Garson, who is in charge of the work. He said he expected to have the channel clear by the end of the present week.

Diving operations continued this morning under the wreckage, the company's diver being able to work much easier because the water is lower now and much clearer. Dynamiting is continuing under the span of the bridge, and the removal of the span over the week was greatly facilitated by the dynamiting opera tions carried on during the past few days. FRANKFURT ON THE MAIN, May 88-The giant German airship, pronounced in perfect condition after its first record round trip between Germany and North America, started yesterday on its second flight to America. The great air liner left its base again at 8.00 p.m., (3 p.m. A.S.,

T) tonight Zeppelin Company officials announced they intended to issue a regular timetable for the Hindenburg voyages, like those issued for ocean liners, at the end of this year's service to Lakehurst.

Captain Lehmann explained the purpose of the present series of ten trans-Atlantic trips was to establish a reliable average for the westward and eastward crossings.

Dr. Hugo Eckener, veteran Zeppelin commander, decided yesterday to remain in Germany and not to accompany the Hindenburg on its second regular trans-Atlantic flight.

His decision had no connection with his controversy with the Nazi propaganda minister, it was announc-

Captain Ernst Lehmann in direct command of the Hindenburg, said he also probably would stay on the ground soon and let Capt. A. Pruss or Capt. A. Sammt watch and run the giant ship between Frankfort and

Radio reports aboard the Zeppelin Hindenburg stated she was almost 810 miles west of Land's End. England, or about 2,100 miles from New York, on its second scheduled flight to the United States.
