Charlie, veteran elevator operator of the House of Commons, was taken aback when confronted with a Washington despatch saying societies by those names were receiving official notice in the U. S. capital.

Aptohes, the "Association for the Prevention of Taking Off Hats in Elevators," and Splyegtohes, the "Society for the Protection of Ladies Whose Eyes Have Been Blacked by Gentlemen Taking Off Hats in Elevators," would find no adherents here thought Charlie.

### DRIVERS SAID LESS CAREFUL IF INSURED

PHILADELPHIA, May 18—J. H. Bickell, Registrar of Motor Vehicles for the Province of Ontario, said today the financial responsibility plan is removing irresponsible drivers from its highways.

He recommended adoption elsewhere of the plan in an address at the convention of the Eastern Conference of Motor Vehicle Administrators. Bickell said the plan was adopted in Ontario after a study disclosed its advantages over the system of compulsory legislation.

Rickell said that under the insurance plan the knowledge that he is insured tends to make the driver more careless. He said that claims in Massachusetts have increased since the law became operative.
