AMERKS GET FIRST LOSS OF N. H. L. SEASON LAST NIGHT

Joe Lamb is Chased When He Kicked on Penalty --- Rangers and Montreal Maroons Winners

MONTREAL, Nov. 19—Montreal Canadiens handed New York Americans their first defeat of the National Hockey League season tonight, downing the New Yorkers 3-2 on a third period goal by Johnny Gagnon. Victory consolidated Canadiens' position in second place of the Canadian section, two points behind the leading Amerks. Until tonight, Americans had won three and tied two games in five starts.

reversed his previous stand and asked a three-day delay to see what he could do about preventing possible legal difficulties. Promoter Herman Taylor produced the \$100,000 guarantee demanded by Gould, and was all ready to get things settled, as Joe had previously said he would sign as soon as he received the money.

Lawyers representing Taylor and Mike Jacobs, who acts for Louis, advised there was a risk of injunctions and court actions which would cause delays. Gould then asked for time to try to win the Garden's consent to Braddock's appearance in the exhibition, which might ruin the gate receipts for the Braddock-Max Schmeling bout next summer, if Jimmy should be beaten.

Jacobs and Taylor are willing to give the Garden a share in the proceeds of the Atlantic City affair, but so far the only statement has been that of Col. John Reed Kilpatrick, Garden president, that steps would be taken to protect its contract with Braddock if there should be any violation.

Early last month owners of Long Branch race track, operated just outside the city, announced they would open a down-town office for bettors who were unable to go to the track. The move was halted on advice of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

"We would not oppose such a proposal," Premier Hepburn said yesterday, when asked the Provincial Government's views concerning possible adoption of the scheme next season. He pointed out, however, that racing in Canada is conducted under Federal Government authority, and that permission for down-town betting offices would have to be received from Ottawa. It is understood the Federal Government would allow such action, if it were supported by the Ontario Government.

Although such betting offices have been operated with success in Australia it is still illegal in Canada for bets on horses to be made except through the pari-mutuel machines at the race tracks.

CHICAGO, Nov. 19—Montreal Maroons won their first game of the 1936 National Hockey League season tonight, shutting out the Chicago Black Hawks 4 to 0 before 10,000 fans.

Alex Connell, veteran Maroon goalie was the outstanding star of the fast, rough game, kicking out shots nonchalantly and being the hub of a stout defence that kept Chicago in check.

Two goals came in the first stanza and two in the third. Earl Robinson took a pass in front of the Hawk net halfway through the period and rifled the rubber home as Jackson was serving a penalty for holding. The pass was from Conacher. Then Marker scored, with help from Gracie and Cain.
