WHITE OF EGG USED TO TREAT HEMOPHILIA

British Doctors Say That
They Have Checked
Hemorrhage

LONDON, Nov. 20—Success in the control of a hemophilic hemorrhage by a white of egg preparation was announced in the medical magazine "Lancet" recently by Dr. W. A. Temperley and Professors A. E. Naisn and G. A. Clark.

It was emphasized that the treatment is not a cure. It consists of injections of gel, prepared from an egg white incubated at 37 degrees centigrade for several days in the presence of potassium bromide. After testing the serum on cats, Dr. Temperley gave himself an injection and found that the substance was not poisonous.

It was recalled that to date the most satisfactory remedy probably has been the venom of a viper when a hemorrhage occurred in easily accessible surfaces. But in case of internal bleeding it was found necessary to produce a change in the blood as a whole to induce clotting, and that the substance used must not be poisonous.

ALBERTA REVISED SCHOOL PROGRAM FOR INDIVIDUAL

Can any good thing come out of Alberta? Assuredly it can, if the bouquets being handed to the Department of Education, in respect to its new programme of studies, are any criterion.

The new programme is an effort to pay more attention to the individual child, to give rein to the bright child and to remove the handicap of the backward child as far as all this may be. Instead of attempting to iron out inequalities in children of the same grade, the attempt is made to turn such variations into mutual advantage.

For this purpose the twelve grades become, for certain purposes, four divisions of three grades each. Thus children are to some extent regrouped. Studies are divided into (1) subjects, defined as the regular subjects of a standard-type programme, and into (2) enterprises.

"Enterprises" is a new word. Pedagogically it means group study, combining mental and manual work, with common objects and institutions as the material. This gives a wide range of choice. The 'enterprise' may be the house, its building, the people who call there (milkman, postman, etc.), or the study may be the street, the farm, nature, or other countries.

Of the way in which an enterprise is conducted, some illustrations are given. One is entitled "How the world gets ready for winter." There is first discussion—turning of the leaves, later rising and earlier setting of the sun, what happens to seeds, etc.

Then come 'activities.' Pictures of autumn scenes are collected, autumn songs are sung and poems learnt, compositions are written, leaves modelled and pressed, and so on. Other enterprises illustrated are: 'We play house,' and 'We visit Japan.'

It is claimed that whatever is new in the method is a truly Alberta product. Experimentation took place last winter in three practice schools and also in seventy rural schools of the province. The teachers had previously attended a special course in the summer school of 1935.

CANADIANS BRING BACK \$2,286,506 IN U. S. GOODS

OTTAWA, Nov. 20—Six months' operation of the exemption privilege granted to returning Canadian tourists, by which they are allowed to bring into this country \$100 of dutiable goods free of duty, shows there has been no abuse of the privilege for the total value of goods brought in from all countries in that period was less than \$3,000,000, the actual amount being \$2,816,348, of which \$2,286,506 was from the United States.

Boots and shoes recorded a total of \$250,995 from all countries and \$234,380 from the United States. Automobile accessories accounted for only \$83,577, practically all of which came from the United States, while auto tires and tubes totalled \$41,586, most of which came from the United States.

For the month of October alone, usually regarded as the last month of Canada's tourist season, the total amount of dutiable goods brought in under the exemption from all countries was \$689,417, of which \$588,714 was from the United States.

favor of the new method and it became a question whether it should be applied to the whole Province this winter.
