ON THEFT CHARGE

On a charge of the theft of wood, Nelson Gallagher, of Jones' Forks, appeared in the police court here this morning. The case was adjourned until Nov. 24 for hearing.

CHARGED WITH ASSAULT

Percy Smith appeared before Police Magistrate Walter Limerick in the police court this morning charged with occasioning actual bodily harm. The case was set over until Nov. 25. Smith was arrested last night.

REGULAR MEETING

The local branch of the Canadian Legion met in its regular monthly meeting last evening in the Legion quarters, with W. A. Gibson, the president, in the chair. Routine business was transacted, and a social was spent.

BLACKVILLE SCHOOL OPENS

Dr. A. S. McFarlane, chief superintendent of education for New Brunswick, left last night for Blackville where he will attend the formal opening of the new superior school there today. The old school was burned in the spring.

DIED AT HOYT STATION

Mrs. Lucinda Knorr, aged 84, of Hoyt Station, passed away at her home this morning after a lingering illness. Deceased had lived practically all her life in that section and was very well known and respected by all who knew her. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

ICE STILL SOLID

The ice in the St. John river remained solid today, although the temperature was higher. The river froze over yesterday, the ice being thick and strong on the river front here. Pumping station officials believe it will take several days of very warm weather to free the bond of ice in the river.

INSPECTS BUILDING STONE

L. H. Cole of the Mines branch at Ottawa arrived in the city today at noon and this afternoon conferred with Dr. W. J. Wright, provincial geologist, on building stone in New Brunswick. Mr. Cole has been conducting a similar inspection of building stone all over Canada, and recently has been in the Maritime provinces.

SNEAK THIEVES BUSY

Sneaking thieves are still keeping themselves busy in certain parts of the city but the police have been watching their tracks very closely. On Tuesday night an attempt was made to enter the cellar of the home of K. C. Bishop. The would-be thieves tried their luck at prying open the boards of the outside window without success.

DANGER FROM ICICLES

Pedestrians on the city streets this morning were menaced by falling icicles from buildings. The thaw coming after the cold spell of earlier this week has caused many large icicles to drop from the roofs of buildings in Queen street and Regent street. Several persons have narrowly missed being hit.

Near Fatality as Boys Attempt to Cross River Ice

What might have been a drowning fatality was averted this morning when the police gave a "bawling-out" to a number of boys who were playing on the river where a thick coating of ice had formed. These boys in their attempt to be the first to "cross the river" were seen in the vicinity of dangerous air holes and only for the forethought on the part of the police might have fallen in and been drowned.

The boys were 19, 18 and 14 years of age. They actually did accomplish the feat of skating across the river, but Officer Bert Barker with a sharp attention to his duties censured the youths for their temerity and sent them back across the bridge on foot.

SCHOOL BOARD WILL ASK FOR LARGER GRANT

Erection of \$20,000 Addition to H. S. is Reason Given

Closed Door Meeting

City Council "Puts Up and Shuts Up" With Board's Actions

Another item of news about what was done at the meeting of the Closed Door School Board has just filtered through.

The Closed Door Board has decided to ask the City Council for several thousand dollars more of the people's money for next year's school purposes. For some years past the amount voted to the Board for schools was one hundred thousand per year. The next year the amount required will include a sufficient additional sum to provide for the erection of a twenty thousand dollar addition to the Fredericton High School. It was also decided at the closed door meeting to secure some more additional money while they were at it. It was not decided at the closed door meeting whether to tell the councillors, who are elected by the people, what the money is required for. The Board has the right the way the law now stands to demand what money it requires, and all the city has to do is to put up and shut up. As long as the city council wishes to put up with this kind of a funny law just so long will they have to put up and shut up.

Icy Streets Cause of Second Accident Street Intersection

Identical in many ways with the tragic accident which occurred on Tuesday when Prof. S. C. Perry lost his life in a collision at the intersection of Brunswick and Westmorland street, two cars collided at noon today at the corner of Charlotte and Westmorland streets. One car, driven by Douglas Tims, of this city was proceeding down Charlotte street, while a car driven by L. R. Cottingham of Saint John, was proceeding out Westmorland street. The cars collided in the middle of the street at the intersection with such force that both were driven off the road and up onto the sidewalk. Both cars were badly damaged. Mr. Tims suffered a slight blow in the head and his arm was bruised, but otherwise escaped injury. The Saint John driver was unhurt. The cars were hauled to garages for repair. The icy condition of the street was a contributing factor to the collision.

TEMPORARY APPOINTMENT

Dr. W. J. Wright, provincial geologist, is temporarily taking over the lectures of the late Prof. S. C. Perry in the latter's classes of geology and mineralogy at the University of New Brunswick. Dr. C. C. Jones, president of the U.N.B., said today that Dr. Wright would probably act in this capacity until the end of the term. The matter of a permanent appointment has not yet been considered. Prof. Perry lost his life as the result of an accidental collision between his car and the Fredericton fire truck on Tuesday morning at the intersection of Brunswick and Westmorland streets.

CITIZENSHIP IS STRESSED BY ROTARY SPEAKER

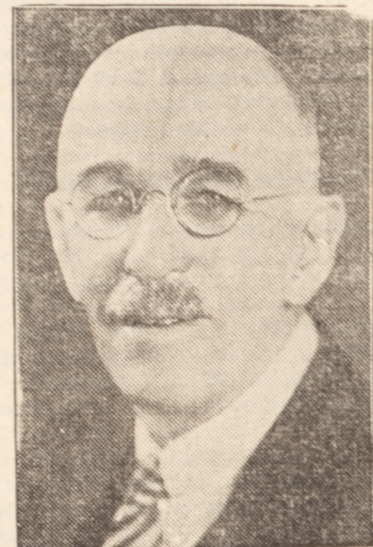
Dr. Charles E. Barker in Stimulating Address Last Night

Scores Immoral Pictures

Upholds Scout Movement. Co-ordination Social Influences

Better citizenship and the co-ordination of all social influences for the good of the community was urged by Dr. Charles E. Barker, internationally known health authority and lecturer, in an address delivered at the Provincial Normal School auditorium last evening, which was attended by a large number of people. The address was sponsored by the Fredericton Rotary club. Dr. Barker spoke to the students of the high school yesterday morning, and to a joint meeting of the Rotary-Gyro clubs yesterday at noon. F. E. McDiarmid acted as chairman. Included in the audience was a large number of Normal School students and high school students.

In the course of his stimulating address Dr. Barker referred to the Boy Scout movement, and boosted the idea of this training for the growing boy.

Every boy, he said, should get this Scout training. He talked of obedience in children, and especially referred to the necessity of attendance at church. The parent should be an example to the child in this and many other ways. The speaker spoke of the reaction of boys and girls to sex and of the duties of the parents in teaching the young person right along this path.

Dr. Barker referred to the improvement in the motion picture theatre by reason of more rigid censorship in the last year. The motion pictures now being produced are cleaner and safer for the young mind. There has been a decided change for the better, and there is a much "different class of picture." 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PROVINCIAL GOVT CONSIDERS ANNEX DEPT. BUILDINGS

Architect Made Plans For Modern Building During Summer

Cramping at Present

Site For New Building Suggested By The Daily Mail

Although no announcement has yet been made it is understood that the provincial government has for some time been considering the building of an annex to the Departmental Building. This annex may be erected on the vacant lot on St. John street between the brick building now occupied by the Lieutenant Governor's office and the Agricultural Department, and the old brick building used by the highway engineers. During the summer an architect made plans of a suitable modern building to be erected on this spot.

The different departments located in the present departmental building are all very much cramped for room and many offices are scattered all over the city which is a great inconvenience to the service as well as to the public, especially to strangers who have to chase around to find the different departments. This site for a new building was suggested last spring by The Daily Mail.

Broad Road Has Been Opened Again to Motor Traffic

The "Broad Road," or No. 2A cut-off between Oromocto and Welsford, closed some days ago has now been opened again to motor traffic. The only diversion now necessary between Fredericton and Saint John is at the Oromocto Flats. At this point a detour via Harris Bridge is in use. Those desirous of travelling between Fredericton and Saint John via Fredericton Junction and Enniskillen will find the road through those districts in good motoring condition.

Construction on highway No. 2 between Long's Creek and Allendale has been levelled over and made passable.

McKinley's Ferry is now out of use due to the fall freeze-up of the Saint John river. Motorists wishing to use the road on the east side of the river above the town of Devon must use the bridge connecting that point and Fredericton.
