

BRITAIN AGAIN SUPREME IN THE DAVIS CUP PLAY

WIMBLEDON, England, July 28—Great Britain successfully defended her Davis Cup tennis title today with a three matches to two conquest of Australia in the challenge round. The invincible Fred Perry disposed of Jack Crawford in straight sets, 6-2, 6-3, 6-3, after Adrian Quist had kept the Aussies in the hunt by defeating Britain's No. 2 player, Henry W. 'Bunny' Austin, 6-4, 3-6, 7-5, 6-3, in the final two matches.

Britain thus extended her supremacy in Davis Cup competition to four years in a row, the best consecutive showing she has made since 1903-06.

Australia fought a gallant uphill battle with two men carrying the entire burden of play in her effort to wrest the cup from the defenders. Crawford lost to Austin and Quist was defeated by Perry in the opening singles matches.

and was leading in six others. Should voting follow the present trend, 24 Liberal-Progressives would be elected. Even if Mr. Bracken and Provincial Treasurer E. A. McPherson were re-elected in the northern ridings of The Pas and Rupert's Land where voting has been deferred to Aug. 21, the party would have but 26 seats compared to the 36 held at dissolution of the last Legislature.

Conservatives, under Erick F. Willis, elected in Deloraine, were certain of at least nine seats as returns continued to trickle in. Social Credit had elected four, Co-operative Commonwealth Federation one, and Independent one.

Struggle With Tabulation The count in Winnipeg was far from complete as 'P.R.' experts struggled with the record vote of 78,181 piled up in the 10-member city constituency. They held no hope of completing the count until tomorrow and possibly not until Thursday.

The vote necessary for election in Winnipeg was 7,108 and of the 21 candidates, only L. St. George Stubbs Independent, surpassed the total on the first count. The former Manitoba senior county court judge, removed from the bench in 1932 on charges of conduct unbecoming a judge, amassed the amazing vote of 24,671.

Mr. Stubbs' total created a record for a single candidate in Winnipeg. W. Sanford Evans, Conservative, topped the poll in the 1932 election with 13,507 votes.

Lt. Col. Ralph H. Webb, Conservative and former Winnipeg mayor, was in third place while two cabinet ministers, Attorney General W. J. Major and Hon. J. S. McDiarmid, minister of natural resources, were close behind. Mr. Major pressed the charges which resulted in Stubbs' removal from the bench.

S. J. Farmer, leader of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation was running in thirteenth place in Winnipeg.

Premier Bracken held a majority of 20 immediately after the 1932 election. The party standing then was: Liberal-Progressives, 38; Conservatives, 10; C.C.F., 5; Independents, 2. Total, 55.

Three vacancies occurred during the life of the Legislature and at dissolution the party standing was: Liberal-Progressives, 36; Conservatives, 9; C.C.F., 5; Independents, 2; vacant 3. Total, 55.

The vacancies were caused by the death of E. S. Jonasson, Liberal Progressive, Gimli; election of Ralph Maybank, Liberal Progressive, Winnipeg, to the House of Commons; and appointment of J. T. Haig, Conservative, Winnipeg, to the Senate.

Two Ministers Elected Two cabinet ministers were conceded re-election in the early returns last night. Hon. W. R. Clubb, minister of public works, will sit again for Morris and Hon. I. B. Griffiths, minister of health, retained his seat in Russell.

Hon. R. A. Hoey, minister of education and a long-standing member of the Bracken cabinet, was threatened with defeat in St. Clements, however. Herbert Sulzers, C.C.F., held a lead of 640 over Mr. Hoey with 13 of 46 polls still to report. His only chance of victory apparently lay in the transfer of votes of R. C. Bate, Social Credit, whose defeat was almost certain.

The sole government gain of the election so far came in Birtle, where F. C. Bell won the seat in a close fight with W. G. Wroth, Conservative. Conservatives lost to the C.C.F. in Assiniboia where James Aiken was elected. Colonel Webb did not stand for re-election in the riding but contested one of the Winnipeg seats.

Conservatives took over Liberal-Conservative seats in Deloraine, Killarney, Manitou, Morden and Rockwood. Social Credit candidates won from the government in St. George, Gilbert Plains, Hamiota and Roblin.

Final counts in the ridings where transfer of votes is necessary—all rural constituencies—may not be made in some cases for several days and the complete election result thus will be delayed.
