APPLICATIONS TO CARRIER BOARD SHOW INCREASE

Motor Carrier Board To Hear Applications On August 11

Freight and Passenger Highway Transport, Ltd. Asks For Maine-N B. Boundary Route

When the N. B. Motor Carrier Board meets on August 11 it will have several more applications before it for motor vehicle operating privileges. Highway Transport, Limited, has applied under the provisions of the Motor Carrier Act for a certificate to operate a motor vehicle as a passenger and freight common carrier for compensation on the following routes: Andover and Perth to Fort Fairfield, Maine, or to boundary line on provincial route No. 7. This application will be heard by the Motor Carrier Board on August 11. J. Selwyn Drury has applied under the provisions of the same act to operate a motor vehicle as a freight (passenger or freight) common carrier for compensation on the following routes: Havlock, Kings county via Petitcodiac to Saint John, picking up no freight between Petitcodiac and Saint John. This application also is to be heard on August 11.

LEADING CITIZENS DISCUSS BRIDGE SITUATION

Telegrams in Tuesday's Daily Mail Cause of Much Discussion

Will Bridge Be Built? General Feeling It Will Not Be Built, Says Former Mayor

Word from Ottawa from the railway heads as exclusively announced in The Daily Mail yesterday that no decision had been arrived at as to whether the C. N. R. bridge here would be rebuilt or not, has caused considerable consternation, and last evening and today this disturbing report was the subject of considerable discussion in places where men gather.

Ex-mayor R. L. Phillips, chairman of the transportation committee of the Fredericton Board of Trade told the Daily Mail today of an equally disturbing report from Nova Scotia, when he said that several prominent men in that province had recently informed him that they were doubtful that the bridge would be built here. "I couldn't find out what was behind this opinion," declares Ex-mayor Phillips, "but they seemed to know of forces working against us, which I couldn't get behind."

The chairman of the transportation committee of the Board of Trade commented to The Daily Mail today that there "was a general feeling that it won't be built."

W. G. Clark, M.P., for York-Sunbury, and Mayor G. Willard Kitchen both are out of the city today and could not be reached for an opinion on the startling announcement by this paper yesterday that the rebuilding of the C. N. R. bridge here is a doubtful matter, instead of being a surety as the city had been led to believe.

S. S. Miller, president of the Board of Trade, could not say anything about the matter today, other than stating that the Board of Trade and the city council had done all they could in endeavoring to have the bridge rebuilt. He mentioned that W. G. Clark, M.P., had assured us that the bridge would be built. Mr. Miller seemed to think that the Board of Trade was up against a stone wall so far as the bridge was concerned. He seemed to have an unbounded faith in Mr. Clark's promises that the bridge would be built. Notwithstanding the word from Ottawa yesterday.

FIRST OF OLD AGE PENSIONS TOTALLING \$125,000, MAILED

W. P. Jones, K.C., Director of Board, Announces That 8,374 People First to Benefit—Staff Busy At Present Time—Temporary Staff To Be Cut Down Soon—Mr. Jones Explains Affect of Act On Maintenance of Parents.

The first checks to be mailed under the Old Age Pensions plan were sent out yesterday, and numbered 8,374, totalling \$125,000, it was announced today by W. P. Jones, K.C., director of the Old Age Pensions Board.

The oldest person to receive a pension check is Allan Stewart, formerly of Scotland, and now residing on Miscou Island. Mr. Stewart claims he is 104 years of age.

Yesterday some were mailed to the rural districts while today more will be mailed to places nearer Fredericton and tomorrow the Fredericton mail will carry the last of the checks. The reason for the three separate mailings is that the checks are dated the thirty first of July and will be able to be cashed on that date. They are made payable at any branch bank in the province of New Brunswick, so that the pensioner is not required to pay any exchange. The checks are drawn on the Bank of Nova Scotia in this city where the Old Age Pensions account will be kept. The signature of Mr. Jones, the director, is a facsimile signature by an engraved plate through a ribbon. The form of the check is printed and other matter inserted by machine, so it is not necessary for any writing to be done on the check. A machine also takes care of the amount, the name, and the number of the check. It is all inserted in one operation.

**Explains System**  
Mr. Jones also explained the system of accounting and said that any changes through death are noted on the ledger sheet. An audit is being
