ANNUAL MEETING

NEW DAIRY AREAS

Two new dairy areas have been established in the province of New Brunswick, under the Dairy Products Act. Commencing on July 1 the regulations and prices set by the Dairy Products Commission will apply to the Dalhousie area. Also the same regulations will apply to the Campbellton area, beginning on July 1.

RIVER NEAR SUMMER LOW

The St. John river level here is drawing nearer to its summer low level. In recent days the river level has been dropping quite rapidly, and it is now only four feet from the summer low level. A heavy rain occurred in this part of the province last night. The rain continued today. Total rainfall amounted to .31 inches up to nine o'clock this morning.

POWER TO BE OFF

Electric power in the city will be off on Sunday, June 28 from four o'clock until seven o'clock in order that the New Brunswick Power Commission may make necessary repairs to their high voltage transmission lines. If the weather is not fine this work will be postponed until the following Sunday at the same time. The repair work is in the nature of switchboard and equipment changes, several of which jobs are to be done along the line. It is the first time in four years that the Maritime Electric Co., Ltd., has had to shut off power for repairs.

NEW DEAN WAS INSTALLED WITH FINE CEREMONY

Rev. Dr. W. H. Moorhead Becomes New Dean of Cathedral

Order of Service

Ven. Archdeacon Cody Special Preacher For Occasion

Amid impressive ceremonies in the beautiful Christchurch Cathedral last evening Rev. Dr. W. H. Moorhead, formerly rector of St. Paul's Valley church in Saint John, was installed as the new dean of the cathedral. Most Rev. J. A. Richardson, Archbishop of Fredericton, installed the new dean at a special service which commenced at eight o'clock and Ven. Archdeacon H. A. Cody of Saint John, preached an appropriate sermon. A large number were present at the ceremony.

The ceremony was simple, yet very impressive. After evening prayer, conducted by Rev. W. P. Haigh, of Saint John, and the reading of the lesson by Ven. Archdeacon A. F. Bate, the installation ceremony was proceeded with. A number of members of the clergy of the diocese were in the procession which was led by the full choir of the church. Rev. Canon C. M. Hatheway, of Saint John, was the archbishop's chaplain.

Archdeacon Cody read the words of appointment of the new dean to office. Dean-elect Rev. Dr. Moorhead stood at the chancel steps, and the bishop spoke as follows: "We are ready to admit you to this office and dignity, when you on your part shall have declared before God, and in the hearing of this congregation, that you will be faithful in the same." After the dean's answer, affirming faith in his new office the Archbishop then read the instrument of installation while seated in his chair, the dean-elect kneeling before him. Archbishop Richardson led the dean to his stall in the choir. Archbishop Richardson concluded the installation ceremony with the words: "Almighty God, who for the edification of Thy Church didst institute and ordain divers degrees of dignity and honour, send Thy grace, we humbly beseech Thee, upon this, Thy servant, now called to be Dean of this Cathedral. Make him faithful in the ministry assigned to him, and enable him to discharge the duties of his office to the glory of Thy name and the honour of Thy Church, through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen."

The declaration of the Rev. William Henry Moorehead's appointment as Dean of the Cathedral, and of the Diocese of Fredericton, was read by Archdeacon Cody.

A hymn followed and the sermon was preached by Archdeacon Cody. An anthem was then sung and the benediction was pronounced by the new dean.

Armed With a Dream

The Venerable Archdeacon H. A. Cody, Archdeacon of Saint John, in his sermon, used the text: "Not so much with spears and a shield but with a dream worthy to be believed." He said that he believed the new Dean comes to his work with a dream in his heart. Dean Moorhead has worked hard in Saint John to make his dream come true. Unless the people have a dream also, the leader can do nothing, Archdeacon Cody said.

In speaking of the new Dean, he said, "May you be armed with a dream that will never fail; may you pass this dream on to others . . . take unto you the whole armor of God."

Venerable Archdeacon Cody said that all pioneers have had vision and that men with a vision have done wonderful things. The dream of the coming of the Messiah inspired many in their days of trouble. John the Baptist had a vision of Christ in his heart.

Canada owes a great deal to the influence and loyalty of the early pioneers. It was their vision that the Kingdom of God might be established here, he said. Some of their churches are standing today as a witness to their loyalty. The Cathedral, a masterpiece of art, a symbol of the true spirit, is the outcome of a dream of the founder.

In closing the Venerable Archdeacon said: "We have received a legacy. Keep it."

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Lowell Thomas to Speak Over CFNB

Lowell Thomas, famous radio news commentator, globe trotter, author, one of the few men who by his engaging personality was able to interview Lawrence of Arabia and secure material for a book concerning the exploits of T. E. Lawrence, (Lawrence of Arabia), will be in Fredericton on Saturday, July 4, and that evening will speak to his international audience from radio station CFNB. He will be here on a brief fishing vacation, brought here, it is understood, by Premier A. A. Dymally. It is understood arrangements have been made with the management of the local radio station to have the usual Lowell Thomas broadcast go out to the international audience on the evening of Saturday, July 4, except that the broadcast will emanate from CFNB. The famous radio commentator is vacationing in the Maritime provinces at the present time.

River Falls Rapidly

Low Water Has Adverse Effect on Bridge Salvaging

The capital city experienced a real burst of rain last night and this morning, the rainfall amounting to .31 inches, and proving almost of freshest proportions along the streets. The rain which is general along the St. John river valley will cause a rise in the St. John river level, which at the present time is falling rapidly and is only about four feet from summer level, and falling at a steady rate each day.

Today's rain will further handicap those farmers in many sections of the province who have been greatly delayed in their planting operations by wet weather. Only within the last three weeks has the weather proved anyway favorable for planting. Some farmers have not even yet planted their potatoes, having waited for the warm weather to dry up the muddy ground. At the peak of the planting season when the weather should have been most favorable planting activities were dreadfully hampered by the inclement weather, and its bad results on the soil.

Work on Bridge

The conditions under which the Garson Wrecking Company are working in their salvaging operations on the sunken C.N.R. bridge are made more difficult by the lowering of the river level.

In time the system could be improved upon so that a constable would have a plain or garden variety commissioner, a sergeant a high commissioner and the chief a lord high commissioner.
