CURRIEBURG W.I. ON LEGISLATION, HOME ECONOMICS

The April meeting of the Currieburg Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. John Kerr with the president in the chair. The usual method of procedure was followed, roll call being answered by Easter verses. Money was voted for the Provincial Convention Fund and a delegate appointed. Letters from Provincial Conventions were read and discussed. The local Convener of Home Economics, Mrs. Frank Boulter, gave an outline of the contents of a pamphlet dealing with Home Economics and asked that it be read by the members. Mrs. Maurice Tomlinson read an interesting and instructive paper on Legislation. Institute songs were sung and the meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

The remainder of the afternoon was occupied by setting together blocks for Institute Applique quilt. A community supper was enjoyed.

In the evening the Men's Study Club was well attended and refreshments were served by the Institute.

The girl's clubs are making an autograph cushion which will be sent to England. The boy's club are planning for the making of feeding trays and a house for birds.

A short course in agriculture put on by members of the department of agriculture, under the auspices of the Men's Study Club was carried out April 7th and 8th. Instructions in general farming practice was given by Thos. G. Hetherington; poultry by Leslie Wood; gardening by Maynard Harrison.

At the close of the course an evening of progressive games was enjoyed under the leadership of Miss Claire McMilland and Miss Louise Kerr. Games were played at twelve tables, each one providing its own merriment. A reading by Edna Wharton and a recitation by Edith Tomlinson were also enjoyed.

A vote of thanks was extended to the instructors by the president of the Study Club.

T. A. Best, Secretary of the Stanley Agricultural Society expressed in a few well chosen words his appreciation of the work being done by the Study Club.

Cake and ice cream were served by members of the Institute.

LEGISLATION

Written by Mrs. Maurice Tomlinson, a member of the Currieburg Institute. This subject is so large that only the merest outline may be touched upon.

Legislation is the act of making laws and in some form or other has existed since earliest times, since no corporation, body or nation can maintain its solidarity without a governing code of laws. Everything would be chaos and disintegration without it. Even the most primitive tribes of savage races formulated laws and rules for their guidance which were strictly enforced by their chiefs or rulers and though only unwritten laws were regarded with veneration.

How essential it is to the well being and prosperity of every organization and nation that the laws which govern their actions be of the wisest and highest type.

One of the greatest law-givers of all ages was Moses and although without doubt he was divinely inspired yet the great personality of the man himself is indelibly marked on many of them and a thoughtful reading of Deuteronomy would reveal how carefully every phase of life was provided for. As Mrs. Alexander has said:

"And never earth's philosopher
Traced with a golden pen
On the deathless page
Truths half so sage
As he wrote down for men."

Alfred the Great, that outstanding figure of the crude period of the 8th century, and decidedly great in so many respects, made his greatest contribution to the world when he incorporated into English laws the Ten Commandments, and the laws of Moses, an act which has exerted its influence on the laws of the present day.

Many of the great and wise laws have grown out of the abuses of the times, as Magna Charta and Habeas Corpus Acts. Many laws have been found to be inadequate or harmful and have been repealed. Some laws framed with every good intent have become pernicious through abuse and by perversion by evil-minded men, but I presume the laws which appeal most to us are those which govern our own Dominion.

Canada has two separate governments: The Federal with headquarters at Ottawa where laws which concern Canada as a whole are made and the Provincial Government where in its Capital city each province formulates its own laws for its separate needs, subject to approval of the Federal.

Mandamus in Appeal Court From St. John

J. Hughes, K.C., of this city who conducted the prosecution, will appear contra.

The appeal of Arthur Bannister is taken on five grounds. The first is that the photographs of the charred remains of the human body found in the ruins of the Lake house at Pacific Junction were improperly admitted in evidence and sworn to the jury, also that the photographs were of such a gruesome nature as to unduly excite sympathy and pity and to associate the accused with crime. The second ground was that the conviction was made on circumstantial evidence. The third was that prior to the trial of the accused certain newspapers published in this province and in Nova Scotia published what purported to be confessions made by the said accused, by his brother Daniel, by his mother, Mrs. May Bannister, none of said confessions were admissible in evidence against the accused. As a result of said publications public opinion was incensed against the accused.

The accused through his counsel, requests that he be given a new trial at the next Circuit Court, by which time reports of confessions will be forgotten and he will be able to have a fair trial on evidence brought out at the hearing uninfluenced by adverse newspaper reports.

The fourth ground is that there was not sufficient corroboration of the evidence of Frances Bannister, an accomplice. The fifth ground is that the learned Chief Justice in charging the jury in the case of Christian Christofferson, which case immediately preceded the case against Arthur W. Bannister, stated in effect that it could be taken as a strong implication of guilt if the accused did not go on the stand in his own defense. Counsel for the accused claim that this might have influenced the jury in the Bannister case, since a great many of the jurymen were in courtroom at that time.
