It is understood that the plans for the new C.N.R. bridge will call for an elevation which will be eight feet higher than the old structure which was washed away in the spring freshet. This will make necessary the construction of a subway at the railway crossing at University Avenue and Waterloo Row.

## Woodstock-F'ton-Chipman Service Protested

### UP-RIVER RAIL SERVICE MAY GO TO RY. COMM.

No Reply From C. P. R. Yet Re Bd. of Trade's Complaints

#### Solution Suggested

Woodstock-F'ton - Chipman Service Needs Revision

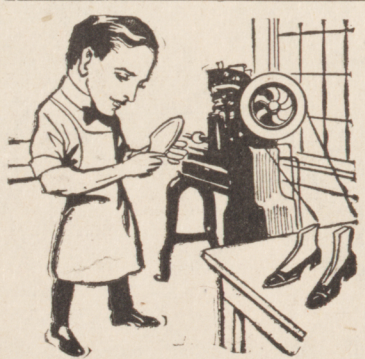
No reply has as yet been received by either the C.P.R. or the C.N.R. in regard to the matters which were taken up on Thursday last by the Transportation committee of the Board of Trade. In discussing the matter this morning, Ex-Mayor R. L. Phillips stated that it may be necessary for the city to take the whole matter to the Railway Commission, which will be done unless a satisfactory arrangement is arrived at with the railway in regard to the up-river route.

A leading business man who has had considerable to do with transportation matters made a suggestion to The Daily Mail this morning which might solve the difficulty and at the same time be satisfactory to the railways. At the present time a train leaves Woodstock about 7 a.m., gets to Devon late in the forenoon and from there proceeds to Chipman. The return trip leaves Chipman in the early afternoon, arrives at North Devon in the late afternoon and reaches Woodstock at 8 p.m. Instead of this arrangement, which is not satisfactory especially to Fredericton and which works against the interest of Fredericton merchants who not have the train leave Chipman in the morning early, arrive here early in the forenoon, go to Woodstock via the Newburgh route, reach Woodstock around noon. Then leave Woodstock again in the afternoon and come back here via Newburgh or the Gibson route as it is properly known, and then go on to Chipman sometime in the evening. This not only gives connection each day between Fredericton and points north both to Fredericton and Chipman but also gives the Chipman people and those who reside between here and Chipman, a chance to come to Fredericton and spend the day and return in the evening. It also gives them a chance to go further up river if they so desire. This proposition is a reasonable one and it should solve the situation.

The matter of unsatisfactory train service has been taken up with the Commercial Travellers' Association and other interested bodies, and if action to relieve the grievances is not taken by the C.P.R. the matter will be carried to the Railway Commission for adjustment.

A business man speaking to The Daily Mail today in regard to conditions at the Devon station states that the agents at that place, in fact the agents at both North and South Devon stations are working overtime trying to handle the extra load of traffic that has come to these stations since the washout of the C.N.R. bridge. If there is any delay in the handling of freight matter it is due to the fact that the service, especially at North Devon station, is entirely undermanned. If the railways interested would give their agent at that place sufficient assistance to enable him to do

### MANDAMUS IN APPEAL COURT FROM ST. JOHN

Writ Returnable re Detective MacBrien, Police Matron Advises

#### April Appeals Sitting

Five Grounds in Arthur W. Bannister Appeal, Case Up Tuesday

When the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court commences its April session tomorrow morning here court will consider a mandamus directed to acting Chief of Police of Saint John city, Horace McLeese, commanding him to restore Detective MacBrien and Police Matron Annie Adams to their respective offices. The writ is returnable tomorrow morning. Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter and Justices Grimmer and Harrison are expected to comprise the court. Several common motions are expected to be made at the opening of the Appeal Court.

The appeal of Arthur W. Bannister, who was convicted at Dorchester recently for the murder of Phillip Lake and sentenced to die on the gallows, will be taken up tomorrow. H. M. Lambert, counsel for the accused will be here to present argument, and P.

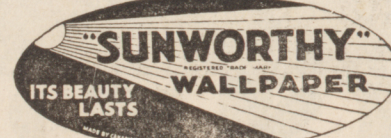

### KESWICK RIDGE FIRE DAMAGE IS CLOSE TO \$5,000

House and Barn Owned by H. Watson Smith Demolished

#### 4 Children Rescued

Baptist Parsonage, Other Buildings Threatened in Fire

A spectacular blaze which did damage estimated at \$5,000 completely demolished the house and barn owned by H. Watson Smith, storekeeper, at Keswick Ridge on Saturday evening. A crowd of more than five hundred people watched the progress of the flames which persistently caught on the barn back of the Baptist parsonage and threatened other buildings nearby. The origin of the fire is not known, although it is known to have caught in the Smith barn.

The three young children of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Price were being put to bed at the time of the fire and were rushed to safety in their night clothes. Earl Smith, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Smith of this city, who was spending his Easter vacation in the house, also was hustled to safety when the fire broke out. No one was harmed.

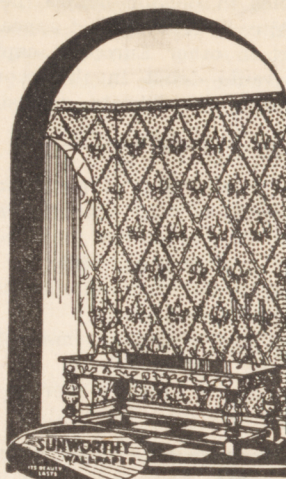
