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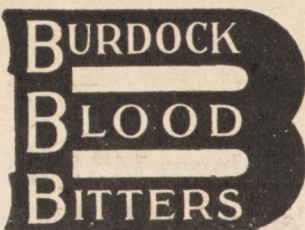
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## JOE LOUIS LIKES TO WIN, HATES TO LOSE

Handlers Fear Louis  
Will Become Too  
Overconfident

LAKEWOOD, N.J., June 6 — The idea that the handlers of Joe Louis have a problem on their hands may sound rather preposterous, but it is true nevertheless. Louis apparently is the acme of indifference, as far as his coming fight with Max Schmeling is concerned. On the surface, at least, he might just as well be getting ready for an exhibition tour, as far as any signs of worry are concerned.

That is just where the rub comes in. The members of the Louis brain trust are worried lest he may become too confident and at every opportunity they impress upon him that he has a real fight on his hands.

Keeping him mentally balanced is going to be a more difficult job than bringing him in physically perfect. As far as his physical condition goes, he probably could keep step in against Schmeling on Memorial Day and give as good an account of himself as on June 18, the scheduled date.

The mental angle is another question. Louis is surrounded with a group of well-wishers who talk not about his chances of whipping the German, but how fast he can put Schmeling out of the way.

### Managers' Difficult Job

Louis, as is customary, says little and probably not even Jack Blackburn knows exactly how he feels about the fight. His managers, though, are fearful that all this praise and enthusiasm will make him too certain of victory, and so they never miss an opportunity of boosting Schmeling to the skies. Neither John Roxborough nor Julian Black figures this is an easy fight, but in trying to convince Louis that what they think is true, they are two against thousands.

"We are working to get Joe ready for the hardest fight of his career," said Black today, as he lounged around after Louis had returned from the road. "Others may think that Schmeling won't last two rounds, or that Louis can take him any time he pleases, but we don't look at it that way. They tell me you can get 5 to 1 that Schmeling won't come up for the sixth round. That is ridiculous, but it's just things like that we have to guard against. If Joe hears that he's a cinch too many times, he may begin to believe it himself. Needless to say, we don't want that to happen."

### Joe Hates to Lose

Joe just doesn't believe in losing. He was born a winner and insists on remaining one. Yesterday being listed on the Bomber's schedule as a day of rest, so far as training activities are concerned, Joe and his retinue, including managers, trainers, secretaries and sparring partners, organized a softball team, called themselves the Brown Bommers and met a local aggregation known as the Pines Klowns.

Despite a prodigious clout by Louis himself, a drive that cleared the centre field wall, 250 feet from home plate, the Bommers were beaten 20 to 7 in the regulation nine innings. But Joe refused to be convinced.

"C'mon," he said. "Let's play some more."

"The game's over. We lose," Secretary Chet Washington told him.

"No, we don't lose," Louis insisted. "We got to play some more 'till we win."

## CENTER LINE STRENGTH IS BEES' STRENGTH

NEW YORK, June 8 — As a veteran campaigner of long standing, Danny MacFayden refuses to attribute his sudden return to winning form to anything but luck. No, he has not changed his pitching style, nor has he developed a new kind of pitch. He is the same pitcher who was a star right-hander for the Red Sox several years back, and who subsequently went through a spell of ineffectiveness with the Yankees, Reds and Braves of last year.

Now, as the Bees' ace curve-baller, with five victories, one fewer than he could gain throughout the 1935 campaign, MacFayden says in jesting tones that the batters must have become worse. "If they are not getting to me," he says, "it must be that they are not hitting as well as they have in the last few years."

## CAN-AM. LOOP IN FAVOR OF NEW SCHEDULE

NEW YORK, June 7 — An interesting national schedule during the regular season, climaxed by a playoff series will be played by Canadian-American and International League hockey teams during the 1936-37 season unless unforeseen developments occur before the season opens early in November.

Governors of the Canadian-American circuit met here today and approved a resolution favoring the plan presented by President Nathan Podoloff of New Haven. The league head said he had had several conferences in recent months with John Chick of Windsor, Ont., President of the International, who declared the magnates of that circuit had officially approved of the scheme.

Providing there are no more than six in the International, each team of that loop will play two home-and-home series with the five Can-Am clubs. If more than six outfits join the International for the next campaign only one home-and-home series will be contested.

Final details of the plan will be smoothed out at a joint meeting of the two leagues here in September.

Present plans call for both leagues to commence regular schedules early in November. Each league will retain its own identity, and each will issue its own statistics on identical dates. The two Presidents will hold supreme authority in their own territory.

The interlocking schedule plan has long been favored by Art Ross of Boston's National League Bruins and former President of the Can-Am, who maintained new faces would stimulate interest in both minor leagues. High railway rates and other problems prevented adoption of the idea previously. Railway rates recently were slashed.

President Podoloff reported Hartford, Conn., may possibly join the Can-Am and balance the league with the International, six teams in each loop.

## Yankees and Indians in Great 16-Inning Battle— Di Maggio Stopped — "Dizzy" Dean Won Again.

NEW YORK, June 7 — Charley Ruffing and George Selkirk combined here today to nose out Cleveland Indians 5-4 in a 16-inning struggle, and stretch the Yankees' American League lead to 2 1/2 games.

Ruffing, pitching 10-hit ball in going the route for the victors, hit a homer with one on in the third to give the Yanks an early lead, which Cleveland wiped out with a three-run splurge in the fourth.

Selkirk stepped up to the plate with two out in the 16th and smashed out a homer to break up the ball game.

Mike Kreevich's home run with the bases full at Boston in the sixth broke up the game with the Red Sox before 26,500 and gave the White Sox their first victory in nine starts this season against Boston, 13-5.

The Tigers pounded Buck Newsum out of the box in the third inning and continued their bombardment against Monte Weaver to take a 6-0 lead. The Senators knocked the veteran Al Crowder out of the box in the seventh and were making free with Sullivan when Lawson entered the game in the ninth.

Goose Goslin lifted a home run over the right field wall in the fifth inning.
